XMAS PARCELS FOR SOLDIERS

The Central Committee under the I. O. D. E. has received the following communication from The Canadian Field Comforts Commission, regarding Xmas Parcels for our soldiers:

CANADIAN FIELD COMFORTS COMMISSION

Orders for Special Parcels.

The Canadian Field Comforts Commission undertakes the purchase of supplies for parcels to be sent to individual soldiers at the front.

Parcels from Canada containing biscuits, fruits, home-made sweets, etc., sometimes arrive in stale or spoiled condition.

The purchasing of these parcels in England instead of Canada saves time, economises shipping space and, as the Commission buys from manufacturers and wholesale houses on the most favorable terms, more and better articles can be sent for the same money.

A complete list of names and addresses of soldiers for whom parcels are intended must be sent with order and money to be expended, together with cards or messages to be enclosed in parcels.

Parcels for Canadians in British or foreign units, in the Navy, in hospitals or at private addresses must have postage allowed for.

VOCATIONAL EVENING COURSES ARE ARRANGED

Typewriting May be Added to Subjects Taught—Miscellaneous Dept. to Have Transferred Pupils.

A special meeting of the School Board was held yesterday when most of the time was occupied in maturing plans for opening classes in vocational work. It was decided to open two classes in household science, with a limit of twenty-four to each class, and also to open classes for a commercial course and also for a course in wood-working and mechanical drawing. The instructors are not all appointed yet, but it is likely Miss Gilliss, of the household department will take a portion of the evening classes. Mr. B. B. Barnes of the manual training department, will also likely be in charge of the mechanical drawing, etc. It is probable that Mr. Patterson of the High School staff, and Mr. C. Creed will undertake the commercial instruction. Inquiry has been made by some persons as to the likelihood of the introduction of classes in stenography and typewriting. This is under consideration and later a class in typewriting may be started, but the Board would not likely be able to undertake a course in stenography.

Special Classes

At the meeting yesterday a number of the lady teachers were present by invitation, the object being chiefly to obtain the views of the teachers respecting the advisability of transferring some of the older children in their respective departments to the special classes, conducted by Miss Hoben, and composed largely of children who do not expect to take a course in the High School or University. The conference revealed the fact that there are many children who are not deriving as much benefit in the grade classes as they might obtain in a miscellaneous department. After a general exchange of opinions the ladies withdrew after the chairman thanked them for their attendance.

The Secretary was instructed to obtain from the teachers the names of pupils who, in their opinion, would receive greater advantage in the miscellaneous department than in their present classes. Mrs. Clark and Mr. Weddall were appointed a committee to further consider the question.

Question of Prizes

Mr. Lemont thought it would be advisable to consider the suggestion of some of our citizens as to the wisdom of providing to a limited extent, perhaps, scholarships or prizes for the different evening classes. Mr. Lemont will ascertain further particulars.

The meeting was somewhat protracted and the members in attendance included Dr. VanWart, chairman, Mr. Spurden, Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Cox, Dr. Crockett, Mr. Lemont, Mr. Shute, and the Secretary.

LORD READING'S VISIT TO U. S.
