
XMAS PARCELS FOR SOLDIERS

CANADIAN FIELD COMFORTS COMMISSION Orders for Special Parcels.

The Canadian Field Comforts Commission undertakes the purchase of supplies for parcels to be sent to individual soldiers at the Front. Parcels from Canada containing biscuits, fruits, home-made sweets, etc.,






