PREVIOUS ELECTIONS IN THE DOMINION OF CANADA

Coalition Government in 1876--Pacific Scandal, Reil Rebellion, National Policy and Manitoba Schools, Great Questions of Former Campaigns.

(Toronto Star.)

In 1867 the issue was Confederation. This must be qualified by saying that George Brown, and some others who had worked for Confederation or approved of it were opposed to the coalition government, holding that the work was done and needed no support at the polls. The result was that the government was sustained by 11 to 80. The majority came from Ontario and Quebec—chiefly from Quebec, which stood 45 to 20, Ontario 46 to 36, New Brunswick 7 to 8, Nova Scotia, which had been dragged into Confederation against its will, 3 for and 16 against.

In 1872 the Conservative government, by this time no longer a coalition, went to the polls much weakened by the events connected with the insurrection on the Red River. The ghost of poor Scott, says a historian, rose against it. The government was believed to have shown weakness in allowing Riel to escape. The treaty of Washington was unpopular. Result, Government 103, Opposition 97. The collapse was at hand.

Pacific Scandal.

In 1873 the government was defeated on the Pacific scandal—having accepted contributions to its election fund from the men who had obtained a charter for building the Canadian Pacific Railway. Alexander Mackenzie formed a Liberal government, went to the

country in 1874 and was returned by 133 to 73.

National Policy.

In 1878 the issue was the National Policy, as protection was called. The country was suffering from severe depression. It was part of a world-wide depression, but the government was blamed and the people, eager for a remedy, approved of protection and defeated Mackenzie by 137 to 69.

In 1882 the issue was the National Policy again—let prosperity be continued, do not discourage the capitalists who are waiting to invest money in manufacturing industry. A gerrymander of Ontario also helped. The Liberals attacked the gerrymander, and also took the Ontario side strongly in a conflict between Ontario and the Dominion, a dispute over territory lying between Ontario and Manitoba, and also over jurisdiction. The government was returned by 139 to 71.

The Riel Rebellion.

In 1887 the issue arose out of another insurrection, a repetition of that of 1870, occurring farther west. Riel had returned from the United States, led the rebellion, and was captured and hanged—legally for his action in 1885, substantially for the murder of Scott in 1870. The Liberals sought to make the issue the administrative neglect which caused the rebellion, but were out-generated and made to appear as champions of Riel. The government was returned by 122 to 93.

Edward Blake, who had succeeded Alexander Mackenzie in the Liberal leadership in 1882, now resigned and was succeeded by Wilfrid Laurier.

The next election, 1891, was fought on the issue of reciprocity. The government, which favored reciprocity in natural products, opposed unrestricted reciprocity, which it professed to identify with annexation. It was returned again by 123 to 92.
