#### THE SOUP-GREEN GARDEN.

The Beauty of the Garden Will be its Usefulness This Year.

In March and in April, from morning till night, in sewing and setting good housewives delight. To have in a garden or other like plot to trim up their house and to furnish their pot.

The words are quaint, but timely, for it is going to be a bit difficult perhaps to trim up our pots this summer and next winter—especially next winter.

Of course we all love the sort of garden that produces owners to trim up our houses, and we may still find time to keep the weeds from the borders and beds.

But we should specialize on our vegetable gardens. Perhaps not on a large scale, but even a little plot will help.

For one thing you can grow lettuce. Just a little cultivation and a little watering will keep a bed of lettuce thriving.

Then you can have a corner for

greens for soups and stews. A couple of clumps of chives, a row of carrots, a row of onions, a bunch of parsley would provide savoryavorings for soups and stews.

Of course the saving may not be large, but instead of ordering five or ten cents' worth of soup greens from the dealer you will pull them from your own garden.

With proper and not very difficult care tomatoes yield well and if they are trimmed well they don't take up much room.

#### SHAKKER LAYER CAKE.

Cream together one half cup of butter and one cup of light brown sugar; add two eggs beaten light, one half cup of water, one teaspoonful of lemon extract, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder sifted with one and three-quarter cups of flour and one cup of hickory or walnut meats, chopped coarse. Bake in layers and put together with brown sugar, cream icing or plain white icing. Ornament with halves of nut meats.

## SOME MORE INQUIRIES REPLIED TO IN THE HOUSE

The following inquiries have been answered in the Legislature:

The Minister of Public Works replying to Mr. Smith of Carleton said:

Q. What steps, if any, have been taken by the Government to rebuild or provide a highway in the County of Madawaska to accommodate the residents of Ouellette Settlement, known as the Ouellette Settlement road, which was destroyed late last season by cloudburst?

A. On assuming office the Minister of Public Works discovered that a misunderstanding existed between Mr. Maxime Cormier, dispensing the patronage in Madawaska County, and the late Minister, as to payment of land damages for road division, in consequence of which, the new road under construction was closed because of non-payment of said land damages. The Minister is now negotiating for an adjustment of the above difficulty with a view to providing a road to accommodate the residents of Ouellette Settlement.

Q. Is it the intention of the Government to follow the old highway or to make a diversion as proposed by the former administration?

A. A large sum of money having been spent on the diversion, last fall, the Government decided to complete the work begun and in consequence the old highway which was washed out by a cloudburst at this point, will be abolished.

The Premier replying to Mr. Allain said:

Q. What rate of interest did the former Government pay upon loans, and what rate was allowed by the banks upon its deposits?

A. The former Government paid 5 per cent. upon overdrafts and was allowed 3 per cent. on credit balances by the banks.

Q. What rate of interest is the bank allowing the Government today upon its deposits and what interest is being charged upon its loans?

A. The Government is allowed 3 per

cent. on its current account and 3½ per cent. on its sinking funds deposits today and is charged 5 per cent. on its loans by the banks.

The Attorney General replying to Mr. Baxter said:

Q. Who are the Masters of the Supreme Court for the Counties of Kent, Northumberland, Restigouche and Gloucester, and when was each appointed?

A. Kent County, Henry M. James and Ferdinand J. Robidoux, appointed 12th April, 1910.

Northumberland, Robert Murray, appointed 12th April, 1910.

Restigouche, A. Ernest G. McKenzie, appointed 9th April, 1913.

Gloucester, George Gilbert and Narcisse A. Landry, appointed 12th April, 1910.

Q. Have any of such offices become vacant since 24th of February last, and if so, has such vacancy been caused by resignation or dismissal?

A. No vacancies have taken place since the 24th February last.

Q. If by dismissal, for what cause?

A. No dismissals.

The Premier replying to Mr. Jones said:

Q. What position or positions in the gift of the Government does Mr. E. S. Carter hold at the present time, or has he held since the administration came into office?

A. Mr. E. S. Carter was appointed by the Premier as his secretary when he accepted office, and up to the present time no salary has been arranged or remuneration or expenses paid him.

Q. At what date was he appointed and what remuneration attaches to each?

A. Mr. Carter was appointed secretary of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company by order-in-council May 9th, and up to the present time no report has been received from the Railway Company as to what remuneration attaches to the office. The information will be brought down as soon as received.
