**QUEBEC TORY TRAITOR**  
**DISPENSED PATRONAGE**

Ottawa, May 30.—Tancrede Marsil,  
the young anti-conscription agitator in  
Montreal, who has been heading dem-  
onstrations and demanding revolution  
there, and who was the Conservative  
candidate in the constituency of Ba-  
got in the general election of 1911, has  
exercised the Borden government pat-  
ronage in that riding since his defeat  
by J. E. Marcile, the present Liberal  
member, who has two sons at the  
front.

The facts were brought to the atten-  
tion of parliament tonight when the  
civil service estimates of the customs  
department were under consideration.  
Mr. Marcile rose to direct the attention  
of Hon. Dr. Reid to a case in which he  
had previously made an ineffectual  
protest, that of an assistant appraiser  
named Hector Hamel, in the customs  
service in Montreal, who was reduced  
to the office of preventive officer with  
an actual reduction of \$300 per annum  
in his salary on the recommendation  
of Tancrede Marsil, who held the gov-  
ernment patronage for the riding.

Mr. Marcile desired to know if, in  
view of recent developments, the gov-  
ernment would restore Hamel to his  
original position and salary.

Hon. Dr. Reid smiled, but had no re-  
sponse. He did not remember the  
case but if injustice had been done he  
would make inquiry.

Hon. George P. Graham, who was  
leading the opposition, took up the  
matter vigorously. He pressed for a  
declaration from the minister as to  
whether the request of Mr. Marcile  
would be considered and also desired  
to know whether the government was  
still influenced by the recommenda-  
tions of Tancrede Marsil, and whether  
that gentleman still held the govern-  
ment patronage for the riding.

The minister, however, would not  
commit himself.
