J. Q. URQUHART IS WOUNDED

Belongs to Covered Bridge—
Bdr. T. A. MacDonald, of
Boiestown, Returns
With D. C. M.

Mrs. Maggie Urquhart of Covered Bridge has received official notification that Private John Quincy Urquhart was admitted to the 3rd General Hospital, Boulogne, France, May 15th, with a gunshot wound in the left leg. He was serving with the infantry.

Boiestown D. C. M.
Among the returned soldiers arriving at Halifax on Monday, was Bdr. Tennyson A. MacDonald of Boiestown, who sustained a fractured knee and other severe injuries in August last year. Bdr. MacDonald received the D. C. M. for bravery in action during the battle in which he received his wounds. Before enlisting he was taking a law course at Mount Allison, and enlisted with No. 1 Siege Battery, going across with them the latter part of 1915. During Bdr. MacDonald's absence, Mrs. MacDonald, who was formerly Miss Mabel Crandall of Hampton, has been acting as agent for the Western Union Telegraph Co. at Sackville, but at present is representing that company at the parliament buildings in this city.

High School.

At the High School the programme has been called off. The only observance will be exercises and addresses to the pupils by the teachers. In the lower grades of the York Street school the whole afternoon will be given over to recitations and songs.

Charlotte Street School.
At the Charlotte Street school the Daughters of the Empire presented the school with a set of history books. Mrs. W. C. Crockett, Mrs. Black, Miss Richardson and Miss Robinson represented the I. O. D. E. This afternoon there was no particular observance but the Empire was referred to in the work done.

At the Regent Street school a special geography lesson on the British Empire was taught by Principal Hughes. In the afternoon compositions referring to the war were read, patriotic recitations by the pupils were given and the studying of the war map was followed.

ANCIENT COLONY DOING ITS PART

St. John's, Nfld., May 2. 3.—It is expected that war measures will take up the greater part of the time of the session of the Newfoundland Legislature which will convene on May 30th. The Government's programme of business has been shaped largely in accordance with the suggestions brought back by the premier, Sir Edward Morris, from the imperial conference in London. Additional loans are anticipated and as the colony is now in a good financial position it is thought that these can easily be floated. Measures to reduce the cost of living probably will be introduced.

THE AGE LIMIT FIXED AT 20

Ottawa, May 23. — Indications point to the conscription bill not being introduced before Monday and possibly not until Tuesday. The government has fixed 20 years as the lowest age to which compulsion will be applied. Experience has shown that men under that age cannot generally stand the pace. The United States bill fixes the minimum at 21 years. Many of the young fellows who, at 18 promptly enlisted have been purposely kept in England and some have been sent home.

Tokio, May 23.—Seventeen persons have lost their lives and sixty-seven are suffering from various injuries as a result of the fire which swept over Yonezawa yesterday. Half of the city has been destroyed.
