Drainage of Land.

In order to do this, the owner of the land would have to make application to the Municipal Council. Upon the application being received, the Council would appoint an engineer to conduct an interpretation and applications are designed. appoint an engineer to conduct an investigation and prepare an estimate of the cost. In case of a disagreement between the land owners the Council would have power to make an order binding on both parties. The applicant would be required to deposit a sum sufficient to cover all damages to the adjacent land together with the cost of the investigation.
