GAME PROTECTION.

Some surprise was recently expressed by members of the Public Accounts Committee of the Legislature over the large expenditure made each year in this province for the protection of game. Last year the total reached \$30,000, which is nearly three-fourths of the amount received for the sale of game licenses. There is no doubt that a large portion of this money is thrown away. The game of the province gets no better protection today than was the case ten or fifteen years ago, when the revenue from the sale of licenses was very much smaller. It is a well known fact that many game wardens under the late government secured their appointment through political pull, and not on account of any special qualifications they possessed for the work. As has been frequently stated, some of them know so little about wood craft that it would not be difficult for them to get lost in an apple orchard.

The new government has an opportunity to institute an important reform in the matter of game protection. A policy can be worked out by which the cost of protection can be cut in two and a more efficient service given than has been the case for years past.

New Brunswick is undoubtedly the banner big game province of Canada. In far-off Alaska the moose grow larger antlers, but a trip to that country involves too much time and hardship for the average American or British sportsman, and when planning an outing they naturally give New Brunswick the preference.

On account of the war there is not likely to be much of an influx of non-resident sportsmen to the province next season, but it is bound to come some day. In the meantime big game animals should have efficient protection, both in the close and open season, and when the war ends there will be a rush of sportsmen to the woods of this province such as was never before experienced.

When that time comes, if we have the game, there will be not much difficulty in securing a substantial increase in the revenue.

Certain Tory newspapers in this province, which pretended to see an Acadian menace in the result of the provincial election last February, do not appear to be alarmed over the selection of an Acadian for the important position of Premier of the Tory government of Prince Edward Island. The Acadians in the sister province constitute a much smaller percentage of the population than is the case in New Brunswick, but so far as we can see not the slightest objection has been raised against the new Premier on account of his race and religion. It is to be presumed that he was selected for the position because he was the strongest man available in the party.

In the British House of Commons last week Mr. Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced that the government had decided on the release of all Irish political prisoners. The action of the government was no doubt influenced by a desire that an atmosphere of harmony and good will should prevail at the approaching Irish convention called to deal with the future problems of the country.

Toronto Globe: If no other proof were needed of the stupidity of German diplomacy and the clumsiness of the German secret service, Mr. John R. Rathom supplied it. The highly paid professional German experts in crime and espionage were thwarted at every move by American newspaper reporters, and even by girl stenographers.

A bill to provide for daylight saving throughout Canada has been introduced in the House of Commons by Sir George E. Foster. He explained that the measure provided for the turning of all clocks ahead one hour, and would come into effect upon proclamation by the government.

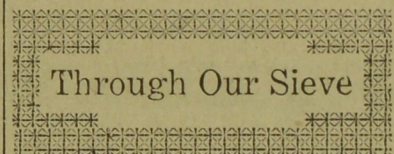
Moncton Transcript: Canada needs a statesman like Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the premiership. Veteran though he may be, yet he can in this hour of national peril harmonize the two great

races in this Dominion as can no other man. The Transcript, therefore, prefers that Sir Wilfrid Laurier retain the Liberal leadership; and give the country loyal, progressive and so far as the Empire's enemies are concerned, aggressive administration.

The Conscription Bill came up for its second reading in Parliament yesterday, and was discussed by Sir Robert Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Geo. E. Foster, Hon. Charles Macdill and Mr. Stevens of Vancouver. Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved that a referendum be taken on the question, but assured his followers that they would have an absolutely free hand with respect to the bill. Sir Wilfrid's amendment was seconded by Hon. Frank Oliver, a western member, who has lost a son in the war. The indications are that the bill will receive the support of some Liberal members, while on the other hand some Conservatives will support Sir Wilfrid's amendment. Advices from Ottawa are to the effect that the Conscription Bill will pass the House and that a general election will likely follow.

While all of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's supporters in Parliament may not be able to see eye to eye with him in regard to his attitude upon the Conscription Bill, they will agree that he is actuated by the very highest motives and is doing what he thinks proper for the good of Canada. The veteran Liberal chieftain has during his whole political career striven faithfully to promote greater unity among the peoples of the two great races in Canada, and he does not propose at this stage to abandon Quebec to fiery Nationalists and agitators of the Bourassa type.
