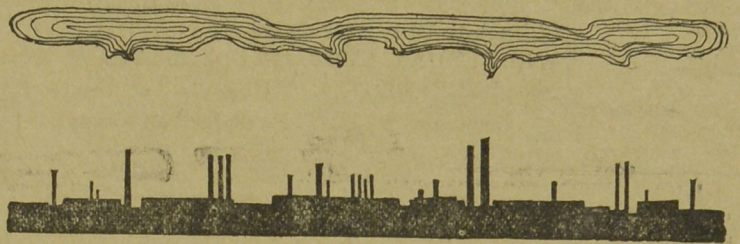
And she drove off in her beautiful auto with the remarkably pretty girl, no doubt to try psychology on other recalcitrant shopkeepers.

Public attention is hereby called to the provisions of Section Two of an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, passed June 22nd, 1917, entitled "An Act to Aid and Facilitate the Work of the Commission to Inquire into the Working of the Ontario and Nova Scotia Workmen's Compensation for Injuries Act," by which said Section Two all companies, corporations or persons engaged in manufacturing, and all employers of labor in any act or industry within the Province, and all persons, companies, or corporations engaged in operating any public utility in this Province, shall on or before the first day of October now next file with the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer for the use of the said Commission, a certified copy of the pay roll of the employees within this Province of such person, company or corporation, and in case any of such persons, companies or corporations has no pay roll then a list of the employees within the

Province of such person, company or corporation, with the wage or salary paid to each of such employees for the year 1916, subject in case of non-compliance with the said provisions of said Section Two to the penalties provided by Section Three of the said Act.

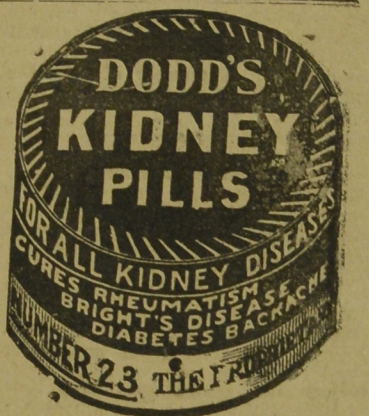
