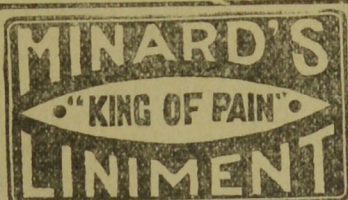

CARD TO THE ELECTORS  
OF SUNBURY

The Opposition candidates in Sunbury—a ticket that commands confidence everywhere—Messrs. R.B. Smith and D. W. Mersereau, have issued the following card to Sunbury electors:

Gentlemen.—Having been nominated by a large gathering of the electors of Sunbury to run in opposition to the present Government, and having accepted the nomination, we are now appealing to the electors generally for support.

Since the last general election we have had three Premiers: The Hon. J. K. Flemming, who resigned after having been convicted of graft and extortion by a royal commission; the Hon. George J. It is difficult to induce the other fellow to compromise when he realizes that he has the best of it.

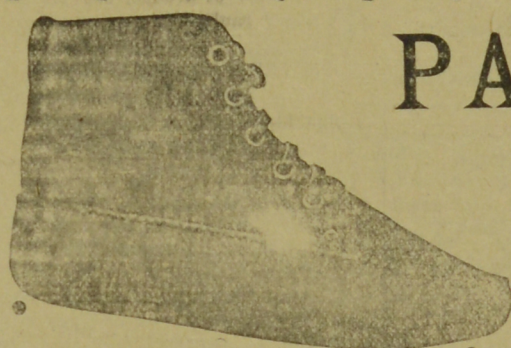
## THE QUESTION OF INTEREST.

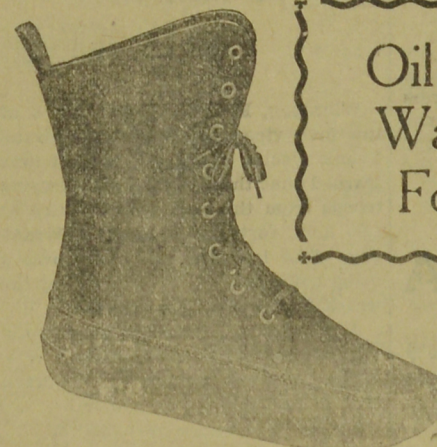
