ROUSING CONVENTIONS IN ALBERT AND MADAWASKA

Hon. C. J. Osman and S. S. Ryan Will Redeem County of Albert--Mr. L. A. Dugal Has Mr. J. E. Michaud for Running Mate in Madawaska---More Winners to be Placed in the Field This Week.

Edmundston, N. B., Feb. 8.—L. A. Dugal and J. E. Michaud, barrister, were nominated by the Opposition convention held here today. J. K. Pelleret retired, owing to injuries received recently to one of his legs, his physical condition not permitting him to contest the election.

The presence at the convention of many prominent men who formerly supported the government, and their condemnation of the government and its methods along with their assurance that in this contest they would support the Opposition ticket, gives some idea of the general feeling in Madawaska county toward Premier Murray and his lieutenants.

The convention was one of the most enthusiastic ever held in Madawaska county and was attended by more than 200 delegates from different parts of the county.

After the nominations, speeches were made by Plus Michaud, M. P., and L. A. Dugal. The latter, in a splendid address of one hour's duration, laid before those present the platform of the Opposition party, pointing out by comparison its great superiority over that of the government.

In Albert County. Riverside, N. B., Feb. 8.—At a largely attended and enthusiastic convention of the opponents of the Local Government held here this afternoon Hon. C. J. Osman, ex-Speaker of the Legislature, and Sandford S. Ryan, ex-M. P., were unanimously nominated as

Opposition candidates to contest the county in the coming election. Considering that the roads in Elgin parish were practically impassable on account of snow, the attendance was very satisfactory, and the determination to carry on the contest in aid of the change in government was vigorous and gratifying.

Both candidates made brief speeches. Hon. C. W. Robinson, Opposition candidate of Moncton city, was present at the convention and delivered a fine address, predicting victory for Albert county and expressing the belief that if reports that he had received from all parts of the province were correct, the present government at Fredericton would be driven out of power, as it deserved to be.

Robichaud on Deck. Bathurst, Feb. 8.—The government convention in Carleton today nominated as its ticket J. B. Hachey, Bathurst; M. J. Robichaud, Shippegan; F. T. B. Young, Carleton Place, and Albert Robichaud, Tracadie.

Sydney Desbrisay, of Petit Rocher, was offered a nomination, but declined. The name of Albert Robichaud was submitted in sheer desperation, as no other candidate could be found.

The presence of Martin J. Robichaud on the ticket is repudiated by all honest government supporters. The sordid story revealed in the Chandler investigation of this man's connection with the administration of roads is thought fatal to any chance the government may have had in this county.

EX-ALD. PATRICK FARRELL

DIED THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Prominent Resident of the City---
Member of City Council
Twenty-five Years

Patrick Farrell, a prominent citizen of Fredericton, passed away at his residence, 420 Needham street, yesterday afternoon at about 4.30. He was in his seventy-eighth year and is survived by a widow, three sons and two daughters. The sons are William E. Farrell, James P. Farrell and Frederick Farrell, all of Fredericton, and the daughters are Miss Gertrude Farrell, at home, and Mrs. Howard Crangle, of this city. The deceased had been ill for several months.

The funeral will take place Saturday morning, leaving the house at 8.45. High Mass will be celebrated at St. Dunstan's Church at 9 o'clock by Rev. Father Carney. Interment will be made at the Hermitage.

The deceased was a native of St. John, but had resided in Fredericton during the greater part of his life. At one time he was a member of the police force of this city. Later in life he was in business as a coal dealer.

The late Mr. Farrell was for the long period of twenty-five years a conspicuous figure in civic politics. He was returned for Carleton ward away back in the 'eighties, and remained in civic politics until 1896, when he was an unsuccessful candidate for the mayoralty. During his civic career he occupied many important chairmanships of committees, and undoubtedly rendered valuable service to the city.

The late Mr. Farrell was a Liberal in politics and was a warm friend and staunch supporter of the late Hon. A. G. Blair. He was a leading member of St. Dunstan's Roman Catholic church and always manifested a keen interest in the affairs of the denomination.

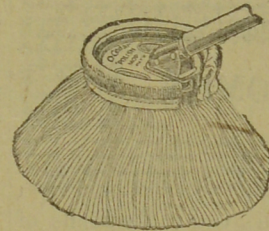

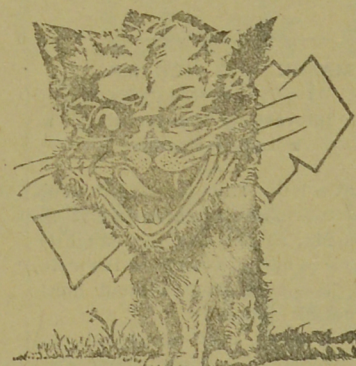
