## PROTEST AGAINST DUTIES ON COTTON

London, March 12.—A deputation representing all sections of the Lancashire cotton industry waited upon Austin Chamberlain, Secretary for India, today, to protest the recent increase in duties upon cotton imported into India.

The delegates declared that the duty was the greatest blow ever struck at the cotton industry and that it would result in the closing of the mills in India, but not an artificial growth brought about by a protective tariff. They asked for a withdrawal of the duty or the imposition of a counter-vailing excise duty upon Indian cotton.

Mr. Chamberlain replied that it was impossible to grant the request of the delegation. The duty, he said, was a necessary contribution to the charges on India's war loan of £100,000,000.

The cotton trade was not asking for equality, he declared, but for a favored position not enjoyed by other industries.

## Brazilian Consul COMMITS SUICIDE


London, March 12.—Carlos Jaeger, Brazilian consul general in Vienna, has committed suicide, following an abortive attempt at self-destruction by his wife, according to an Amsterdam despatch to the Central News.

Senora Jaeger's act was prompted by grief over the death of her children and Senor Jaeger took his life in the belief that his wife was dead.

## GERMAN PLOTTER REMOVED FROM JAIL

Los Angeles, Cal., March 12.—Capt. Alfred Fritzen, German naval officer, has been removed from the city jail, where he was placed after his arrest last Friday, according to jail attaches, and had not been returned early today, as far as could be learned.

Federal officers refused to discuss a rumor that Fritzen was being taken to New York, where he was indicted April 17, 1916, in an alleged conspiracy to destroy the Welland Canal.

Montreal, March 12.—Judging from the start this morning, Montrealers are prepared to subscribe generously to the third Canadian domestic war loan. There is no means of ascertaining the names of all new subscribers, but early this afternoon local brokers reported over \$11,500,000 applied for. Among the largest of these were the Sun Life Assurance Co., \$10,000,000; the Ogilvie Flour Mills, \$500,000, and the Montreal, Light, Heat and Power Co., \$250,000.

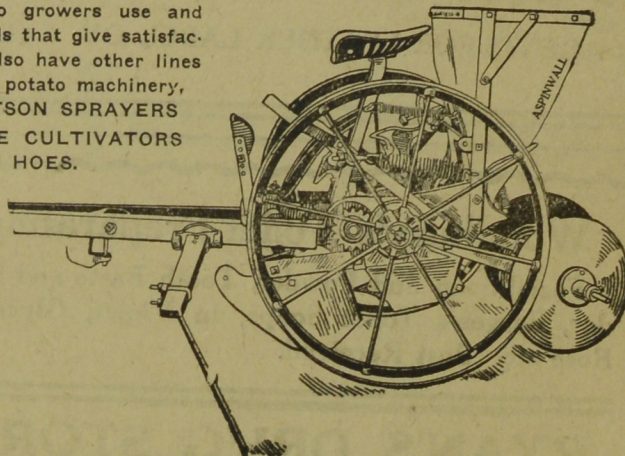
