The Graf Zeppelin Completes Second Leg of Long Flight

Arrived triumphantly at Tokio, Japan at 4.25 This Morning After the Longest and Most Perilous Flight in History—Covered 6,600 Miles in 100 Hours and 45 Minutes.

TOKIO, August 19—The second leg longest and most perilous flight ever attempted in the history of aviation came to a triumphant end this afternoon when the giant German dirigible Graf Zeppelin lighted at the Kasumigura airport near here after a 6,600 mile non-stop flight through the uncharted skies of Northern Asia.

Carrying twenty passengers a crew of forty men and Germany's ambitious hopes in commercial aviation the mighty air liner landed here at 6.25 P. M. (4.25 American E. S. T.) just one hundred hours and 45 minutes after she started from Friedershafen for the second leg of her flight around the world.

She left Friedershafen at 11.40 P. M. E. S. T. on Wednesday of last week.

BIG WINTER SEASON FOR THE MARITIME PORTS

Mr. A. T. Weldon of the C. N. R. Considers the Outlook Very Promising.

Moncton, Aug. 19—"We expect as big a season for the winter port business for Maritime ports this year as last, and we hope better", declared A. T. Weldon, vice president in charge of traffic of the Canadian National Railways, in an interview this morning, referring to business conditions generally Mr. Weldon said, "The outlook is promising except the western provinces, where the severe drought will result in a decreased crop, I have just returned from the west and saw a great deal of territory, some of which looks encouraging, while in others, due to lack of rain there will be, doubtless, a lower field, the opinion of those who are in a position to know, is that there will be a heavy shortage in production, with the large carry over of probably more than 100,000,000 bushels of last year's crop and an estimated yield of 260,000,000 to 270,000,000 bushels."

"The results so far as passenger traffic is concerned for the summer months is not as good as we had hoped for, not because there are fewer people moving about but because private automobiles and busses have carried considerable proportion of the travel, and as a consequence it has eaten into railway earnings."

EDUCATIONISTS WILL VISIT FREDERICTON

Dr. Clarence F. Jones, of Clark University, at Worcester, Mass., is Bringing Extension Class in Economic and Commercial Geography Here Tomorrow.

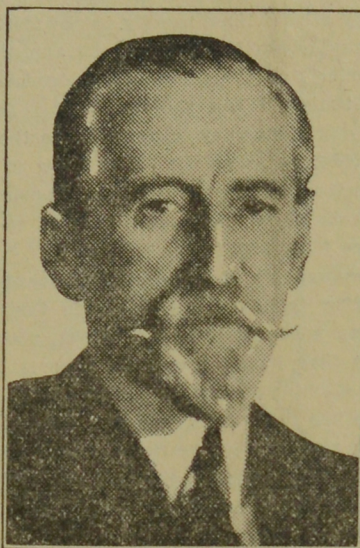
Twenty odd members of an extension in economic and commercial geography engaged in post graduate courses for advanced degrees from Clark University, Worcester, Mass., are to arrive in Fredericton this afternoon or evening in a large motor bus in which they are touring New Brunswick under arrangements made by the Bureau of Provincial Information and Tourist Travel.

Dr. Clarence F. Jones, of the Clark University faculty is in charge of the party and Mrs. Jones acts as chaperone. They arrived in New Brunswick a week ago and after stopping at Saint John, proceeded to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Tomorrow morning the party will first visit industries in Fredericton, including the plants of the Chestnut Canoe Company and the John Palmer Company, and after visits to the Parliament Buildings and Christchurch Cathedral will go to the University of New Brunswick, inspect the institution and admire the view from the roof of the historic Arts Building.

To Go Up River

Leaving Fredericton at 11.00 A. M., the party plans on motoring up the Saint John Valley, having lunch en route and reaching Grand Falls tomorrow evening. Wednesday morning they will visit the hydro electric plant at Grand Falls and that afternoon they will inspect the Fraser Companies Limited plants at Edmundston and Madawaska, Me., where opportunity will be given to note the means whereby pulp in its semi-manufactured state is "shot" across the Saint John river, which there forms the international boundary, to the plant of a subsidiary located at Madawaska and there manufactured into fine grades of paper on which high duties would have to be made if the manufacturing process was completed on Canadian soil.

He contends that these products of trees are as much an agricultural commodity as are the fruits of trees. The farm board is understood to be reserving a final opinion on the question pending further study.

GREAT DAMAGE FROM FLOODS IS FEARED

Famous Dam in Kashmir Province, India, Was Broken.

WATER IS RELEASED
Flood is Within 4½ Feet of the Record of 1882.

Karachi, India, Aug. 19—An enormous volume of water, released by the breaking of the famous Skiyck ice dam at Yapchan, Kashmir Province, India, is sweeping down the river Indus, a devastating flood inundating plains and causing serious damage.

The flood has already reached Attock in the Punjab, where today it was within four and a half feet of the previous flood record of 1882 and still rising slowly.

ASH REMAINS OF BLISS CARMAN ARRIVE HERE

Met at Station by Representatives of Province—Impressive Ceremonial for "Poet of Open Road" Tuesday.

Dr. and Mrs. Morris L. King, accompanying the flame-dissolved remains of the great lyric, Bliss Carman, were met officially at the C. P. R. station upon their arrival at one o'clock, by the Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines; Judge Crockett and Dr. W. F. Ganong, a relative and intimate of the "Poet of the Open Road". Without ceremony the ashes were borne to Christchurch Cathedral and placed before the chancel steps where they will lie in state, flanked on either side by a Constable of the New Brunswick Provincial Police who will continue their solemn vigil through the night.

One of Bliss Carman's lyrics has been set to music and will be chanted as one of the hymns. The Very Rev. Dean Neales will conduct the memorial service and will pay a verbal tribute to the master verbalist. At the conclusion of the ceremony a funeral procession will be formed and committal will be made in the Carman family plot at Forest Hill. Among the mourners will be Dr. W. F. Ganong and Theodore Goodridge Roberts and Charles G. D. Roberts, cousins of the deceased in blood and in song.

Captain G. T. Roberts states that his brother will arrive tonight or tomorrow morning.

The memorial service will be held at the Cathedral at 2.30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

There is a short poem of Carman's, written some time before his death which anticipates in a startling, puzzling way his death, cremation and committal. It "fixes in ink" the ultimate wish of the poet beyond any doubt or dispute. One sees him, as he longed to be, his unquenchable song-tongue against the subterranean roots of an old pine, his sap-borne song athrill in the breezed leaves. Judge if his wishes were not fulfilled.

We quote:—

THRENODY FOR A POET (Bliss Carman)

Not in the ancient abbey,
Nor in the city ground,
Nor in the lonely mountains,
Nor in the blue profound,
Lay him to rest when his time is come
And the smiling mortal lips are dumb.

But here in the decent quiet
Under the whispering pines,
Where the dogwood breaks in blossom
And the peaceful sunlight shines,

Manchuria's Full War Strength is To be Mobilized

Action Taken By Military Commanders Following Receipt of News That Russia's Red Army Has Invaded the Country—Soviet Officials Deny Report of Invasion.

MUKDEN, MANCHURIA, August 19—Mobilization of Manchuria's full war strength, estimated at 150,000 men, was reported ordered today by the military commanders of the district following the receipt of news that Russia's red army had invaded the country from the west and continued to march on to the interior.

Several authoritative sources reported that the movement of more troops towards the Siberian frontier had begun and that General Chang Hsues-Liang, war lord of Manchuria, had ordered his men to resist Russia's reported advance in the Manchu sector of the Soviet Chinese border.

Report is Denied.

Moscow, August 19—Russia's reported invasion of Manchuria was denied today by Soviet officials who characterized the report as "Malicious invention to screen Chinese attacks".

BIG INCREASE OVER OUTPUT OF A YEAR AGO

Canadian Hydro Electric Corporation Produced 156,749,000 K. W. H. in Month Just Ended.

Ottawa, Aug. 19—Canadian Hydro-Electric Corporation, Limited, controlled by International HydroElectric System, a division of International Paper and Power Company, produced 156,749,000 kilowatt hours of electric energy in July, an increase of 66 per cent over the output of the Corporation in July, 1928. In the first seven months of this year, the Corporation generated 1,140,359,000 kilowatt hours 82 per cent greater than its output in the corresponding period of last year.

This high output establishes Canadian Hydro-Electric Corporation, Limited, as one of the largest producers of hydro electric power on the continent. Supplying this energy, the Corporation has stations on the Ottawa River and its tributaries and a plant at Grand Falls, New Brunswick, with an aggregate capacity of 582,600 horsepower in operation and an additional 40,000 horsepower in process of installation.

H. H. TIBBITS PASSES AWAY AT ANDOVER

Was a Son of the Late James Tibbits and a Brother-in-law of Sir Douglas Hazen.

Word was received here that Mr. Harry H. Tibbits, registrar of deeds of Victoria county, had died at his home in Andover on Sunday evening after a lingering illness at the age of 71 years. Mr. Tibbits was a son of the late Mr. James Tibbits, of Fredericton, and had served under the different governments of the province since 1890 in his capacity of registrar of deeds. He was widely known throughout the province, and was a man held in universal esteem and warm regard. With his passing there is severed another link which connected the present generation with the earlier history of the province. Mr. Tibbits is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Christiana Anderson, daughter of the late John Anderson, ex-M. L. A., of the Barony, York County, and by one daughter, Miss Gertrude Tibbits, of Andover, who has been fulfilling her father's duties for the past six years. He also leaves two sisters, Lady Hazen, wife of Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen, Saint John, and Miss Frances Tibbits formerly of Saint John and now of Andover, and one brother, Archie A. Tibbits of Marine Department, Ottawa.
