The Largest Schooner.

The largest schooner rigged vessel ever built in the Maritime Provinces was launched at East River, Sheet Harbor, N. S., on Saturday. The vessel was built by the Lewis Hardware Co., and her dimensions are: Length, 210 feet; beam 37 feet 4 inches, and depth of hold, fourteen feet. She has a gross tonnage of 725 tons, and 675 tons net. She was built for the Lewiston Shipping Company.

PEDESTRIAN HAS RIGHT OF WAY, SAYS THE JUDGE

Imposed a Fine of \$25 This Morning on Speeding Motorist—Stop Watch was Held.

In the police court this morning Police Magistrate Limerick after imposing a fine of twenty-five dollars on a motorist for speeding, made a few remarks to the effect that there had been too many violations of the law by motorists and that there had been noticeable lack of enforcement of the various laws and regulations. The time to enforce the laws was before any serious accident took place and not after. Although he drove a car himself he would have no hesitation in imposing penalties on violators of the law. It appeared to be the impression among drivers of motors that they had the right of way over pedestrians. As a matter of fact the pedestrian had the right of way.

The case which prompted these remarks was against a local man who was fined twenty dollars yesterday for turning a corner improperly and for not having a light on the rear of his car. Both offences he acknowledged but the third he contested.

The case was decided by the evidence of the Chief of Police who stated that he held a stop-watch on the car of the accused last Saturday night, and that the car travelled from the Court House to the corner of Carleton and Queen streets, about three hundred yards, in seventeen seconds.

PREMIER FOSTER INSPECTS WORK ON VALLEY RY.

Motored to St. John via Gagetown Today with Hon. E. A. Smith and Mr. E. S. Carter.

The regular monthly meeting of the Provincial Government which began here Wednesday night, ended this morning. A large amount of routine business was disposed of and some appointments made. The latter will be gazetted after the ascent of His Honor the Lieut. Governor has been given.

Hon. W. E. Foster, the premier, and Hon. E. A. Smith, Minister of Lands and Mines, accompanied by Mr. E. S. Carter, secretary of the board of directors of the St. John & Quebec Railway, motored to St. John this afternoon. The journey was made by the river road as it was the desire of the premier and Hon. Dr. Smith to inspect the work which has been done on the railway between Gagetown and Welsford, where construction has been under way for some time.
