No Date Yet Fixed for the British General Election

The Laborites, However, Are Working on the Assumption That Dissolution Will Take Place on May 10 With Polling May 30—Five By-Elections to Be Held Next Week.

(By HERBERT BAILEY, British United Press Staff Correspondent.)

LONDON, March 16—Although the date of the next general election in Britain is a matter of pure speculation at present, Labor headquarters are planning their campaign on the belief that dissolution of Parliament will occur May 10, nominating day May 20, and polling May 30.

Furthermore, Labor asserts that the Conservatives are booking halls for May 29th for winding up their election campaign but Tory headquarters are silent about the date.

A Miniature Election.

Meanwhile, next week will witness a miniature general election when five by-elections take place. In each case the Tories held the seats which have become vacant owing to death, and although the successful dates can only sit in Parliament for ten weeks owing to the forthcoming election, each of the five constituencies will be the scene of a desperate battle.

The Liberals are contesting all the seats and Labor four of them. The results will considerably influence the election market where Labor is still gaining points at the expense of the Tories.

NEW OUTPUT RECORDS MADE IN FEBRUARY

A Subsidiary of the International Paper Co. Produced 156,396,000 k. w. h. of Electric Energy.

Ottawa, March 15—Canadian Hydro-Electric Corporation, Limited, a subsidiary of International Paper and Power Company, produced 156,396,000 kilowatt hours of electric energy in February, 1929, eighty-five per cent. greater than the output of the Corporation in February, 1928. In the first two months of this year the output of the Corporation was 329,091,000 kilowatt hours, an increase of ninety-three per cent. over the production during the corresponding period of 1928.

Generators of a combined capacity of 45,000 horsepower will soon be started in the Bryson, Quebec, and Grand Falls, New Brunswick, plants of the Corporation. The stations of Canadian Hydro-Electric Corporation will then have an installed capacity of 602,600 horsepower. An additional 20,000 horsepower in process of installation, will further increase the capacity of the Corporation to a grand total of 622,600 horsepower.

The combined initial capacity of 224,000 horsepower, of the Pagan, Quebec, and Grand Falls, New Brunswick, plants of the Corporation, started in 1928, represented 40 per cent of the total hydro-electric plant installation in Canada in 1928. The initial capacity of 204,000 horsepower of the Pagan plant was 65 per cent of all hydro-electric installations in the Province of Quebec last year.

Returning to Ottawa

Mr. R. B. Hanson, K. C., M. P., who has been at Edmundston attending the annual meeting of the Fraser Companies, Limited, arrived in the city yesterday. He will leave for Ottawa this afternoon to resume his parliamentary duties.

CHIEF WARDEN LOOKS OVER PARK SITE

Hopewell Hill, March 15—H. H. Ritchie, chief game warden for New Brunswick, appointed to report on the suitability of the Albert county locality suggested for the proposed national park for the province, completed his tour of inspection today and will leave for his home in Fredericton tomorrow morning.

Mr. Ritchie spent two and a half days in the district, the territory covered being all in the parishes of Hopewell and Harvey. In addition to the wooded localities of New Ireland and Crooked Creek, several shore districts were visited, including those at Mary's Point and New Horton, in the Parish of Harvey.

Speaking of the suggested park sites in the northern part of the province, Mr. Ritchie said he would probably defer his special inspection trip there until a little later on account of the unfavorable seasonal conditions at the present time. In regard to his inspection tour here, the warden expressed appreciation of the hospitality of the residents of the locality and the assistance rendered him in connection with his work.

F. H. S. LOST TITLE.

Campbellton, March 15—The inter-scholastic hockey crown for New Brunswick rests on the Campbellton High sextet, who tonight turned back the Fredericton scholars with a 4-3 defeat in the final play-downs of the league. Both teams played stellar hockey, and showed the fans just why they figured in the tilt for honors and more than 600 roaring spectators voiced their approval of the play which bordered on big league brand.

A GRAND OLD MAN WORKS AT SEVENTY-SEVEN

Peterboro, Ont., March 15—The fact that today is his 107th birthday does not keep James Hendley, Apsley, "grand old man," from going about his daily housekeeping duties and doing the odd chores about the little home where he and his son, Dennis, have lived together all winter. While the younger man works in the woods, his father stays home milking the cows, chopping wood and many other routine duties as well as filling the role of cook and housemaid.

Born of French parentage at Gaspé, Que., one of a family of 14, Mr. Hendley came to Peterboro county 67 years ago, and commenced farming.

His six brothers and eight sisters are living, "as far as I know," Mr. Hendley said.

HAGEN HAS A CHANCE TO WIN \$10,000

Miami Beach, March 16—Walter Hagen has a chance to win the largest stake ever offered a professional golfer—\$10,000—for victory in the La Gorce open here next week.

L. A. Young, Chicago sportsman, has offered to duplicate any prize money Hagen may win, according to Bob Harlow, Hagen's manager. Thus, if Hagen wins first prize of \$5,000, he will get another \$5,000 from Young.

All of the leading golfers of the country, except Bobby Jones, are entered.

DEMPSEY HAS NOT DECIDED ABOUT FUTURE

New York, March 16—Without reaching a decision concerning his future, Jack Dempsey departed quietly last night for Detroit, where it was said he would confer with a group of Michigan men headed by former Gov. Green relative to becoming associated with them in promoting boxing matches.

Rumors that Dempsey would return to the ring were revived in boxing circles after his departure, but anything concerning the former champion's plans was without confirmation.

BAD FLOODS ARE REPORTED IN BULGARIA

The River Maritza on the Rampage and is Making Trouble.

MANY HOUSES ARE FLOODED

People in Large Area Are Fleeing to Higher Ground.

Sofia, Bulgaria, March 16—Messages received here from Philippopol today said many buildings had collapsed and hundreds of houses had been flooded as the river Martinza rose rapidly. In a large area were reported fleeing to higher ground, military authorities were summoned to assist civil officials in relief measures. Philippopol is a city of about 42,000 population in eastern Bulgaria. It is located on both banks of the river Maritza.

Villagers Fleeing

Berlin, March 16—Villagers in the northern Caucasus were fleeing before rising waters today and rivers in other parts of the continent were threatening to leave their banks as a result of warmer weather and melting snow and ice.

Rostov-in-Don in the Caucasus was endangered and nearby villages were flooded.

JOHN COOLIDGE GETS ENVOYS' WEDDING GIFTS

Washington, March 16—A handsome silver bowl with four tall silver candlesticks has been taken to the White House by Lady Isabella Howard, wife of the British Ambassador to Washington, as a wedding gift to John Coolidge from the heads of the diplomatic nations accredited to this country.

Lady Isabella, as wife of the dean of the diplomatic corps, presented the gift to Mrs. Coolidge. They represented a token of the diplomatic corps good wishes to the son of the chief executive soon to be married to Florence Trumbull, daughter of the Governor of Connecticut. They were also meant as an expression of gratitude on the part of the diplomats for the kindness and hospitality extended to them by President and Mrs. Coolidge during his term in the White House.

CAPT. EAKER ON LONG FLIGHT

Brownville, Tex., March 16—Captain Ira Eaker, noted endurance pilot, took off from here at 4.08 a. m. on a dawn to dusk flight to Panama 1,960 miles away.

U. N. B. Lost To Moncton

The University of New Brunswick basketball quintet returned home today from Moncton, after being defeated the Moncton Pawnees at the Hub last evening in a senior basketball fixture, the score was 37 to 24. As a result of this game, the Moncton Pawnees and the Mount A. team are tied for the leadership for the eastern section. The winner will play off with the St. John Trojans, winners of the southern section for the provincial honors. The Red and Black are eliminated from the playoffs by virtue of their two defeats recently from the Pawnees and Mt. Allison. The U. N. B. lineup last evening with scoring was: Etratton (7), McNally (4), Lockhart (6), Oldham (4), Barbour, Woods (3), Hashey, and Chestnut.

Poincare Wins Vote Of Confidence in the Chamber of Deputies

An All Night Session Was Marked By a Tumultuous Debate—Government Was Blamed For the Death of French Soldiers in the Rhineland—The Vote Was 134 to 246.

PARIS, March 16—After an all night session marked by tumultuous debate the French Chamber of Deputies supported Premier Raymond Poincare's cabinet shortly before dawn today by a vote of 134 to 246 on the question of responsibility for deaths of French soldiers in the army of occupation.

The session ended at 5.45 a. m. after passing a resolution of homage to soldiers who died during the recent cold weather.

Foch's Condition Grave.

Paris, March 16—Marshall Foch, commander of the Allied armies during the World War is doomed to death by auremia condition combined with a weakened heart, one of his physicians informed the United Press today.

Dr. Degennes, a heart specialist who was present at a consultation of nine physicians this morning, said although the aged warrior's condition was grave his strength was such that death might be delayed for weeks or months.

ANOTHER VOTE TAKEN IN THE N. S. HOUSE

Halifax, March 15—A motion to adjourn the House "to discuss a definite matter of urgent public importance," moved by J. J. Kinsley, opposition, Lunenburg, was ruled out of order in the course of a brief session of the Assembly this afternoon, the speaker's decision being sustained by a nineteen to seventeen vote.

"The matter of public importance" was defined by Mr. Kinsley as "the failure of the provincial treasurer to accountants appointed by the governor-in-council to examine and audit the accounts of the province for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1928, to be presented to the legislature not later than the tenth day of its session as required by one of the acts of the Legislature of the Province of Nova Scotia for 1926."

THINKS NEXT CONFLICT WILL BE SHORT ONE

London, March 15—Great Britain will either win the next war or lose the Dominions, Brigadier-General J. H. Morgan, K.C., Professor of Constitutional Law at the University of London, said in a lecture at the University tonight.

The next war, he said, might come like a thief in the night, and might be found and won in the course of three weeks. There would probably be no ultimatum to warn of the coming conflict.

Brigadier-General Morgan has had a distinguished military as well as a brilliant academic career. He was several times mentioned in dispatches during the war, and represented Great Britain on the military section of the Versailles treaty.

DAVID HANSON DEVON TRAINMAN DIED YESTERDAY

Was Railroad Conductor for C. N. R. More Than 29 Years—Was Widely Known—Funeral on Sunday.

South Devon lost one of its highly respected and valued citizens yesterday afternoon in the death of David M. Hanson, railway conductor on the Canadian National railway, at the age of 59 years, following a lingering illness which extended over a period of a few years. Deceased had served twenty-nine years with the C. N. R., being employed as a conductor for passenger and freight trains during this time. He was very well known and possessed innumerable friends who will learn with sincere regret of his death.

Funeral Sunday

He is survived by his widow, one daughter, Gertrude, and several brothers and sisters living in other parts of the province and the United States. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon from the late home in South Devon at 2.30 o'clock and will be conducted by Rev. Harry Burns, assisted by Rev. D. C. Kaine. The funeral will be under the auspices of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, who will also observe their own special rites at the service, over the death of a fellow trainman. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery Extension. Lawson Hanson of this city is a nephew of the deceased.

Was Turned Down

At the meeting of the St. Stephen branch of the Fish and Game Protective Association this week a letter was read from the Moncton Association asking the meeting to endorse their petition to the Government that all existing leases of fishing rights be cancelled. The President spoke against this and on motion of Hardy Ganong, a letter was ordered sent to the main office or the Association disapproving of the Moncton resolution.
