Socialism in Our Own Time is Slogan Of the Laborites

The insistence with which the left wingers are demanding that Labor shall get a move on towards "Socialism in our own time", is proving most embarrassing to members of the government.

IMPORTANT C. N. R. CHANGES ANNOUNCED

J. D. MacNutt of Campbellton Becomes Superintendent of the P. E. I. Division.

Moncton, Oct. 1—Consequent upon the retirement of T. B. Grady, supt. of the Prince Edward Island division of the Canadian National Railways which has been announced, W. U. Appleton, general manager of the Atlantic region announces the following appointments effective October 1st. J. D. Macnutt, heretofore acting superintendent at Campbellton, is appointed superintendent of the Prince Edward Island division with headquarters at Charlottetown, P. E. I. W. E. Robinson, assistant supt. of the Campbellton division, is made superintendent with office at Campbellton. The taking over by the Canadian National Railways of the Quebec Oriental and Atlantic Quebec and Western Railways, from Matapedia to Gaspé, Que., has made changes in the management of these railways, they now being incorporated in the Campbellton division of the Atlantic region of the National system. J. S. Gordon, formerly general manager of these railways, is made assistant superintendent with headquarters at New Carlisle, Que.

MR. M'MASTER WON ELECTION IN COMPTON

New Provincial Treasurer of Quebec Was Returned by a Reduced Majority.

Cookshire, Quebec, Sept. 30—Hon. A. R. McMaster, recently selected by Premier Taschereau to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Hon. Jacob Nicol, provincial treasurer, was elected by a majority of 217 votes over Major A. L. Pomeroy, Conservative, in the by-election held today in Compton county, the same constituency that returned Hon. Mr. Nicol in the last two general elections with majorities of 980 in 1923 and 1,200 in 1927.

Complete figures were not available tonight and it was not known how large a vote was polled by indications were that it would be heavy. The total vote in 1927 was 3,538.

With the election of Mr. McMaster, the provincial assembly is constituted as follows: Liberals 73; Conservatives, 11; vacant, 1. Total 85. The vacancy is in the electoral district of Richelieu, where J. B. Lafroniere resigned two months ago.

PASTOR FIRED, TO GET SERMONS BY THE RADIO

On each of the murdered bodies the raiders left a placard with the inscription: "Revenge for 1912" the authorities are hunting for the assassins.

LATE HARRY A KITCHEN

Funeral Of Accident Victim At Kingsclear On Saturday, When Horses Ran Away, Instantly Killing Well Known Farmer, Took Place Yesterday Afternoon—Large Number Attended.

Hurricane is Said To be Gradually Dying Out Today

Reports From Telegraph Operators Scattered Throughout Southeastern Georgia Are of an Encouraging Nature—Extreme High Winds Prevail But Are Not of Hurricane Force.

ATLANTA, GA., October 1—Reports from telephone operators scattered throughout southwestern Georgia and southeastern Alabama described the tropical hurricane as slowly dying out in the vicinity of Colquitt, Georgia, at four o'clock a. m. today.

The operator there reported extreme high winds but not of hurricane force. Wires were lost to Milligan, Garden City, Laurel Hill, Fla., Florala, Elba, Duvall, Gatlin, Geneva, Waterford, Gosham, Abbeville, Ala., and Fort Gainsig.

FOUR CASES WERE HEARD IN THE CHANCERY COURT

Four cases were heard in the Chancery Court this morning before Mr. Justice Grimmer. All morning was taken up and the cases were finished at noon. The first case was that of the First National Bank of Bangor, Maine vs Calvin P. Thomas. On motion of J. J. F. Winslow, K. C. the report of the master was confirmed.

In the case of Assass vs O'Brien on motion of Mr. W. J. West an order was made for foreclosures and sale of the premises in the plaintiff's claim. In Jones vs Hamilton, Motion was made by L. E. Young order that there be a decree and that defendant convey to plaintiff the said property.

The fourth action that of Stevens vs Stevens was the last case considered. Mr. P. J. Hughes, K. C., for the plaintiff and Mr. Fred Squires appeared for the defendant. An order was made that decree be issued, terms of partnership be dissolved and receiver appointed.

UNEMPLOYMENT PROBLEM IS A SERIOUS ONE

Brighton, England, Oct. 1—The manner in which the present Labor Government handles the unemployment problem will be measure by which it will be judged as a successful government, J. H. Thomas, Lord Privy Seal and Deputy Leader of the House of Commons, told the 29th annual conference of the Labor Party today.

Thomas said 80,000 more are unemployed than during the prosperous days of 1914. He said that between 1918 and 1928 two British Governments has spent \$4,295,000,000 in unemployment insurance and poor law reliefs.

Is Improving
The condition of Captain Stephen Post, of Gloucester, Mass., who was seriously injured, when his car turned over at Springhill on Sunday, is improving somewhat today, and hopes are now held out for his recovery. Mrs. Post, wife of the victim, is registered at a local hotel, awaiting the recuperation of her husband at the Victoria Public Hospital.

DECREASE WAS SHOWN HERE IN REVENUE

Decrease of September Offset by the Increase Shown in the Past Six Months' Revenue Returns.

A decrease of \$26,353.50 was shown in the Canadian National Revenue return at the port of Fredericton for the month of September 1929 as compared with the corresponding month last year. The collections for that month in 1928 amounted to \$102,945.10, while this month the total collections were only \$76,589.60.

However, the total collections for the six months ending September 30, 1929 amounted to \$514,151.75, an increase of \$29,785.43 over the same period last year. The report of the returns as given out this morning by L. C. MacNutt, collector of National Revenue, shows that in the past month the returns were divided up as follows:

Moose Season Opens

The season for hunting the lordly moose—Canada's biggest attraction to visiting big game hunters—was officially opened today in the province of New Brunswick, with indications of one of the most successful seasons in the history of the province. For the first time in the annals of big game hunting, aeroplanes are being used to make entry into the reaches of the province to hunt. One party recently arrived by plane and landed at Slack's Lake at the headquarters of the Miramichi heretofore considered one of the inaccessible regions. The number of inquiries received at the Provincial Bureau of Information this year is more than double the number of last year.
