

WEATHER MUCH COOLER IN PAST SEVERAL DAYS

Statistics For September Show That 30 Degrees Was Coldest of the Past Month—Scarcity of Rainfall Apparent—Average Month.

October arrived with fine cool temperature today and prospects for a very successful opening of the moose season in New Brunswick. The weather of the past few weeks has been of the cool variety and typical of fine hunting weather. Indications are that from now out, the yearly influx of sportsmen from points in the United States will take place, which will in all likelihood continue until near Christmas.

Dry Hereabouts

The month of September just closed was about the average for this fall month, with cool weather in the latter part, and warmer days earlier. The scarcity of rainfall during the month was one noteworthy feature of September, and was similar to the drought which occurred in these parts all summer. Only 1.91 inches of rain fell and this all in three successive days from the 14th to the 17th. The remainder of the month and previous to those dates was "as dry as a bone" as the saying goes.

Statistics gleaned this morning show that the minimum temperature for the month was 30 degrees above, which happened on the 23rd. The past week and more has seen considerable frost nad cooler nights, which kept the thermometers from rising to any warm height. Following are the statistics for September: Mean temperature, 57.73; maximum, 82; minimum, 30; rainfall, 1.91 inches hours of sunshine, 155.1.

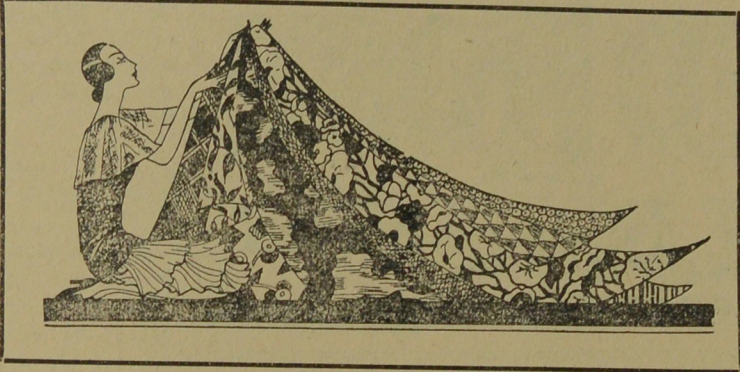
THE SAINT JOHN RIVER MAY BE UTILIZED BY MAMMOTH PULP COMPANY OF MAINE

Agents of the Concern Now in Province Gathering Data—Shore Rights Near the Lincoln Booms Said to Have Been Leased For 15 Years—Thousands of Cords of Pulpwood May Be Driven Down the River Next Season.

According to well founded reports now in circulation in the County of Sunbury the noble Saint John River, upon which major lumbering activities ceased with the passing of the Saint John River Log Driving Company a few years ago, is once more to become an important artery of commerce, not for the long lumber industry, but for the transportation of pulpwood to market. The Mail has it on good authority that a huge pulpwood concern in the State of Maine, said to be the Great Northern Pulp and Paper Company of Millinocket, whose annual operations run into hundreds of thousands of cords of pulp wood, have decided to utilize the Saint John River as means of getting their output to mills. The Mail is informed that representatives of this mammoth concern have been in the province for some days past, and to prove that they mean business have secured the lease of shore rights in the vicinity of the now disbandoned Sterling, Mitchell and Glasier booms in the County of Sunbury and have also secured further leases of shore privileges at Indian town near St. John.

A Veteran Assisting
Parker Glasier, ex-M. P. P. of Lincoln, who for many years carried on a lumber freighting business on the Saint John, accompanied the company's officials on their visit to the lower river counties and advised and assisted them in obtaining the necessary leases of the shore lots. It is said that the leases already secured are for a period of fifteen years and that the land owners have each
