Arab Rioting is Assuming Form Of Civil Warfare

Moslem and Christian Town Dwellers Uniting to Resist Attacks of Wild Bedouin Riders—Tel Aviv Said to Be Next Objective of Arabs—Some Rioting There—British Troops to Protect Town.

PARIS, August 27—Uncensored dispatches to the United Press from Beyrut, Syria, today indicated that the rioting in Palestine between the Jews and the Arabs was spreading rapidly to the small towns and villages and was becoming aggravated by the alliance of Moslems and Christians. It was reported that Bedouin riders swept down upon the town of Affoule and burned twenty houses. The correspondent said British planes were bombarding all assemblages in Palestine cities and towns. Quai D'orsay announced today that a total of six hundred Jews and Arabs were dead as a result of the Palestine riots since last Friday.

Casualties in the fighting between Jews and Arabs in Palestine continued to mount today. The French foreign office announced it had been advised that six hundred Jews and Arabs had been killed. The wounded mounted to many hundreds.

Tel Aviv Ara Objective.

Tel Aviv, Palentine, August 26—One Jew was killed and twenty injured in an Arab attack on the settlement of Bethalpha, on the Endraelon Plain, a dispatch from Haifa said today. In the fighting at Hebron, eighty Jews were reported killed and forty wounded.

Jerusalem, August 27—The Jewish Telegraph Agency said today the all Jewish city of Tel Aviv appeared to be the next objective in the bloody campaign of the Arab Moslems against the Jewish population of Palestine.

British Troops Employed.

A troop of two hundred British soldiers was rushed to Tel Aviv from Jerusalem and stationed there to help defend the city from a large force of Arabs which was reported to be concentrating in the vicinity.

Berlin, August 27—The Jerusalem correspondent of the Berlin Zeitung Ammitag reported today that Arabs at Motza had burned seven Jews to death mutilated women and tortured men. The Christians at Motza it was reported have marked their houses with a blue cross.

FAMOUS RUSSIAN GENERAL KILLED IN BAD AIR SMASH

Three Die When Russian Army Plane Fell Into Black Sea Include Soviet Commander.

Moscow, Aug. 27—General Jan Fabrizius assistant commander of the Soviet Caucasian army and one of the war heroes during the civil conflicts following the revolution was drowned with two other passengers today when the plane in which they were travelling from Sochi, on the Caucasian coast, to Tiflis fell into the Black Sea.

GRAF ZEPPELIN STARTS FINAL FLIGHT TODAY

Will Complete Circling the World in Twelve Days Flying—Passengers Enthusiastic over Pacific Crossing.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 27—Like some sleeping Leviathan of the air, the Graf Zeppelin swung idly at its mooring mast here today after triumphantly completing the third lap of its earth circling flight, while preparations went forward for the craft to soar away before midnight for Lakehurst, N. J., on the final swing around the globe.

Landed Yesterday

By 5.35 a. m. yesterday the aerial visitor had been made fast, after the Pacific crossing, and the happy passengers descended from the cabin. There was Sir Hubert Wilkins, explorer of many strange lands, who said the trip had been "marvelous" and a "wonderful experience."

To Complete Flight

Twelve days of actual flying, the shortest time in which man has girded the globe, is believed by the Zeppelin officials an achievement almost within sight.

BIG BUS HERE THIS MORNING DREW ATTENTION

One of the most elaborate busses ever seen here, made its appearance in the city today and attracted the attention of everyone, who were greatly impressed by its size and sumptuous furnishings. The bus hails from the state of Ohio and is owned by a private party. It is of white make and is a specially constructed machine, with wheels twice the size of those on an ordinary make of truck. The big highway monster is about three times the length of the average car. What most impressed your reporter was the inside of this huge van. On each side, with windows arranged a la Pullman fashion, reposed sleeping quarters in the form of neat beds, which could be lifted up in the day time and converted into chairs. Yellow colored blinds covered thick glass windows. Instead of the usual stunted seating capacity, the Ohio bus has plush covered chairs, arranged comfortably about the spacious interior. The driver's seat was very comfortable and everything in the nature of controls was directly in front for easy and convenient manipulation.

The party stopped here barely long enough to secure refreshments, of various kinds, and then proceeded on their way to Saint John and other places in the Maritimes.

TORONTO FAIR IS ATTRACTING LARGE NUMBERS

Attendance Records at Big Exhibition Being Made.

BROADCASTING FROM AIR PLANE

The Maritime Exhibit Proves of Great Interest

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 27—With fine weather and an even better show than last year the Canadian National Exhibition is attracting visitors from all parts of the continent and last year's attendance record is sure to be smashed. There are four hundred entries for the Wrigley swim tomorrow and it is being looked forward to with interest. New stunts were pulled off yesterday afternoon when a musical program was broadcasted from an airplane. Empire Pageants staged last evening with the aid of troops from the Royal Canadian Dragoons also were a great hit. The Maritime exhibit located in the Government Building is attracting attention from thousands of visitors. Trade Commissioner Burnaby is in charge and has capable assistants in Robert Innes and W. W. Hubbard. The exhibit includes a large pond, a floating map of the Maritimes and a barrel of the finest cobbler potatoes ever sent out of New Brunswick.

STAGE SET FOR YORK COUNTY ELECTIONS

The stage is practically all set for the York Municipal Elections, which occur on Tuesday of next week and the candidates will go to the polls with interest well keyed up in the various parishes.

In a few places, competition is very keen and expectations are for a stiff fight in the parish of St. Mary's where five candidates are running. No word is forthcoming as yet from North Lake and Prince William. At the former place, Shepherd Buckingham and William Gould two of the old councillors will probably run again, and a possible opponent is Arthur Westmore.

There is only one councillor in the field at Prince William yet, Robert Graham, last year's member. It is presumed that Frank Saunders will also run alongside Graham, though opposition is not expected to materialize.

The other places will furnish some interest in the impending election. In Bright, John T. Christie, and Dr. B. W. Robertson will probably go in by acclamation. The former is an old councillor. In Canterbury, Thomas McMullen and Ernest Gould, two of the former councillors will be uncontested.

Efforts Continue At Hague to Bring Powers to Agree

British Refuse Latest Offer—Snowden States Only Equals Half British Claims—Three Meetings Today in Attempt to Reach Solution—Little Optimism Shown.

THE HAGUE, August 27—Three important meetings today were devoted to an attempt to drag the international reparations conference from the mire of dissention.

The Rhineland occupation powers, France, England and Belgium met at noon. Besides this preparations were being made for the four p. m. meeting of the political commission which was to discuss the possible liberation of the conference from the deadlock.

Meanwhile the climax of today's efforts was expected to be found in the meeting of the six big powers which organized the conference, England, France, Germany, Italy, Belgium and Japan, which is scheduled for six p. m.

Britain Refused Offer.

THE HAGUE, August 26—Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden, British Chancellor of the Exchequer today told the representatives of France, Italy, Belgium and Japan that their offer on division of reparations did not satisfy British claims, but said that he would remain here in case they desired to discuss the matter.

Before his answer had been made, it was semi-officially said in French circles that the four creditor Powers had made their last concessions to the British, but late this afternoon Ambassador Adachi, the Japanese delegate, called on the Chancellor to find out how the negotiations might be continued.

Mr. Snowden in rejecting the offer said that it was the equivalent of only 57 per cent. of the amount Britain claimed as her share.

RUSSIANS MASS STRONG FORCES IN MANCHURIA

Harbin, Manchuria, Aug. 27—Chinese advices from the Manchurian frontier indicated that the Russian "offensive" against border patrols is steadily increasing in strength.

Soviet patrols are constantly crossing the border line on raids the advices said. Unless reinforcements arrive on the frontier shortly the Chinese commanders plan to draft all youths over 17 to strengthen the frontier forces.

The defending Chinese patrols are now outnumbered by three to one, due to the arrival of more Russian forces, it was said. Chinese troops, however, have been reported moving towards the frontier constantly in the last few days.

KILLS HUSBAND

Mexico City, Aug. 26—Mexico's beauty queen, Maia Teresa De Landa, who completed in the 1928 Galveston beauty contest, was in jail last night charged with killing her husband because he was placed on trial for bigamy.

GRAND LODGE MEETS

Windsor, N. S., Aug. 26—Delegates to the Grand Lodge, Maritime domain, Knights of Pythias, registered here today. The sessions will begin tomorrow under Grand Chancellor Ewart C. Atkinson, of Fredericton.

CHINESE WILL SUGGEST NEW TERMS TO SOVIET

Efforts to Avoid War in East May Yet be Successful—Status Quo Ante May be Restored.

Shanghai, Aug. 27—Nanking government authorities have instructed General Chang Hsueh-Liang, dictator of Manchuria, to suggest new terms to the Soviet Union as a basis for a conference to negotiate a peaceful settlement of the Chinese Eastern Railway dispute, it was reported here today.

It was understood that the dwindling prospects of foreign mediation, coupled with the heavy losses suffered by the Chinese Government as a result of the current railway tie-up has convinced the Nanking Government of the advisability of assuming a more conciliatory attitude towards Russia.

Various sources said today that the Nanking Government had instructed General Chang to meet the Soviets half way in their demand that the Chinese Eastern be resorted to an immediate "status quo ante" as one of the conditions making a conference possible. The conditions forwarded to General Chang by the central government included a partial restoration of the status quo and the immediate reinstatement of the Soviet Governmental chiefs who were ousted when the Chinese Government ordered the seizure of the road some two months ago.
