

## FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLAR SALARY FOR "JAWN" J. McGRAW

### Hampstead Give New York Giants Manager Largest Salary in Base- ball History.

San Antonio, Texas, March 25.—President Hempstead, of the New York Giants, announced here today that Manager John J. McGraw has signed a five year contract calling for a salary of \$50,000 a year.

Hempstead said: "McGraw is said to be the highest priced man in baseball, and he deserves to be. He has been with the Giants since 1902, and we hope to have him with the club as long as he remains in baseball."

Previous to signing the contract McGraw's salary was announced as \$30,000 a year.

## STILL IN ATHLETICS BUT IN HIS FORTY-FIFTH YEAR

Philadelphia, March 26.—George Orton, the former Toronto lacrosse player and middle distance runner, who latterly wore the Red and Blue of the University of Pennsylvania, and who has been on the athletic coaching staff at Penn of late years, is the Hans Wagner of soccer.

Orton, who is now 44 years of age, played centre half for the Merion club during the season which closed recently, and his services were of great assistance in the winning of the championship. The Canadian veteran retains much of his speed and agility.

After the age of 33 most soccer players begin to go back, but Orton finds no difficulty in holding his own against the strongest teams in the league. He has a daughter sixteen years of age. In 1896 he was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania and has since become an American citizen.

## TORONTO DENTAL TEAM WON MON- TAGU ALLEN CUP

### Brought Amateur Hockey Trophy East for the First Time in Five Years.

The Dental College hockey team, the champion of the Ontario Hockey Association, won the Allan Cup Monday, when they defeated the Victorias at Winnipeg in the final series by a score of 13 to 12, securing the honors after overtime play. It is six years since the Allan Cup has come to Toronto, and when the Dentals came west they were not conceded a chance, but they pulled through after two of the hardest fought series ever seen in Winnipeg.

The Winnipeg Free Press says: "Winning the Allan Cup on strange ice before a strange crowd which sympathized with their opponents in both the series they had to play in Toronto, the Dentals came through with flying colors as the finest septette that ever represented the Queen City in amateur hockey. Dr. Jerry Laflamme has the distinction of leading the victorious team for the most coveted trophy in Canadian amateur sport. Winnipeg has been compelled to bow down to their superior skill at the game."

Chicago, March 22.—Toronto's world championship hockey team, the Dentals, took the measure of Chicago's All-Star aggregation at the White City Ice Palace tonight, 5 goals to 4. The Canadians displayed by far the best game that has ever been seen in Chicago.

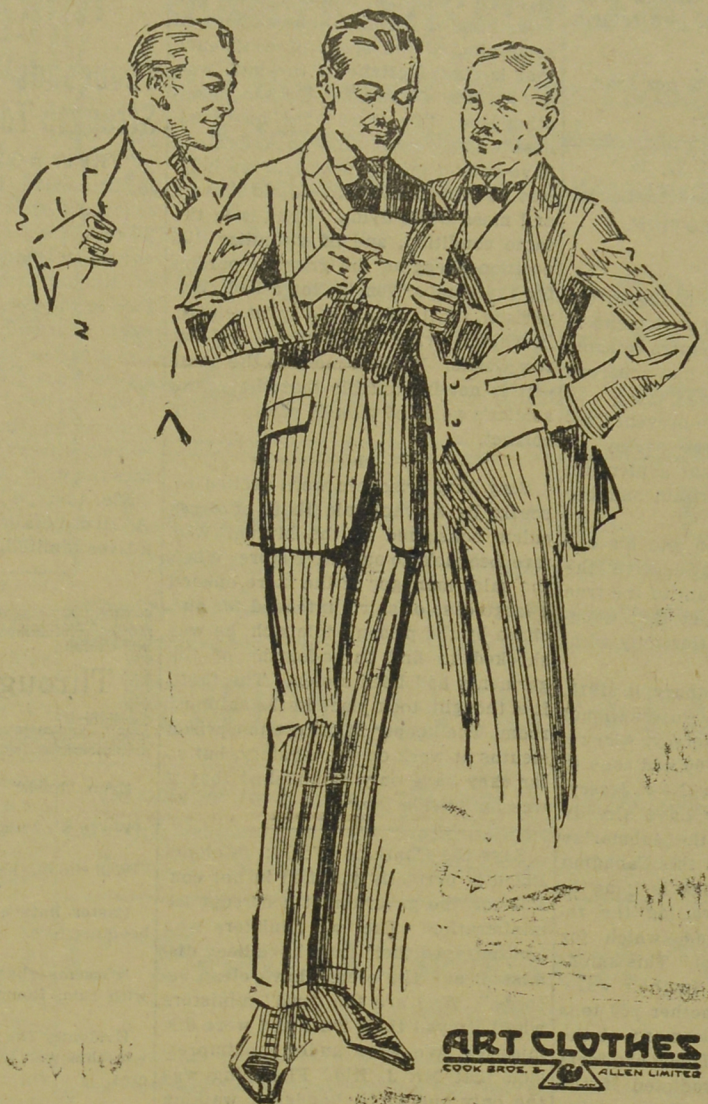

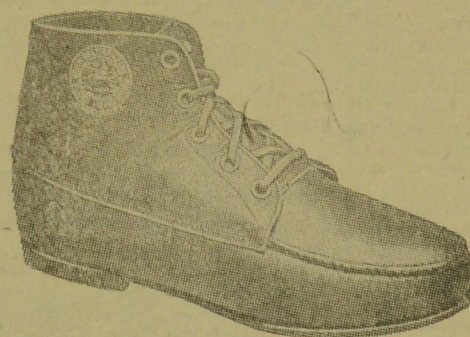
