The Past Week Has Been One of Sex in The City of London

Secret Films, Books and Pamphlets Have All Played a Part—Noted Hygieneics, Social Workers and Religious Leaders Have Taken an Important Part in the Discussion—Shaw Attacks Victorian Fashions.

LONDON, September 14—This has been a week of sex in London, during which secret films, books and pamphlets dealing with the subject of sexual intercourse all have played a part, with noted hygieneics, publicists, social workers and religious leaders taking part in the debates.

Quite a number of speakers at the International Congress of the world League for sexual reform have dealt with modern fashions, with the keynote "be a chic sweet maid and let who will be sexual".

Show the Victorian Fashions.

George Bernard Shaw took up this attitude with on attack on Victorian fashions "A voluptuous woman of the eighteenth century" said Shaw, "was a masterpiece of sex appeal from the crown of her head to the soles of her feet. She had every curve every contour emphasized and upheld. The unpopularity of nudism in England as it is practiced in Australia and elsewhere, is because people still cling to sex appeal. Let women progress toward nudity and sex appeal would vanish. Bring back clothes and it would be increased".

Shaw fed his speech before the Congress by observing that every one was a sexual reformer, even including the pope, who, if at the Congress would be found in agreement, "On nine percents out of ten with Dr. Marie Stope".

PORTRAIT OF CHIEF JUSTICE GIVEN COURT

The presentation of portrait of the late Chief Justice Jonathan Bliss, the second Chief Justice of the New Brunswick Supreme Court, will be made by the Misses O'Dell, great grand children of this city on Friday next, when the judgments of the present session of the Appeal Court will be given out in the Court Chambers in the Parliament Building.

The presentation will be made by the president of the Barrister's Society, C. F. Sandford, of St. John and it is expected that there will be a large gathering of the bar including Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, premier of the province. The Appeal Court in session yesterday completed all but one of the September docket actions and adjourned until Monday to finish. The final case is the much discussed church union dispute over ownership of pews in the St. James Presbyterian church at Newcastle, in which John Ferguson, et al are the plaintiffs and Rev. Lacklin McLean et al are the defendants and appellants. The case was originally heard before Sir Douglas Hazen here in March last. Since Sir Douglas Hazen cannot hear the appeal as the original hearing was taken before him he will be replaced on the case by Justice Barry.

HALIFAX MEN WILL OPPOSE PROHIBITION

Halifax, Sept. 13—Organized opposition to the Nova Scotia Temperance Act, which will be retained or rejected in favor of a Government system of control as a result of the plebiscite to be held Oct. 31, is contained in a manifesto published today as a full page advertisement in a local weekly paper, and signed by a large number of prominent Halifax citizens.

The manifesto says the purpose of the new league is "to promote sound temperance, abolish hypocrisy and restore better moral conditions in the city and throughout the province."

A meeting is called for Tuesday night to form an organization "of those who are convinced of the futility and failure of prohibition and believe that Government control is the best system yet devised for dealing with the liquor question."

The manifesto declares: "This document is signed solely by residents of the city of Halifax, only because the shortness of time available necessitates quick action. It is hoped that the many persons throughout the province, whose views are in accordance with the foregoing, will take similar action in their own districts."

BLOWN AWAY

Bloomfontein, Orange Free State, Sept. 14—A whirlwind is reported to have picked up a flock of 700 sheep on a farm, near Reddoubt, and killed practically all of them. Their mangled bodies were strewn far and wide.

ONTARIO IS NOW GETTING NEEDED RAIN

Toronto, Sept. 13—Rains last night and today were pretty general over Ontario and appear to have definitely broken what will go down in history as the great drought of 1929.

But a week's solid precipitation is required to restore the parched lands and much of the crop is beyond repair. What the rain will do is to help farmers get on with their fall plowing and get the land into shape for next spring's seeding.

A drive yesterday from Hamilton through Guelph to Owen Sound revealed a distressing picture. Much of the fodder crop is hardly worth cutting and straw is everywhere short. There will be a great shortage of feed this winter and the Ontario farmer with a bunch of stock or a dairy herd will have to dig deep in his pocket before the spring pastures are in shape for running cattle. There has been no rain since July. Ensilage corn often stands but knee high. The main root crops, sugar beets and so on, appear to have weathered the drought remarkably well, though, like potatoes, not more than a half crop can be expected. But late sown fields of turnips have literally withered on top of the ground. There is not much orchard country in this section, but farmers report a short apple crop.

FIVE HUNDRED HOUSES BURNED IN ROUMANIA

Bucharest, Sept. 14—Five hundred houses were destroyed by a devastating fire in the city of Targu-Jiu, Roumania, reports reaching here today said. Communications were affected by the conflagration and full details of the disaster were not available.

CENT KEEPS A. C. SET OPERATING THREE HOURS

Nw York, Sept. 14—Radio receiver operation from the light socket costs on the average 1 cent for every three hours used.

This figure will vary in accordance with the local price per kilowatt hour of current, but engineers have accepted 1 cent as fitting most cases. The cost was arrived at with a six tube AC receiver using a heater type detector, four direct filament AC tubes a 371a and a full wave rectifier tube.

From the test it was shown that "electric reception" drew considerably less current than many common electric appliances.

POLAND NOW FRAMING NOTE TO MOSCOW

Will Protest Again Recent Visit of Russian Warships.

CALLED BREACH
OF SOVEREIGNTY
Russian Fleet Nears Polish Coast Without Asking Permission.

Warsaw, Sept. 14—The Polish government was framing a note of protest to Moscow today in connection with a recent visit of Soviet warships in Polish waters. The Warsaw government regarded this as a breach of Polish Sovereignty.

The government charged that the Russian flotilla, consisting of two battleships, one light cruiser and six destroyers, returning from a trip to Germany, neared the Polish coast without tasking permission. It held practice within Polish waters and focused all search lights upon the Polish coast, remaining near the coast throughout the day.

Soviet Destroyer Was Wrecked in Gulf of Finland

Official Denial of Report at Moscow is Not Accepted by News Agency—Disaster Involving Two Destroyers Said to Have Occurred During a Storm Sept. 6th.

LONDON, September 13—Despite Moscow's official denial Exchange Telegraph despatchers from Helsingfor continued to cite reports today indicating that the soviet destroyer "Voikoff" formerly named the Trotsky" had met with disaster in the Gulf of Finland on September 6th.

The dispatches said that during a severe storm two Russian squadrons with flags at half mast were observed from Hoghland Island and later by the Finnish steamer "Susrsaar" towing stern foremost two destroyers of the Noviktype with bows badly crushed. One of these, presumably the Voikoff sank before reaching Kronstadt, the report said.

The body of a sailor, parts of a ship's bridge, a quantity of books, documents, life belts, some marked "Voidoff" and some marked "Trotsky" were washed ashore on the Estonian Coast last Tuesday.

DR. W.J. WRIGHT IS PROVINCIAL MINERALOGIST

Appointment Made at a Meeting of the Government at Saint John Last Night.

St. John, September 14—Dr. William J. Wright, of Bear River, N. S., was appointed Provincial mineralogist at a meeting of the Provincial Government, held Friday night in the Government Building, Saint John. The appointment will go into effect on Oct. 1. The position has been standing vacant for some time and Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., L. D., Premier of the Province, said last night that the position had been finally filled satisfactorily, in the opinion of the Government.

Several appointments and the decision to float a bond issue for provincial purposes occupied the attention of the meeting as well as routine matters.

Griffen, of Moncton, provincial constable; Gilbert S. Gee, of Victoria county, auctioneer; John M. Pickford, of Grand Falls, chairman of revisors; Albert Dickison, Northumberland county, issuer of marriage licenses; John B. Bellefleur, of Madawaska, auctioneer.

Bond Issue

Tenders will be called on Sept. 25 for the issue of \$2,720,000 provincial bonds for 39 years from Oct. 7 at 5 per cent. The bonds will be payable in Canada and the United States and are being floated to cover the expenditure on roads, bridges, the University of New Brunswick and to complete the construction of the Provincial Hospital extension.

LITTLE SON OF THE PREMIER RETURNS HOME

Has Quite Recovered From Injuries Sustained by a Fall a Few Weeks Ago.

John Baxter, Four-year-old son of Premier and Mrs. Baxter, has returned to the family residence in Rothesay from the General Public Hospital, where he has been a patient since his accident on July 31. Although still under treatment, the little lad is rapidly recovering from the effects of the fall in which he was very severely injured. The grave fears which were held at first have happily vanished and little John will be well and strong again. Heartfelt sympathy went out to the Premier and his family when it was learned of the child's misfortune and there is general rejoicing in the knowledge that little John is well on the way to recovery.

Word of the accident went abroad and among those who were specially sorrowful in receiving the news was Miss Marshall Saunders, of Toronto, author of "Beautiful Joe," the story of a dog, which has already passed the 1,000,000 mark in the number of copies printed. Miss Saunders had been in Saint John attending the meeting of the Canadian Women's Press Club earlier in the summer and she sent to young John Baxter a copy of that book with her autographed photograph inside and the following written greeting:

Dear John Baxter,—I am so sorry to hear you are ill. Your father was so good to our Press Club Women that I feel I must send this little present to his son Hoping you may soon be well again.
