War Between Great Britain and United States Unthinkable

Some High Lights on the Joint Statement Issued by President Hoover and Premier MacDonald—Distrusts and Suspicions Must Cease to Influence National Policy in Future.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10—High lights of the joint statement issued by President Hoover and Prime Minister MacDonald follow:

"War between United States and Great Britain is unthinkable."

"Distrusts and suspicions arising from doubts and fears must now cease to influence national policy."

"Both our governments resolve to accept the Kellogg peace pact not only as a declaration of good intentions but as a positive obligation to direct national policy in accordance with its pledge"

Invitation Accepted

Washington, Oct. 10—The state department today announced acceptance of the British Government's invitation to the London Naval Conference to be held next January.

BANDIT KING HAS FLED BY AIRPLANE

Abandoned the Throne When Afghanistan Capital Was Invaded by Troops of Nadir Khan.

London, Oct. 10—Bacha Sakoa, the bandit king of Afghanistan, has fled from Kabul by airplane for some unknown destination, said a dispatch printed in the Daily Express today from Delhi, India.

Following closeup on dispatches from Peshawar confirming the fall of Kabul and the invasion of the Afghan capital by the force of Nadir Khan, the report of Sakoa's flight was taken to indicate that Sakoa had resolved to abandon the throne after a revolt within the capital itself made it impossible to defend the city against the enemy.

REMEMBERS STEPPING ON A HOT IRON

FREDERICTON FIRM AWARDED TWO CONTRACTS

Colter & Flemming Will Complete the Baker Brook Bridge—Kings clear Bridges to Have Concrete Flooring.

A contract for completing the sub-structure for the Baker Brook Bridge on the road between Edmundston and St. Francis, in the village of Baker Brook, Madawaska County, has been awarded to Colter and Fleming, Fredericton, the approximate price being \$7,000.

A contract for construction of the sub-structure and approaches for the Baker Brook Bridge was originally awarded in the month of June to the firm of McLaughlin and Hitchcock, of Ortonville, N. B., but the contract has been cancelled and a new one awarded to the firm of Colter and Fleming.

Contracts for reinforced concrete flooring systems for two new bridges now under construction on the Trans-Canada Highway, No. 2., as it passes along the Saint John River Valley in York County, have also been awarded by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works. The flooring system for the Garden Creek Bridge will be installed by Colter and Fleming, of Fredericton, while Whitman Brewer, of Devon, will install the reinforced concrete flooring system on the new Long's Creek Bridge. The contract price for the flooring systems for these two bridges is about \$1,100. In each case.

AFGHAN KING IS BESIEGED IN THE ARK

CAMPBELLTON MAN KILLED BY A TRAIN

M. A. Kelly, Police Magistrate of Campbellton and Native of York County Met a Tragic Death.

Campbellton, Oct. 9—Residents of this town and other North Shore points were shocked this evening by the tragic death of M. A. Kelly, police magistrate of Campbellton for the last two years, who was killed at 5.40 p. m. today when a fast freight, northbound, crashed into his automobile at the eastern township level crossing, known as McIntyre's Crossing. While details from eye-witnesses of the accident were not available tonight, it is reported that the motor of automobile stalled and the unfortunate man remained at the wheel in a vain endeavor to get the machine off the tracks. The body was brought to Steeves' undertaking parlors in Campbellton and Dr. L. E. German, coroner was notified. Dr. German decided that he would hold an inquest tomorrow morning. Magistrate Kelly is survived by one son, who resides in Hamilton, Ont. Mrs. Kelly pre-deceased her husband last fall.

Native of Stanley

The late Mr. Kelly was a native of Stanley, York County, and a brother of Ex-Coun. Havelock Kelly of that place. The late Duncan Kelly of this city was another brother and Ellis Kelly of Kingsclear is a cousin. Mr. Kelly had been a resident of Campbellton about twenty years. Previous to that he resided for a time in Fredericton where he carried on a shoe business and later was a resident of Doaktown. On removing to Campbellton he was for a time associated with the Restigouche Log Driving and Boom Company in a secretarial capacity. Meanwhile he took up the study of law and soon afterwards admitted to the bar he became sitting police magistrate of Campbellton. Two years ago on the death of F. F. Matheson, he was appointed Police Magistrate.

Throughout his life Mr. Kelly was actively engaged in church work. He was an elder of St. Andrew's United Church in which he had also been for many years prominent in Sunday school work. Mr. Kelly was also an active exponent of temperance, and was one of the most ardent workers for the prohibition cause on the North Shore.

Interest in Series

PRESIDENT OF FRANCE WILL VISIT BELGIUM

Left Paris This Morning in Company With Premier Briand.

LUXURIOUS ROYAL TRAIN

The Entire Cabinet Gave Them a Rousing Send Off.

Paris, Oct. 10—President Gaston Doumergue and Premier Aristide Briand left at 10.30 A. M. today aboard the Royal Train of King Albert of Belgium for an official visit to Brussels. The entire French cabinet gave the President and the Premier a cordial send off. The train luxuriously fitted in marble and green velvet, was brought here yesterday. President Doumergue is the third French President to visit Belgium.

WILL FLY FROM SPAIN TO URUGUAY

Madrid, Oct. 10—A trans-Atlantic flight from Seville to South America will be attempted shortly by Lieut. Col. Larre Bourges, of Uruguay, and Capt. eLon Challe, French flier, the newspaper El Debate announced. Larre Bourges attempted the same flight two year ago and was forced to land at Gold River, where he was seized and held captive by natives until released by the Spanish Government officials.

MINE WORKERS MEETING AT MARSEILLES

Marseilles, Oct. 10—The congress of the National Federation of Mine Workers, representing the majority of the miners in France started sessions today. The agenda was composed of all important mining questions including the world's production and coal to be delivered under the reparations agreements.

Diteman's Plane Seized by Nfld Customs Sleuths

Landed at Lester Field, St. Johns, Without the Usual Permit—Had Flown From New York to Fredericton—Has Been Ordered to Make a Full Report Before Proceeding.

ST. JOHNS, NFLD., Oct. 10—An airplane which arrived here from New York yesterday was held by Customs officials today pending a satisfactory report from its owner and pilot U. F. Diteman.

Diteman's plane was seized when he landed at Lester Field here without usual landing permits. He explained he was unaware of the necessity of a permit as he was a resident of New Brunswick, Canada. He left New York two weeks ago flying to Fredericton, N. B., then here. Customs officials ordered him to make full report before proceeding.

THE EXPORT OF HARDWOOD IS INCREASING

Exports to the United States Nearly Double That of Corresponding Quarter of Last Year.

Exports from the Fredericton district to the United States for the quarter ending September 30th showed a falling off of \$28,442.86 in comparison with the same period of last year according to a statement handed out to-

day by Frederick C. Johnson, American Vice-Consul here. The total value of exports was \$345,920.49 as compared with \$374,363.09 for the third quarter of last year.

The largest item of exports was spruce lumber which totalled \$167,090.49, as compared with \$192,716.00 for the corresponding period of last year. Exports of hardwood showed an increase, the value being \$80,920.18, as against \$42,156.77 last year. Laths totalled \$35,626 as against \$46,915.19, and pine \$31,747.24 as against \$44,761.97. Hemlock exports totalled \$8,755 as against \$7,740.64.

The export of cattle and race horses totalled \$11,100 as against \$22,500 in 1928. Shoeboxes to the value of \$2,108 were exported as against \$5,188.06 last year. Fresh vegetable exports totalled \$606.

Returned American goods were valued at \$20,560.13 as against \$34,790.36 in 1928. Raw cotton imports totalled \$14,407.13 as against \$3,608.51.

Says Foxx There

R. MacKenzie, Philadelphia sportsman, who has been hunting on the Miramichi for the past couple of weeks, was in the city yesterday and listened in on the second World Series game. Mr. MacKenzie is a personal friend of "Bing" Miller, the Athletics' hard hitting right fielder and also is well acquainted with Jimmy Foxx, who has thus far proved such a nemesis to the Cubs' pitchers. The gentleman stated yesterday that Foxx should keep right on hitting against Malone, Bush, Root, etc. as he is naturally a fast ball hitter. He said, however that a good curve ball pitcher ought to have no difficulty with the youthful Foxx, as all during the season he was weak when opposed by a good curve ball. Bing Miller in the Philadelphia man's opinion could hit any kind of pitching when in the mood.

PROVINCIAL POLICEMEN GOT THEIR MAN

Quebec Rum Runner Convicted at Edmundston on a Charge of Dynamiting Home of Customs Officer.

Edmundston, Oct. 9—A relentless search extending over a period of more than two years and covering the entire east of Canada and northern United States was brought to a successful termination here today

when Leon Lavoie, of Quebec was convicted in the Madawaska Court before Mr. Justice LeBlanc on the charge of using explosives with intent to do grievous bodily injury, on June 14, 1927. The prisoner was remanded until tomorrow for sentence.

Lavoie had been pursued by the provincial police under the command of Sergeant Leech stationed at Edmundston, since the night of June 14, 1927, when it is charged, the prisoner placed dynamite under the foundation wall of the garage attached to the home of Preventive Officer Willie F. Pickard who was evidently considered the instrumental party in bringing about the seizure of a \$25,000 load of alcohol which Lavoie had brought to Edmundston from Quebec the explosion occurred at 2 o'clock in the morning when the officer and his family were asleep in the house.

Had Narrow Escape

It was said at the time that but two feet separated the Pickard family from death as the charge of explosive was placed two feet short of the main building. The garage was wrecked and the officer's car badly damaged.

Clues were picked up by the provincial police here and the man hunt was launched. Through the northern section of the province the prisoner was tracked, down through the state of Maine and eventually into the province of Quebec. He was captured in Quebec City and brought to Edmundston in July of this year when he was brought up for preliminary hearing before Magistrate Hebert and was committed for trial.

It was brought out at the trial today that Lavoie was acting at the time of the blast in a spirit of revenge the prisoner was charged under section III of the Criminal Code which calls for a maximum of life sentence.
