An Attempt Made on The Life of Queen Marie of Roumania

A Workman Under Arrest Charged With an Attempt to Wreck a Train on Which She Was Travelling—Was Placing Iron Bars Across the Track—Broke Away But Was Recaptured.

LONDON, October 22—A purported attempt on the life of Queen Marie of Roumania was reported in a dispatch from the Daily Mail's Bucharest correspondent today.

A brief dispatch stated that a workman named Gyori had been arrested at Temesvar, Roumania, charged with attempting to wreck your Queen's train enroute to Temesvar. Gyori was seized while he was placing two iron bars across the railroad tracks outside of the city.

The workman broke away from his captors on his way to a police headquarters for questioning but later was recaptured. He refused to explain his act.

A SHIPMENT OF CATTLE IS DELAYED

Outbreak in England of Animal Disease, Aftosa, the Cause of the Trouble.

London, Oct. 22—Thirty head of short horn cattle and sheep belonging to the Prince of Wales, have been delayed in shipment to the Prince's ranch in Canada because of an outbreak in England of the animal disease, aftosa. Breeders with cattle ready for shipment to Canada cabled Premier MacDonald at Ottawa requesting him to use his influence to persuade Canadian authorities to allow the stock to enter.

PERSONNEL OF LABOR CABINET

Canberra, Australia, Oct. 22—The new Australian Labor government was formed today by Prime Minister James Henry Scullin. The cabinet will include Edward Theodore, Treasurer, Frank Brennan, Attorney General, James Fenton, Trade and Customs, Arthur Blakeley, Home Minister, Parker Maloney, Markets and Transportation and Albert Green, Minister of Defence.

M. POINCARE MAKING GOOD RECOVERY

Paris, Oct. 22—Former Premier Raymond Poincare who underwent a second operation for removal of the prostate gland yesterday is making a satisfactory recovery, a bulletin issued by his physicians said today.

The bulletin signed by Doctors Marion, Gausset and Berdin, said "Poincare is progressing as well as possible. He passed a satisfactory night."

HOOVER PAYS A TRIBUTE TO GREAT INVENTOR

Dearborn, Mich., Oct. 21—Commemorating the 15th anniversary of the perfection of the electric lamp, President Hoover paid tribute here tonight to the tireless zeal and patience of this country's inventive genius that has lifted drudgery from the shoulders of mankind.

With the aged and eminent inventor, Thomas A. Edison, at his side. Mr. Hoover said every American owned this genius "not alone a debt for the great benefit he has brought to mankind but also a debt for the honor he has brought to our country."

The ceremonies at which the President spoke, attended by many prominent citizens in various fields, also dedicated the Edison Institute of Technology the gift of Henry Ford.

Before Mr. Hoover spoke, he had witnessed an unusual contrast of circumstances that years can bring when he watched the now ageing and distinguished Edison construct the first lamp as he did, a young, hopeful ambitious but unknown inventor 50 years ago.

Standing by the inventor in the same laboratory Edison used a half century ago, brought here by Mr. Ford, the President saw how the soft glow of delicate vibrating wires ushered in the age of light.

SWISS POWER PLANT WILL EXCEL RECORD

Lausanne, Oct. 22—Switzerland's own record of the highest waterfall harnessed to generate electricity will be broken by the new Dixence power plant. An artificial lake at an elevation of 6,600 feet will drop water 5,600 feet to the power station. The plant will cost \$15,000,000.

SALARY DOUBLED

Los Angeles, Oct. 22—Tex Guiana's assertion that she is capable of earning \$5,000 a week as an actress is denied by the Los Angeles Railway Corporation in its answer to her suit for personal injuries.

SOVIET WILL OCCUPY THE CHINESE RY.

London, Oct. 22—The soviet government has decided to occupy the Chinese Eastern Railroad and also Harbin within a month, said a dispatch printed in the Morning Post from Riga today. The Post correspondent announced that this important decision was reached at a recent meeting of Soviet chiefs held in Kremlin under the chairmanship of the head of the Government, Joseph Stalin.

WOUNDED MOOSE EXPIRES IN A CEMETERY

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 21—The death throes of a moose almost disrupted a funeral service being held at River John on Sunday, according to reports made by local game officers here this morning. While the funeral services were about to commence in the River John cemetery a shot was heard in the woods and a few moments later a moose staggered from the underbrush and fell dead in the burial grounds. No one claimed the animal. The shooting is being investigated by Chief Warden W. F. Beatty and his staff.

ANNE LINDBERGH NOW DRIVES CAR

Mineola, N. Y., Oct. 22—Col. Lindbergh has taught his bride to run an automobile as well as an airplane. She has passed a test driving up and down the street a couple of times under the eyes of an inspector, after making a solo flight to Mineola from Roosevelt field.

WAGE DISPUTE HAS REACHED A DEADLOCK

Over 150,000 Workmen in Bradford District are Affected

REJECTED WAGE REDUCTION

A Meeting of All Wood Unions is Called for Saturday.

Bradford, Eng., Oct. 22—The wool textile wage dispute, involving more than 150,000 workmen in the Bradford region reached a deadlock today with the rejection by operatives of the employers demand for an 8.3 per cent wage reduction.

Operatives announced they would consent to no further negotiations with the employers and immediately called a meeting of all wool unions for Saturday to discuss the situation.

JOHN M'DOWELL PASSES AWAY AT TRURO, N.S.

Truro, N. S., Oct. 21—John McDowell, said to be the oldest locomotive engineer in Canada, died at his home here today in his eighty-ninth year. He was born at River John, Pictou county, in May, 1841. He retired from the service of the Government railways 18 years ago. A year or so ago he was struck by an automobile while crossing a street and was confined to his bed until his death.

He is survived by his wife, three sons and three daughters.

BOYS' CLUB FORMED

Former Czarist Generals Had to Face Firing Squad

Held High Positions in Industry Under the Soviet Regime in Russia and Were Charged With Espionage—Other Accused Men Given Prison Sentences.

MOSCOW, October 22—Five former Czarist generals, who held important positions in industry and in the military under the Soviet regime, have been executed for acts against the state, an official announcement today said.

The five were put to death by the State secret service. They were V. S. Mikaloff, N. G. Visochunsky, V. L. Dimman, V. N. Dekhanoff, and N. V. Shulga.

All were charged with several others with espionage willful destruction of war industry property and conspiracy to prepare militia intervention. The other accused men were given prison sentences, the announcement said.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE SENATE ARE DELAYED

Ottawa, Oct. 21—What will be probably the last Cabinet Council before Premier King tours Western Canada, will be held tomorrow. The visit of Premier Ramsay MacDonald and the appeal of British Columbia for reduced freight rates prevented any regular meetings of the Cabinet during the past week and there is much routine business to be disposed of.

It is probable that the rates appeal will be discussed in camera tomorrow.

Another question before the Cabinet is that the Senate appointments. The Privy Council in London having decided that women are eligible for appointment to the Upper Chamber, there will be, no doubt, some discussion on the judgment.

There are five vacancies in the Senate, two in Ontario, two in Quebec and one in Manitoba.

Premier King's visit to Western Canada takes place next month. Several members of the Cabinet will be in the west at the same time and they will take part in their respective provinces in the public appearances of the Premier.

7 VOLCANOES ARE REPORTED IN ERUPTION

Khabarovik, U.S.S.R., Oct. 22—Eruption of seven volcanoes in the mountainous Kamchatka peninsula region was reported here today. There was considerable loss of life and property. The eruptive cones were gushing gas, lava and flames.

LIVELY TIME AT RICHELIEU NOMINATION

Three Candidates Chosen to Contest Vacant Seat for the Quebec Legislature.

Sorel, Que., Oct. 21—Turbulent scenes of an almost unprecedented nature in local politics marked the nomination here this afternoon of three candidates to contest the provincial seat in Richelieu county vacated by the resignation recently of the sitting member to accept a Government appointment.

Alderman J. C. Turcotte, Sorel tugboat owner, was the choice of the supporters of the Government but another Liberal, Urie Girouard Mayor of St. Urs, was also nominated with the declaration that he was going to support the Taschereau Government as long as I find it good but wholly independent of the Sorel trust.

Herve Lariviere, Sorel butcher and farmer was the unanimous choice of the Conservatives, having been chosen at the convention held yesterday at St. Victoire.

The outdoor meeting, held in a public square following the nomination ceremonies, was attended by some 5,000 people, said by old campaigners to be the largest gathering of its kind in the political history of the country. First fights started among the crowd almost as soon as the speeches began and continued to develop through the afternoon, making it almost impossible for the speakers to make themselves heard and at times threatening to develop into a complete riot.

The small force of four local policemen were totally inadequate to control the milling crowds and at times fights were in progress at a dozen different points.
