THE REAL ISSUE.

Electors from York and Sunbury who will assemble in Fredericton this week to select candidates for the House of Commons, should read and digest the following from the Halifax Chronicle, a staunch Liberal newspaper:

"This is not the time for political and partisan dispute. This is not the time to apportion the blame for the state to which politics has brought this country. Let that wait on victory. Just so sure as the sun shines in the heavens, there will be a reckoning for those who, during this war, played politics to the verge of hell. But our business for the moment is with the Hun. He is at the gate. Let us get together and drive him away, and let us have vengeance upon those leaders who have played false to the trust which we imposed upon them. They cannot escape. The uttermost parts of the earth will not shelter them. They shall reap what they have sowed, if we but await the harvest time.

"This is not the time for partisan dispute. This is not the time for political vengeance. Russia has quit. Roumania has collapsed. Italy may be beaten to her knees. France, noble France, is at her maximum strength. The United States is not yet ready to make her might felt, and Britain, our Motherland, the home of our forefathers, needs our help. Shall we give it speedily or shall we pause to take a referendum six months from now to ascertain if we should then send that help which is so urgently needed now? And that with 'the very existence of civilization' at stake. No, a thousand times no."

SHOULD GET TOGETHER.

Both parties are to hold conventions in this city during the present week, with the object of taking some action in regard to the political situation. Political affairs in York-Sunbury are somewhat muddled, and it is difficult to tell at this stage what measure of success will attend the diplomatic efforts now being put forth to avoid a contest. Col. McLeod, who has represented York for the past four years, will, it is understood, be a candidate for re-election, and, strange as it may seem, the most serious opposition to his candidature emanates from among those who formerly supported him. The Colonel, since his return from overseas, has not enjoyed his usual robust health, but this ought not to count against him. It cannot be denied that he has been a potent political force in this county on behalf of the Conservative party, as his Liberal opponents know to their cost. It is to be earnestly hoped that the parties to the negotiations now being carried on will keep their heads and strive by every legitimate means to avoid a contest.

The local campaign on behalf of the Loan is meeting with a success quite beyond all anticipations. The canvassers have been very active since Monday morning, but they have many people yet to call upon. The terms under which the loan is being issued are now known to all, and people should have their minds made up as to how many bonds they will subscribe for before the canvassers call. It should be borne in mind that the canvassers are doing their work voluntarily and should not be told to call a second time.

The late Senator Sproule, who died recently, was for nearly five years Speaker of the House of Commons. He was looked upon as one of the most respected characters in Parliament, and although he was a rigid disciplinarian regarding the duties of his office, he was when the silk gown was cast off, jovial, friendly and companionable. Speaker Sproule presided over the House during the stormy scenes which followed the introduction of the Borden naval bill, when Parliament sat continuously for two weeks.

"Chubby" Power, a returned soldier and son of Mr. William Power, ex-M. P., has been chosen as the Liberal candidate in a Quebec city constituency. Though a returned soldier, strange to

say, he has declared against conscription.

Mr. George M. Byron, of Campbellton, who was selected as a union candidate in Charlotte county some days ago, has been turned down by the Conservatives. The Liberals will hold a convention tomorrow to deal with the situation.

Halifax Liberals at a convention last night nominated Mr. George A. Redmond and Dr. E. Blackadar as their candidates. The unionist convention adjourned for a day without arriving at a choice.

Hon. W. S. Fielding was yesterday nominated as the Liberal candidate in Queens-Shelburne, N. S. Mr. F. B. McCurdy was chosen by the Conservatives. The latter has also been nominated in Colchester.

INTEREST IN VICTORY LOAN INCREASING

Reports from all sections of York and Sunbury counties indicate that the Victory Loan campaign is being received well by all classes. The local headquarters are not in position to announce any figures yet but the farmers evidently recognize the value of the bonds as an investment. In the city of Fredericton the campaign also is meeting with success.

CASES BEFORE SUPREME COURT

COMPULSORY VACCINATION IS ORDERED

Provincial Board of Health Took Drastic Steps Last Night at a Special Session.

The Provincial Board of Health met last night at the Queen Hotel and decided upon the drastic step of compulsory vaccination and re-vaccination in the districts of Victoria, Carleton and York counties infected with smallpox. The city of Fredericton is one of the districts in which compulsory vaccination is ordered. Local Boards of Health will carry out the instructions of the Provincial Board in accordance with the lowwowing resolution passed last night:

Whereas, a epidemic of smallpox is known to exist at present in many sections of the state of Maine, and

Whereas, an epidemic of smallpox case at present exists in several sections of a direct result of infection from the epidemic in the state of Maine, and

Whereas, it is considered necessary in the interest of the public health of the province to use adequate measures to prevent the further spread of this disease and compulsory vaccination and re-vaccination being deemed the most effective measure of obtaining this desired result, therefore

Be it resolved, that compulsory vaccination and re-vaccination be ordered under the provision of Section 39 of the Public Health Act of 1911, to be enforced by the local Boards of Health in the health district of the city of Fredericton; in the parishes of Bright and Douglas in the health district of the county of York; in the communities of East Florenceville, Florenceville and Bristol in the health district of the county of Carleton; and in the health district of the county of Victoria.

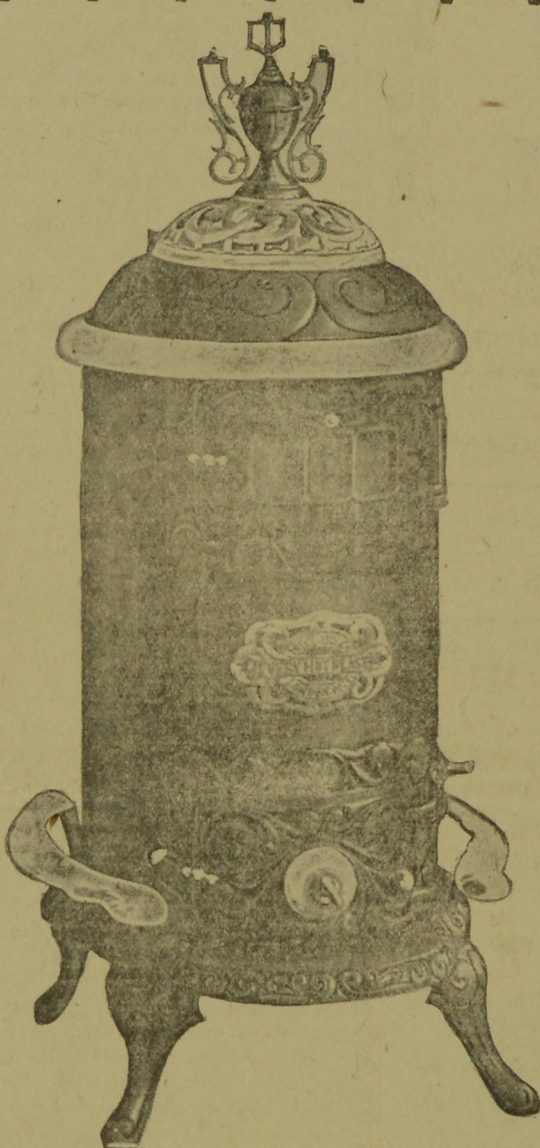

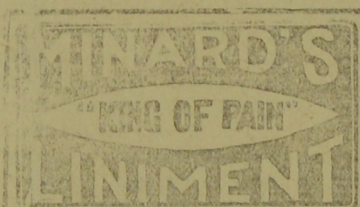
