Mr. Ralph Shepherd of this city has consented to act as interpreter in the Victory Loan Campaign, for the purpose of explaining to some of the foreign residents of Fredericton the meaning and the advantages of the loan.

**Mid-Week Market**  
There was a fairly good market this morning and much farm produce was disposed of. Chickens were in demand at from \$1.25 to \$2 per pair. Live chickens sold at \$1.75 per pair. Apples brought \$2 and \$2.50 per barrel, turnips \$1, carrots \$1.50, butter 50 cents, eggs 50 cents, beef 10 and 12 cents pork 20 and 22 cents.

**Coming to Headquarters.**  
Col. F. McK. Bell, who has been acting A.D.M.S. while New Brunswick was a part of military district No. 6, arrived in St. John yesterday from Halifax. He is there in connection with the military armory hospital and the activities of "K" unit. He will remain for a few days and then come to Fredericton, the headquarters of "K" Unit, M.H.C.C.

**Taken to Fairville.**  
Sheriff A. R. Foster and Deputy Sheriff H. V. Moores of Woodstock, went to Fairville yesterday with William Glenn, who shot and killed Harry Wiley in Carleton county last summer. Glenn was found guilty at the last term of the Carleton County circuit court but was adjudged to be insane and was ordered to be confined in the Provincial Hospital.

**Tribunal at Work.**  
Tribunal No. 54 under the Military Service Act is having lengthy sessions and a large number of applications for exemption from service have been made before it. Yesterday eleven applications were settled and nine adjourned until the 21st. This morning ten cases were settled, nine applications being allowed and one going over until January 1st.

**New Attorney**  
Mr. W. J. Shea, B. A., B.C.L., principal of St. Peter's school St. John was in Fredericton yesterday to be sworn in an attorney of the supreme court. Mr. Shea recently graduated from the King's College Law School, Mr. Shea formerly belonged to Fredericton and is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick. Some years ago he was principal of the Fredericton Junction School.

**Those Not Registered**  
Under new Military Service regulations all Class One men who fail to comply with the proclamation are absent without leave. Such men will be delivered into military custody for transportation to the depot battalion. The men delivered will be immediately examined by a medical board and all Category A men and such B. and C. men as can usefully be employed will be granted leave of absence for one week. All men may claim exemption through the G. O. C.

**Administration of Justice**  
The Administration of Justice Committee of the City Council met Monday night. In regard to dispute between the city and the U. N. B. concerning the ownership of a lane off University Avenue, Mr. George Bidlake was instructed to search the records and report to the city council. It was decided to call for tenders for the printing of the index of the codified acts of legislation. The matters of closing Brick Kiln Road and of the alleged trespass of Searle & Lamson on city property was referred to the chairman to secure information.

**J. V. Kierstead Wounded.**  
Mrs. J. Vernon Kierstead, 236 Lancaster avenue, St. John, has received notification from Ottawa that her husband, Lieut. J. V. Kierstead, had been officially reported admitted to the British Red Cross hospital, Nov. 6th, seriously ill from gunshot wound in the knee. The wounded officer enlisted in the 104th Battalion, and in last August crossed to France in a draft to the 26th. In a letter, under date of Oct. 28th, to his wife, Lieut. Kierstead referred to his enjoying a fine rest before returning to the trenches. Formerly a traveller for the T. H. Estabrooks Company, Lieut. Kierstead enjoyed a large circle of friends, who will hear of his injuries with regret. He was a frequent visitor to Fredericton.

SGT. W. J. BUTLER  
KILLED IN ACTION  
WITH INFANTRY

Formerly Color Sergt. of "H" Co., R. C. R.—Pte. Dorian Pond Wounded a Second Time.

Sergt. W. J. Butler of Fredericton, reported killed in action was formerly color sergeant of "H" Company, Royal Canadian Regiment, in this city. He was transferred to Halifax as color sergeant of "A" Company in the same regiment. Later he went to the United States where he served in the American army taking part in the operations in Mexico. On the outbreak of the war in Europe he deserted in an attempt to reach Canada and rejoin the Canadian forces but was captured and served a term in prison. Finally he got clear of the United States army and made his way to British Columbia where he joined the C.E.F. soon getting the rank of sergeant instructor. He went to England about a year ago. While stationed in Fredericton he married Miss Etienne.

**Private Dorian Pond.**  
Word was received this morning that Private Dorian Pond of Fredericton, had been wounded a second time. He is reported with gunshot wounds in hip and arm. He left Canada in the autumn of 1914 as a bandsman. He was a former member of the 71st York Regt. band.

**Private Thomas H. Coward.**  
Private Thomas H. Coward also is reported wounded. He left Fredericton some years ago and located in the west where he joined an infantry battalion about two years ago. Private Coward's relatives reside here. He is remembered here as a long distance runner and a baseball and hockey player.

Thirty-three Cases of Smallpox Now in Province—Old Rainsford Property for Isolation Hospital.

Thirty-three cases of smallpox now exist in the province with suspected cases bringing the total up to thirty-five. The order for compulsory vaccination in the infected districts of Victoria, Carleton and York counties has been issued and probably will be acted upon at once by the local boards of health.

**Rounded Up at Lakeville Corner.**  
The provincial board today took steps to have a number of contacts rounded up at Lakeville Corner, Sunbury county. These were at the Waverley Hotel in this city but got away on Friday last. They have been vaccinated and will be kept under quarantine for a time.

**Taking Precautions.**  
The Fredericton Board of Health met last evening. Three guards are on at the Waverley Hotel. The guards are John Jones, John Markey and Ernest Parent, all returned soldiers. Steps were taken to secure an isolation hospital. The old Rainsford property now owned by Mr. Robert Gay has been secured for both city and county. A report that a case of smallpox had been discovered at the Waverley is not correct. Mr. Rainsford Allen who was removed from this city to Burt's Corner some days ago is reported to be seriously ill now.
