The Reparations Problem Has Been Settled at Last

Four Months of Untiring Negotiations by the Allied Creditor Powers Has Resulted in Success—An Important Announcement Made by Thomas W. Lamont of the U. S. Delegation—What Germany Will Pay.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

PARIS, June 1—The Reparations Problem has been settled. Thomas W. Lamont, American banker announced today that the experts of seven nations, after struggling for practically four months with the complicated problem of how much Germany shall pay for the world war, had at last reached a financial agreement.

Germany has settled, in effect for \$8,808,000,000 cash. That is if she paid the entire sum today, she would turn over that amount in gold.

The money will be paid on the installment plan, however, and within the next 59 years Germany will pay an average of about \$488,000,000 annually that is the allies will actually get about \$28,000,000,000 interest being figured at five per cent.

Paris, June 1—Germany and the allied creditor powers after nearly four months of untiring negotiations, today reached complete agreement on all points involved in settling the huge post war reparation problem.

The announcement was made at 1.30 p. m. today by Thomas W. Lamont, one of the principal members of the unofficial American delegation. Mr. Lamont said that the principal question which had been holding up the negotiations lately that of the Belgian franc claim against Germany would be left up to Berlin and Brussels to be settled by direct negotiations.

The agreement probably will be signed early next week.

CHINESE WAR LORD PLANS TO VISIT CANADA

London, June 1—According to Peking despatches to the London Daily Telegraph, Marshall Feng Yu-Hsiang, one of the most powerful war lords in China has left on a special train for Tientsin, and that he plans to visit Canada, the United States and Great Britain.

The despatches said he would consult foreign physicians about serious maladies from which the Marshal was reported to be suffering.

THE BANK OF MONTREAL HAS MADE A RECORD

The half yearly statement of the Bank of Montreal, shows how closely the bank is keeping pace with the rapid expansion of trade and industry throughout the Dominion. The statement is a record one, even for the premier institution.

Among the outstanding features are: Total assets well above the \$900,000,000 mark—the largest in the history of the bank; current loans, reflecting business to expand; capital and reserve, following the recent further issue of stock, are at a new high level.

As a result of the larger resources at the bank's disposal, and activity in business, profit gained at a more rapid rate than usual. Notwithstanding the greater demand for funds, the bank has maintained its usual strong position and reports liquid assets of almost 60 per cent of total liabilities to the public.

TO LOSE EXTRA TERRITORIAL IMMUNITIES

Moscow, June 1—The Moscow Embassy of the Chinese Nationalist Government and Nationalist Consulates throughout the Soviet Union were deprived of Normal extra territorial immunities today by the Soviet Government.

The action was the result of alleged provocations which were climaxed by the raid of the Soviet Consulate at Harbin this week and the arrest of more than forty persons, including two Soviet consul generals.

THE HEAT WAVE IN NEW YORK IS SUBSIDING

New York, June 1—Relief appeared possible today from the heat which has harassed the metropolitan area for four days.

Ten persons lost their lives yesterday, chiefly because of the heat, and eighteen others were overcome. It was the hottest day of the year here with the thermometer touching 90 degrees at 3 p. m.

NEW U.S. TARIFF IS BAD FOR N. B. SPUD GROWERS

Hon. B. F. Smith Thinks the Canadians Should Legislate in Their own Interests.

St. John, May 31—The potato growers along the Saint John river valley will be seriously affected by the changes made recently in the United States tariff, and this country should take measures to retaliate, it was said here yesterday by B. Frank Smith, M. L. A., of East Florenceville, N. B. Mr. Smith, who is organizer for the present Government party, intimated that there would be no provincial election this year, although no definite statement in this subject was forthcoming.

The U. S. tariff would have a bad effect on the potato growers, he said. It was only another case of the Washington authorities legislating for the benefit of the United States, and to suit the people of that country, and the sooner it was realized that Canadian needed legislation in the interest of the Dominion, the better off they would be. New potatoes from the southern states were being shipped into every large city in Canada, from Montreal westward to the Pacific Coast, while at the same time there were large quantities of old stock yet to be found in the Maritime Provinces without a market.

New Potatoes

One reason for this, said Mr. Smith, was the fact that there was a tendency on the part of some people to take new potatoes in preference to old; but the exportation to this country went on practically all through the season. Another reason was that the American producers were in closer proximity to these Canadian cities and enjoyed a shorter freight haul which more than offset the slight duty advantage of N. B. growers.

He claimed the Canadian farmers should be given a fair chance of competing with the Americans and that if protection was good for them it should be good for Canadians. The new tariff would affect practically every province in Canada, he said. It would prohibit in a very large measure the exportation of farm products which could not be overcome except under extraordinary conditions. Markets within Canada would have to be found.

The Road

Speaking of road conditions in the province, Mr. Smith said that with the improved road machinery secured by the government, the roads, once the frost conditions were overcome would quickly be repaired.

Asked as to the possibilities of a provincial election this summer or fall, Mr. Smith would make no definite statement, but drew attention to the fact that the present government had not completed its full term of five years.

A Noted Sportsman.

EARTHQUAKE MOST SEVERE IN MANY YEARS

Tremors Have Shaken the Mendoza Province Area.

DEATH LIST IS HEAVY ONE

The Hunt For Bodies in the Ruins Still Continues.

Buenos Aires, June 1—New tremors have shaken the stricken Mendoza Province area, where the most severe earthquakes in years already had taken a toll of 47 dead and hundreds injured, it was stated today in advices from the city of Mendoza, Argentina, near the scene of the disaster.

The total of dead in the vicinity of Villa Atuel has not yet been fully determined. Searching parties were still seeking for bodies in the ruins of the towns and villages, some of which has been completely destroyed.

MISS HANEBRY HAS RESIGNED POSITION IN TREASURY DEPT.

Efficient Member of the Comptroller General's Staff Presented With a Wrist Watch and Farewell Address By Her Associates.

Miss Dorothy Hanebry, who for seventeen years has held a position on the staff of the treasury department of the Provincial Government, has resigned, and will enter the law office of her brother-in-law, Mr. P. J. Hughes, K. C., as stenographer and accountant. Miss Hanebry is a young lady of ability who has given close attention to her duties. Her withdrawal from the public service is deeply regretted by her associates.

At five o'clock yesterday afternoon she was waited upon at the office of the Comptroller General by a large delegation and made the recipient of a beautiful bouquet, a wrist watch and a farewell address. Mr. George M. Byron, King's Printer, made the presentation and in the course of a brief speech spoke very highly of the service rendered by Miss Hanebry and expressed regret at her intended departure. Members of the office staffs of the Provincial Secretary, Treasurer, Comptroller General, Clerk of the Executive Council and King's printer combined in making the presentation. Miss Hanebry, who was quite overcome by the manifestation of friendship and good will towards her, returned her thanks in a few well chosen words. Miss Hanebry will enter upon her new duties early next week.

Comment of French Newspapers on the British Elections

Declare That Premier Baldwin Has Paid the Penalty For His Failure to Cure Unemployment—Le Petit Journal Thinks MacDonald May Force Another General Election Soon.

PARIS, June 1—Paris newspapers commenting today on the British general elections said that the Conservative Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin had paid the penalty for failure in various attempts to cure unemployment.

Le Petit Journal said Ramsay MacDonald might refuse to form a government thereby fortifying the Labor party in opposition to a semi-paralyzed Conservative cabinet which would lead to another general election soon.

Had a Slim Majority.

London, June 1—Four votes was the smallest majority by which any candidate was elected in the British elections, it was learned today. That was the margin by which Lord Crichton Stuart, Conservative, retained his seat from the Northwich Divisions.

Jack Jones, Laborite, won by the largest majority 29,548, in the Silverton constituency.

13 LADIES WERE ELECTED TO THE BRITISH HOUSE

London, May 31—Thirteen women, six of them newcomers, will take their seats in the next Parliament, an increase of three over the last House. Nine of them will be included among the Labor party membership. The Conservatives re-elected three women and Miss Megan Lloyd George, daughter of the war-time Prime Minister, was the sole woman representative of the Liberal party whose election had been reported up till early tonight.

WILL CONFER WITH PREMIER AT SAINT JOHN

The Federal Radio Commission of which Sir John Aird, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce is the head, have made changes in their planes respecting their proposed visit to New Brunswick. Instead of meeting the provincial government here next week as previously announced, the Commission will confer with Premier Baxter in Saint John on Friday, June 14th at two o'clock p. m. No announcement has been made as to the probable date of the Commission's visit to Fredericton.

BITTER FIGHT CARRIED ON IN SASKATCHEWAN

Regina, Sask., May 31—Saskatchewan's election campaign seventh in the 24-year history of the province—entered its final week today with nomination lists completed. A total of 136 candidates have officially entered the ballot fight for 61 legislature seats.

In every constituency where balloting will take place in June 6, a supporter of the Liberal government of Premier James G. Gardiner, has been entered. Sixty of the 61 Liberal supporters are listed under the banner of the party which has ruled Saskatchewan since 1905, when the province was born, and the other Gardiner approved candidate is W. Baken, Labor entry in Moose Jaw. Arrayed against government candidates in 43 constituencies are Conservative contestants, marshalled by Dr. J. T. Anderson, again candidate for the seat he holds in Saskatoon city. Nineteen progressives, under the guidance of Charles Little, who seeks to dislodge the Liberal tenant in Bengough constituency have been nominated. Other entries are 11 Independents and two economic group nominees.

Fell, Broke Wrist

Mrs. George E. Howard, elderly lady, who resides in King street had the misfortune to fall this morning and break her wrist while about her duties in her home. In falling Mrs. Howard also received a slight injury to the side of her head, which, however, is not of a serious nature. Dr. W. H. Irvine, was called immediately set the break and this afternoon, she is resting as well as can be expected.

Six Cars Derailed

Six cars piled up and were considerably damaged this morning at about 9.30 o'clock, on the Moncton-Napodogen line, when a way freight train was derailed near Mavis Mills. The track was badly torn up by the derailment. The cause of the accident is deemed to be the spreading of the rails in that vicinity. What passengers were aboard were badly shaken up but none were seriously injured in the accident.
