To Render Armed Forces Of Italy More Efficient

**The First All Fascist Parliament Opened Today
By King Victor Emanuel—His Majesty Tells
House and Spectators That it is Italy's Duty
to Arrange For Her Defence.**

ROME, April 20—The first all Fascist Parliament, which was opened in Monte Citorio Palace today, will be called upon to collaborate in rendering the armed forces of Italy more efficient, King Victor Emanuel III. said in his address from the throne.

The King told the four hundred Fascist deputies and the brilliant gathering of spectators that it was the duty of Italy to arrange for her defense because disarmament conferences so far have failed.

"My government has fixed, by the word of the Foreign Minister, the Italian attitude on the disarmament question" the King said. "But since these attempts so far have been unsuccessful, it is the duty of the state to provide timely defense for the country".

A BROTHER OF THE EX-KAISER PASSES AWAY

**Prince Henry of Prussia
Succumbs to an At-
tack of Pneumonia at
Berlin.**

Berlin, April 20—Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of the ex-Kaiser, died of pneumonia here today. He was sixty-six years of age. It was understood that Prince Henry for some time had been afflicted with the same malady with which his father, the late Emperor Frederick III was stricken cancer of the larynx.

UNIVERSAL SAFETY TALKS START TONIGHT

A nationwide campaign to lower the 100,000 death-toll by accident in America every year will be launched Saturday night, April 20, when the National Broadcasting Company, in conjunction with the National Safety Council presents the first of a "Universal Safety Series" over a coast-to-coast NBC System, at 8.00 o'clock, Atlantic Standard Time.

Charles M. Schwab will be the speaker in the first program which will be devoted to the subject "Safety as a Factor in Industry". Twelve other nationally famous figures will participate in the series of thirteen weekly broadcasts.

Besides Mr. Schwab, Henry A. Reninger, president of the National Safety Council, will also speak in the opening program, in explanation of the purposes of the forthcoming series. The two speakers scheduled make the first program thirty minutes in duration. Thereafter the weekly safety talks will last fifteen minutes.

A GERMAN HAS INVENTED A TELEVISION SET

Washington, April 19—A simple television apparatus which may be attached to any radio set as easily as a loud speaker and which represents sights and sounds with remarkable fidelity has been invented in Germany the Commerce Department is informed by its commercial attache in Berlin.

The tests were described as indicating that the machinery was capable of projecting ordinary motion pictures by wire or wireless to several receivers in different places simultaneously.

During demonstration of the apparatus it was said, the attendant turned a button and immediately a picture appeared in an aperture of a square frame similar to a mirror holder. Pictures of animal scenes, of persons smoking and drinking, and of a woman trying on a hat were flashed it is claimed, with remarkable clearness.

The apparatus is said to produce not only light and darkness but intermediate tones equally well. Simplicity is emphasized as the cardinal virtue of the machine which may be plugged into any radio receiver precisely as a loud speaker is employed.

THIS LEADING DOG'S LIFE IS COMFORTABLE

St. Louis, April 20—It's a dog's life that Doffo von Hohentann leads. C. P. DeLore, owner of this pedigreed shepherd built a home for him in the back yard at an approximate cost of \$4000. The kennel, or lodge, is built of brick, with a roof of variegated Vermont slate, has large windows with Southern exposure and a door, or rustic design, the hardware for which was especially made.

CLAIMS SHOULD BE CONSIDERED ON THEIR MERITS

The Correspondence Between Premier King and Premier Baxter on Question of Natural Resources.

Ottawa, April 19—The government believes that the claims of the various provinces should each be considered on their own merits and should not be lumped into one comprehensive problem. Should anything arise out of the projected settlement of the questions affecting the return of the national resources to the Prairie Provinces, which may have a bearing on the claims of the Maritime Provinces, then these may again be considered on their merits. This the general tenor of the correspondence between Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Premier of New Brunswick, which the Prime Minister tabled in the House of Commons today.

On February 6 Mr. Baxter wrote the Prime Minister in this connection. New Brunswick made no claim to the Crown lands about to be transferred to the prairie provinces, based on proprietary rights, nor was the eastern province opposed to such a transfer; but Premier Baxter felt it pertinent to ask "what equivalent the Maritime Provinces should receive in view of the fact that (a) their territory cannot be increased in extent and (b) that the apportionment of a part of the national assets to some of the provinces fairly calls for compensatory allowances toward the others in order that all may be treated on an equitable basis."

Further Revision

The Premier does not overlook the interim subsidy payments which he acknowledges to be "helpful" but feels that in view of the withdrawal of the federal grant for technical education, the grant for road construction, and also in view of a possible acceptance of the province of the federal old age pensions legislation, it might be necessary further to revise financial relations between the Dominion and provinces.

Mr. Mackenzie King leaves this matter open. In his reply, dated March 22, the Prime Minister says:

"It has been our view that each question should be considered on its merits and that only in that way will it be possible to effect a settlement of the long standing question of the transfer to the western provinces of these resources. If out of the settlement made with the western provinces there should appear to arise ground for reconsideration of the position of the other provinces, that question again can be considered on its own merits."

WILL HAVE ALL CANINES UNDER LEASH

Truro N. S., April 19—The dogs of Truro will have to be chaperoned when they go out for walks, provided the Town Council passes a motion which, it is said tonight, Councillor L. G. Kennedy plans to move at the next council meeting. Councillor Kennedy's plan, it is stated, is to have all dogs under leash whenever the pooches go out for the air. The reason for the proposed motion is the danger of children being attacked by dogs running at large. As Truro has a large dog population, the demand for dog harness promises to be heavy.

**Prince of Wales Caused

Maple syrup was plentiful at 45 cents per bottle. Bees' honey sold for 45 cents per bottle. Other prices were as follows: Potatoes 75 cents and \$1 per barrel; turnips \$1 per barrel; apples \$2 to \$4 per barrel; beef 12 to 14 cents per pound; pork 18 to 20 cents per pound.

Says Germany's Stand On Reparations May Lead to Another War

**Georges Clemenceau, War Time Premier Makes
Strong Statement in a Newspaper Interview
—Dr. Schacht and His Colleagues Going to
Berlin For a Conference.**

PARIS, April 20—The German stand on reparations tends toward a new war, Georges Clemenceau, war time Premier of France, said in an interview published in today's Echo De Paris.

"Schacht's refusal and aims tend toward nothing less than a new war", Clemenceau was quoted as saying. "The Germans have only to refuse now to fulfill the payments of the Dawes plan to justify us in maintaining an army of occupation in the Rhineland zones after the period fixed under the peace."

To Confer at Berlin.

Berlin, April 20—Dr. Hjalmar Schacht and his colleagues on the German reparations delegation plan to come to Berlin for a conference with the government, it was learned today.

It was understood the German delegates were coming here in the hope of arranging an eleventh hour agreement before the plenary session convenes in Paris Monday.

NEWSPAPERS OF SWEDEN TO BE IN LINE

Stockholm, April 20—Swedish newspapers soon will have the same facilities for receiving telephoto pictures that now are used in the United States, England and other countries.

Installation of a receiving and sending apparatus in the central office of the state telegraph department was nearing completion today and arrangements were being made for cable connections with Berlin, Paris and London. The new system was expected to be in operation by the end of this month.

KING AIDS WIDOW OF CHAPLAIN

London, April 20—Mrs. G. A. Studert Kennedy, widow of the popular wartime chaplain affectionately nicknamed "Woodbine Willie," has received a personal letter from King George inclosing a check. The letter was sent from Bognor with a message indicating it was a personal gift and not intended as a contribution to the fund being raised for the widows of her sons, who were left not very well off.
