May Day is Celebrated by Many Millions of Workers

**Police Authorities of Foreign Capitals Mobilize
Their Forces to Prevent Rioting and Radical
Agitation—Many Communists Arrested in
Paris—Big Demonstration in Moscow.**

(Undated by British United Press)
MILLIONS of workers throughout the world
ceased labor today in celebration of May Day.
Police authorities of the principal foreign capi-
tals mobilized their forces to prevent rioting, dis-
turbances and radical agitation.

In many European cities public demonstra-
tions by the more radical elements were forbidden
by the government, but the leaders of the various
extremist parties manifested their intention of
defying the authorities. Arrests were made in
several European capitals as a precautionary
measure.

Clashes in Berlin.

Berlin, May 1—Police announced at 1 p. m.
that several had been injured in numerous clash-
es during May Day celebrations in outlying dis-
tricts of the city.

Unidentified persons fired on the police in
one district but no one was injured the announce-
ment said. Police made 180 arrests.

Rioters Dispersed.

London, May 1—Police using batons
dispersed a crowd of rioters in the
workers districts of Berlin today, an
Exchange Telegraph dispatch report-
ed. Sixty were arrested.

Communists Arrested

Paris, May 1—Three hundred and
fourteen Communists were in the
custody of the police today as a pre-
cautionary measure ordered by the
Minister of Interior Andre Tardieu.
to insure a quiet May Day.

Moscow Reds Celebrated

Moscow, May 1—The entire Soviet
union began today a fervid celebra-
tion of May Day. All offices and fac-
tories were closed. Innumerable mass
meetings, parades and public demon-
strations were held. The day was de-
dicated to the proletariat of the
world.

MANY ARRESTS MADE BY THE PARIS POLICE

Paris, May 1—Police made 2,285 ar-
rests up to noon today, but no distur-
bance occurred. A strong guard of
police at strategic points in Paris and
the suburbs made it the quietest May
Day since the war.

Few arrests were made in streets.
Those held were received in raids
in extremist Labor meetings and
Communist assemblies.

FREE STATE GOVERNMENT ON THE ALERT

Dublin, May 1—The Irish Free
State Government took precautions
today against the possibility of re-
newed republication demonstrations
at the funeral of Austin Stack, for-
mer Free State Secretary for Home
Affairs.

Stack was one of the most fiery
Sinn Feiners of the days when Ire-
land was being transformed into its
present two government system and
the Free State Government feared his
followers would use his funeral as an
excuse for demonstrations in favor
of complete independence.

is no more, according to Joan Lon-
don, daughter of the late Jack Lon-
don, in a lecture here.

"There used to be a new genera-
tion only every 20 years," said Miss
London, "but now things are mov-
ing so fast we have a new one
every five years. My set, which
went to college from 1917 to 1921,
was set apart by the war. We
were conservative, married young,
had our babies soon and were con-
siderate of our elders. There were
no flappers. Later, when my baby
was old enough for me to go out
and look around the world again, I
found that the flappers had changed
everything. Now the flapper is no
more, and we have a queer, new
type to try to understand."

SAYS LABOR WILL FORM A GOVERNMENT

Will Do This Should It
Elect The Largest
Group.

STATEMENT
BY THOMAS

Does not Concur in View
Expressed by Ram-

London, May 1—Labor, under any
circumstances will form a govern-
ment if the country shows it does not
want the Conservatives and distrusts
the Liberals.

This important declaration is made
by Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, in spite of
previous assertions by Ramsay Mac-
Donald that he would not hold office
again under circumstances where
Labor would be at the mercies of a
diverse Parliamentary vote of the
Tories and Liberals combined.

LABORITIES OPPOSED TO USE OF FORCE

London, May 1—The British Labor
party declared in a May Day manifes-
to issued today that it believed in
ordered progress and democratic
methods and was opposed to force as
a means of establishing a new econo-
mic order. The manifesto was issued
as part of the Laborite general elec-
tion campaign and enumerated the
planks of the party platform.

Churchill Says that Britain and U. S. to go Forward Side by Side

**British Chancellor of the Exchequer Says the Two
Countries Will Equal Any Organization Yet
Founded by Men—Will Lead Mankind in
Majesty and Peace.**

LONDON, May 1—Great Britain comes suc-
cessfully through the present critical period and
draws closer to the United States, the two coun-
tries will equal any organization yet founded by
men, according to Right Hon. Winston Churchill,
Chancellor of the Exchequer.

"The British Empire and the United States
will walk forward side by side, leading mankind
in majesty and peace", Churchill said in a speech
here last night.

The speech was part of the Conservative gen-
eral election campaign, and was broadcast over
the radio.

THE CHARGES OF CORRUPTION NOT JUSTIFIED

**Report of the Manitoba
Royal Commission
Tabled in the Legisla-
ture.**

Winnipeg, April 30—Not a little of
evidence before the Seven Sisters
power site Royal Commission justifies
charges of corruption of dishonesty
made against Hon. John Bracken,
Premier of Manitoba, or his govern-
ment according to the majority re-
port of two of the three commis-
sioners tabled in the legislature tonight.
The charges laid by Colonel F. G.
Taylor, K. C., leader of the Provin-
cial Conservative party, regarding
the lease of the Seven Sisters power
site to the Winnipeg Electric Com-
pany were under investigation by the
Royal Commission from Feb. 4 to
April 22. Chief Justice D. A. Mac-
Donald chairman of the inquiring
body and Mr. Justice J. F. Kilgour
were the reporting judges, Mr. Jus-
tice A. K. Dysart plans to submit a
separate report within three or four
days.

Not because he takes an entirely
divergent view from that of the
majority but rather owing to the form
of the report did Commissioner Dy-
sart decide that a minority statement
should be submitted.

(Judge Dysart is a brother of Hon.
A. A. Dysart leader of the Liberal
Opposition in the New Brunswick
Legislature.)

Fish Plentiful

Pickarel, Gaspereaux and Gizzard fish
were seen in the market at Phoenix
Square this morning and sold for
varying prices, being bought quickly.
The former sold for 25 cents apiece,
while gaspereaux went for five cents
apiece. The prices of ordinary pro-
duce were about the same as usual.
Eggs were low again at 30 and 35
cents per dozen. Butter sold for 45
cents a pound. Other prices are as
follows: Apples, \$2 to \$4 per barrel;
Potatoes, \$1 per barrel, what few
were in this morning; Wood, \$6 per
load; Pork, 17 cents per pound;
Veal, 10 and 13 cents per pound.
