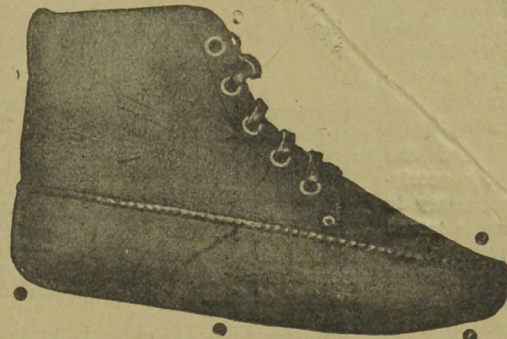

### A LAYMEN WHO AP- PLIED FOR A JUDGESHIP

Unique Document Unearthed—Applicant Was a J. P. and Felt He Was Fit for the Bench.

The following document discovered among a vast quantity of ancient papers that came to light when the old Departmental Buildings were demolished some few years ago will not be without interest to many of the present generation:

St. Mary's, August 31, 1855.

Dear Sir:

I was in hopes to have met you in Fredericton yesterday but failing in that take this early opportunity of informing you of my intention of being the candidate for the judgeship made vacant by the demise of the late Judge Street, and soliciting your able support in my behalf. The three members of the executive, resident in Fredericton, have already pledged themselves to me. The others being members of the profession I have not written to, as doubtless they will plead my want of legal knowledge, but I think I can satisfy any unprejudiced mind when informed that I am a J. P. of nine years' standing with a practice second to no county jurisdiction in the Province, and have tried many important causes from 2s. 6d. to five pounds. ### MR. CLINCH'S CAREER AS A HORSEMAN

Peter Clinch, of St. John, N. B., who has been appointed presiding judge at the race track meetings at Blue Bonnets and Woodbine Park, is a thorough horseman, and at one time was a well known gentleman rider. He has always made his home in St. John and officiated as an official, although it was at minor meetings. Mr. Clinch rode in events for gentleman riders back in the "eighties" in the days of Foxhall Keene, Harry Harwood and Henry J. Morris, now secretary of the National Hunt Association.

Mr. Clinch at one time owned a number of thoroughbreds and for several years was identified with show horses, having a good string of them. He also purchased the famous stallion, Garry Herman, for the New Brunswick government, and later on sold him back to a syndicate in the United States.

It is likely that Mr. Clinch will be offered the position of presiding judge on the majority of the C. R. A. tracks this season, and may be one of the stewards at the spring meeting at Dorval. The last race ridden by Mr. Clinch was on the horse Masterman, owned by the late John Boden and trained by his brother Jim, who is now training the Raymond string. The race was run at Belmont Park.

where though, and I know that the

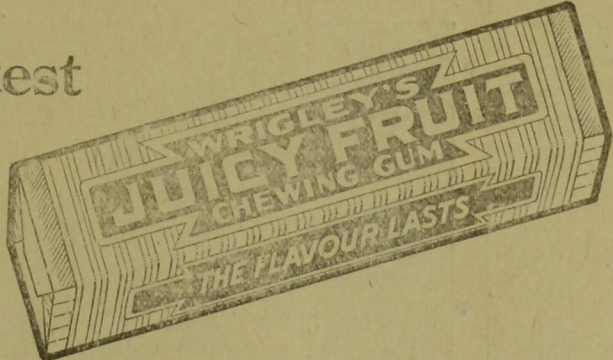

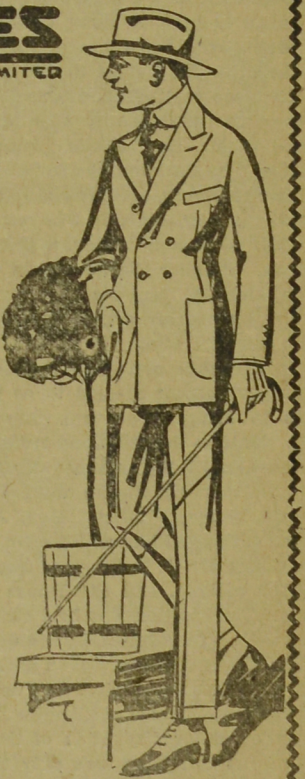
