session of the Legislative Assembly of  
New Brunswick, by the City Council of  
the City of Fredericton, for the passing  
of an Act or Acts for the following pur-  
poses or objects:(a) To provide authority for the removal,  
pulling down or destruction of dan-  
gerous or dilapidated buildings.  
(b) To provide authority for the proper  
control and protection of the Sinking  
Funds of the City of Fredericton.  
(c) To amend and extend the provisions  
of Section 1 of Chapter 97, 4 George V.,  
Acts of Assembly, 1914, relating to the  
powers conferred on the City Council in  
effecting temporary loans.  
(d) Respecting the tenure of office of  
City Officials, Clerks and other employes.  
(e) To amend the City of Fredericton

ward VII., Acts of the Assembly, 1907, so  
as to change the rate of discount from  
five per cent. to two per cent., and to

supplies for a term of years.

**AND MILITARY SERVICE**London, May 8.—In the House of  
Commons today James Ian MacPherson,  
parliamentary secretary to the  
war office, introduced a bill to enable  
the king by an order-in-council to carry  
into effect conventions which may be  
made with allied or other states as to  
mutual liabilities of British subjects  
and subjects or citizens of allied or  
other states to military service. This  
bill is designed to obtain for the army  
British subjects living abroad and to  
arrange for aliens resident in England  
to join the armies of their respective  
countries.A bill is pending in congress per-  
mitting the recruiting of foreigners in  
the United States for the armies of the

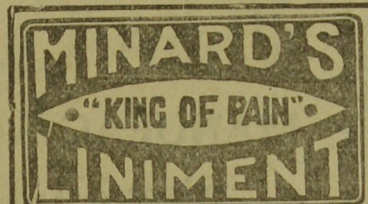

**AND HOME RULE**Washington, May 4.—Mr. Balfour  
today received a deputation of Irish-  
Americans, who laid their views before  
him and called attention to the favor-  
able impression that a solution of the  
Irish situation would have in this  
country. Mr. Balfour said that while  
he had no power to speak for the Gov-  
ernment, he could say that everything  
possible was being done to bring the  
Ulster, Redmonites and Sein-Fein ele-  
ments together, and that the British  
parliament stood ready to agree to any  
solution that the Irish themselves  
found acceptable. He promised to  
report the meeting fully to his Gov-  
ernment.Washington, May 5.—Quite late  
last night came the very interesting  
news that Mr. Lloyd George drawing at-  
tention to the importance of a settle-  
ment of the Irish Home Rule ques-  
tion, with a view to a more complete  
understanding with his country, after  
a conference with the representatives  
of several Irish societies which have  
been in convention here lately. The  
consultation between the head of the  
British mission and his callers was  
most amicable. They pointed out the  
earnestness with which the very great  
majority of Irishmen in America  
longed for a settlement of the ques-  
tion and what an influence such a  
settlement would have upon opinion  
here. It was originally intended to  
embody the matter in a memorial  
which was to have been presented to  
Mr. Balfour, but instead, there was an  
informal discussion of the whole  
question, and at the end of it he  
voluntarily promised to cable to the  
British Government a statement of  
the case and a view of the import-  
ance of a settlement on its effect on  
public opinion here. The whole mat-  
ter is naturally one of extreme deli-  
cacy for the Government here, and  
Mr. Balfour's action will be generally
