Conservatives May Adopt Imperial Preference

The Feeling is Becoming Stronger That Great Britain Should Have Free Trade Within the Empire and a Tariff Against Other Countries—Neville Chamberlain Says the Tories Are Free From Old Pledges.

LONDON, July 5—The likelihood of the Conservatives officially adopting an economic policy extended towards imperial preference and founded on free trade within the empire and tariffs against all others is becoming greater daily.

Hon. Neville Chamberlain has declared that the Tories are now free from old pledges and will not proceed with a tariff policy beyond limited safeguarding, and he urges them to do as his father did—that is adopt tariff reform. Many Conservatives believe that unless a policy would ensure their return to power in spite of previous disasters they should not support it.

They think the public would now welcome the idea of developing the empire by a tariff policy and the Daily Express today says this is bound to come.

DR. F. R. TAYLOR PASSES AWAY AT ROTHESAY

The New Brunswick Bar Loses One of Its Outstanding Figures—Was a U. N. B. Graduate.

St. John, July 5—Expressions of regret at the death of Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., were being heard on all sides last night, while tributes were pouring in from far and near from men in high public places and positions of responsibility, who mourned the passing of one of the outstanding legal lights of Canada. Among those who paid tribute to the memory of Dr. Taylor were Lord Beaverbrook, Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., Premier of New Brunswick, C. F. Inches, K. C., president of the St. John Law Society; E. W. Beatty, of Montreal, president of the C. P. R.; Sir Herbert Holt, president of the Royal Bank of Canada, Ward C. Pitfield, prominent financier, Sir Frederick Williams Taylor, general manager of the Bank of Montreal, and many others.

Dr. Taylor died at his home in Rothesay yesterday morning, news of his passing coming as a great shock, although he had been in a serious condition for several weeks. The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon with service at St. Paul's Church Rothesay, at 3 o'clock.

Frederic Richard Taylor, LL. B., K. C., D. C. L., was a man of outstanding legal attainment and recognized as one of the leading authorities in eastern Canada in his profession.

He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Doris K. C. Sayre, daughter of Frederic E. Sayre, whom he married on February 12, 1918, and four young children, Eleanor Sayre Taylor, John Sayre Taylor, Frederic Savary Taylor and Walton Savary Taylor. Miss C. O. McGivern, of Saint John, and Mrs. C. E. Taylor, of Brooklyn, N. Y., are aunts.

His Career.

Dr. Taylor was educated at Rothesay Collegiate School, the University of New Brunswick and Harvard University. He entered the University of New Brunswick from Rothesay Collegiate in 1895 and won the Brydson-Jack Scholarship in 1895. He secured his B. A. degree in 1896 and graduated in honors in experimental physics and chemistry, Class I. He was

THE RUSSIANS INCLINED TO BE RESENTFUL

Are Anxious to Have Diplomatic Relations With Great Britain Restored.

Moscow, July 5—Soviet political circles are resentful at the delays occasioned in Great Britain's resumption of diplomatic relations with Russia and are especially offended by Premier Ramsay MacDonald's reference to a discussion of conditions for the restoration of diplomatic relations.

The official organ of the Soviet, Izvestia, quotes a soviet leader commenting on the King's speech read to Parliament, Wednesday, as saying that the Laborites are deeply mistaken, if they think the soviet union will enter a preliminary discussion of conditions.

It is the soviet's position that the matters of dispute should be settled after unconditional restoration of normal diplomatic relations.

AMERICAN INVESTMENTS IN BRITAIN

London, July 5—The question of American investments in British industrial concerns probably will be brought before Parliament shortly. Authorities in various parts of the British Isles have become alarmed by American's invasion of British Companies, especially electrical developments.

THE COUNTY COUNCILLORS TURN DOWN THE PROPOSAL FOR AN ISOLATION HOSPITAL

A Unanimous Decision That the County Would Not Be Justified in Joining the City in the Undertaking—Coun. Hanson Withdrew His Graft Allegations Re the Municipal Home.

The York Municipal Council this morning by a unanimous vote turned down the proposal that the County of York unite with the City of Fredericton in the erection and equipping of an isolation hospital here. It was contended by Coun. Greenlaw and other Councillors that the Municipality would not be justified in embarking upon the expenditure at the present time. One councillor pointed out that the proposed hospital would be of no benefit whatever to the people of the outlying parishes, as in the event of an outbreak of disease it would be next to impossible to remove the patients to the city.

Coun. Hanson of St. Mary's who yesterday created a breeze by insinuating that there had been graft in connection with the Municipal Home, this morning made a partial apology for his statements and it was accepted by the council.

The Council met at ten o'clock with all the members present except Couns. Pond and Whipple. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Coun. Hanson, in referring to the Municipal Home, said his only object in offering criticism was to bring about greater economy. He had made use of the word "graft" in the course of his remarks and wished to withdraw the same.

Should Go Farther

Coun. Greenlaw said that in his opinion Coun. Hanson should withdraw his entire statement concerning the Municipal Home. He (Greenlaw) had served on the committee for six years and could truthfully state that he had seen no evidence of graft. He characterized Coun. Hanson's statement, that he could save \$5000 in connection with the Municipal Home, as absurd. Why, he said, it cost less than that sum to run the home. He did not think that Coun. Hanson's statement should be allowed to go to the county uncontradicted.

Stopped the Discussion

Warden Dougless, when Coun. Hanson rose to reply suggested that the matter be allowed to drop.

Coun. Seymour denied that there had been graft in connection with the Municipal Home. Coun. Hanson's statements were ridiculous and would not be accepted by the council. He was sure that the councillor from St. Mary's was not taken seriously by members of the Board. Having made statements he was unable to prove he

THE GERMAN ATTITUDE

London, July 5—Resuming the debate in the House of Commons today on the King's speech read at the opening of Parliament, Wednesday, Godfrey Locker Lamphorn, Conservative, asserted that while he was certain everybody in the House of Commons desired to see British troops evacuate the Rhineland as soon as possible, he announced that the German Government would like to see British troops withdrawn while troops of two nations remained.

Progress Towards a Waterways Agreement Has Been Interrupted

The Tariff Situation at Washington is the Cause of the Hitch, According to Well Informed Opinion—Dislike For Tariff Schedules is Increasing in Canada.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 5—Progress toward a Canadian Pan-American agreement on the St. Lawrence waterway project has been temporarily and perhaps permanently interrupted by the tariff situation here in the opinion of informed persons who discussed the problem today.

Dislike for the proposed Hawley-Smoot tariff schedules is increasing in Canada according to reliable information received here. In so far as they affect Canada, some of the schedules are considered unfriendly. In a recent report of the foreign policy association the opinion was expressed that Canada would suffer most from the proposed agricultural schedules.

CONSERVATIVE ORGANIZER AT ST. JOHN

St. John, July 5—After spending the last ten days in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and the eastern section of New Brunswick, conferring with leading Conservatives in connection with party organization, A. D. McRay, M. P. for Vancouver North, Conservative organizer for Canada, arrived here yesterday. Today at three o'clock he is to meet the executive of the Southern New Brunswick Conservative Association in the Pythian Castle.

Seen at the Admiral Beatty Hotel last evening, Mr. McRay would say nothing regarding the party's work here, and when asked if his tour was being made in expectation of an early federal election, Mr. McRay said, "In politics, as in other business, it is always well to be prepared." He declared that the time had come for Canadians to wake up and administer their country for the benefit of Canadians. "When they have done that, we will have a great country," he asserted.

CONTEST HENS KEEPING UP GOOD WORK

Total Egg Production Last Week Was 915—Charlotte County Pen Still Has a Good Lead.

The 200 birds which are entered in the New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, which is conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, laid 915 eggs during the week with 975.1 points. This brings the total eggs to date to 25,703 and 26,215.8 points. The average production to date is approximately three eggs per bird below last year.
