

OTTAWA WILL HAVE N.H.A. TEAM THIS WINTER

League Meeting at Montreal on Saturday Night—Five Club League Not Probable—Changes in Rules.

Montreal, Oct. 21. — Ottawa's decision to operate again this season in the National Hockey Association and the re-election of Frank Robinson as president, though absent and not a candidate for office, were the features of the adjourned meeting of the directors of the N.H.A., in the Windsor Hotel here, Saturday night. The majority were opposed to the operation of a five-club league this coming season and of Toronto until such time as a second club could be established in the Queen City. It was stated that the Sons of Ireland team of the Quebec City league, might amalgamate with the professional club and thus be able to place a strong team on the ice, the Sons of Ireland playing as amateurs and devote the salaries to the Red Cross fund of Quebec city.

With a view to making it easier for spectators to learn when a goal is scored, it was suggested that red light be placed over each goal with a switch to be worked by the goal umpire, the red light to be turned on when a goal is won and left burning until the puck is faced again at centre ice. This will probably be done.

BELMONT HORSE SETS NEW MARK

Laurel, Md., Oct. 18. — In a sensational finish today August Belmont's Hourless defeated Vian's Omar Khayyam in the match race. The Belmont horse broke the world's record for a two minutes and two seconds. The circular track by stepping the mile and a quarter in two minutes and two seconds. The former mark was 2:03.45.

The owner received a purse of \$10,000 and a gold trophy offered by Edward B. McLean of Washington. Belmont, however, wants only glory. He will take \$10,000 in Liberty bonds and present them to the American Red Cross.

WORLD'S RECORD FOR PACING MARE BROKEN SATURDAY AT ATLANTA BY MISS HARRIS M., TIME 2.00 FLAT

Made Time in Notable Race With Hal Boy—Her Former Record was 2.00 1/2—Jeannette Speed, Little Batice, Brescia and Allerton Heir, the Winners in Other Classes.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 21. — Miss Harris M., one of the star performers at Lakewood throughout the race meeting which closed today, wound up the Grand Circuit season by shattering the world's record for a pacing mare by circling the mile oval in 2.00 flat in a match race with Hal Boy. She won the match, which was for two in three, in straight heats. Her time in the second was 2.03 1/4. Up to today Miss Harris M.'s record, which she also made at Lakewood earlier in the week, was 2.00 1/2.

The 2.11 class pace, for a purse of \$2,500, was given by the judges to Little Batice, which won two out of the six heats. Second money went to Jay Mac and third to The Pointer Queen.

Jeannette Speed took first money in the 2.11 class trot, three in five, winning three of the four heats required to decide the contest. Miss Rexette won second and Mendosa T. third.

The 2.07 trot, three in five, for a purse of \$1,500, was won by Brescia, which led a field of five starters in three heats. Ross B. took second money and Peter Chenault third.

The fourth race was a 2.15 trot, three in five, also for a \$1,500 stake. Because of the lateness of the hour only three heats were trotted and the judges declared Allerton Heir winner of first money. Second money was awarded to Sir Tatten and third to Frisco Worthy.

By agreement of drivers, with the consent of the judges, the awards in the unfinished 2.18 trot, left over from Thursday, were made according to the standing at the finish of the fifth heat. Bacilla was declared winner, Peter Chenault second, Daisy Todd third, Straightsail fourth, Busy's Lassie fifth and Miss Perfection sixth.

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BAN JOHNSON OFFERS HIMSELF FOR SERVICE

Does Not Care Where U. S. Government May Send Him—Liberty Bonds Bought by White Sox.

Chicago, Oct. 18. — President Johnson of the American League said tonight that he had arranged to meet Adj. Gen. McCain in Washington on Monday to offer his services to the government.

"I am sincere in my intentions," Mr. Johnson said, "and I sincerely hope I shall be accepted for any duty, whether in this country or in France, without compensation."

After dividing the winners' share of the World's Series, the victorious White Sox made a liberal purchase of Liberty bonds. Pitcher Joe Benz invested his entire share, \$3,669, while other members of the club bought amounts from \$100 up.

President Johnson said "Billy" Evans and "Silk" O'Loughlin, the American League umpires in the series, invested the \$1,000 they received in bonds.
