MILK PRODUCERS
ANNOUNCE SIX
CENT RATE

Retailers Meeting Today to Consider Matter—Increase in Price to Consumer is Expected.

The York County Milk & Cream Producers' Association organized here Saturday afternoon, the meeting being held at Long's Hotel. The chief outcome of the meeting was the decision that all members should charge six cents per quart for milk and 32½ cents per quart for cream at the dairy. The retailers are to take delivery there or pay extra for delivery at their places of business in Fredericton and elsewhere.

The membership is upwards of twenty and is expected to be increased.

The new rates for milk will go into effect November 1st. Heretofore there has been no standard price for winter milk as far as the producers were concerned. The result of placing the price at six cents per quart is expected to result in an increase in the retail price. The retailers are meeting this afternoon for the purpose of considering the situation.

PTE. H. BONNAR
DIED OF WOUNDS
OCTOBER 15TH

One of 3 Brothers Serving in France—Widow and Three Children Survive—Resident of Penniac.

Relatives at Penniac yesterday received official word that Private Herbert Bonnar had died of wounds in France on October 15th. Private Bonnar is survived by a widow, formerly Miss Jean Manzer of Penniac, and three children, two daughters and one son, all younger than nine years.

Private Bonnar belonged to a family which had done its duty in the present war. A brother, Private James Bonnar, is now in hospital in England on account of wounds received in action and another brother, Private Edward Bonnar, is serving in France. The three brothers left Canada with the 140th Battalion.

The deceased resided at Penniac on the Manzer homestead, but formerly belonged to Fredericton and was well known in this section.

Charged With Setting Fire.
A sitting of the Juvenile Court with Police Magistrate Limerick presiding, is being held today, a young boy residing in the West End being charged with the very serious offense of setting fire to a barn. The fire occurred last Thursday and information was given Fire Chief Rutter at the time that the boy was the cause. The boy is liable also to other charges and has been before the magistrate on previous occasions.

To Re-establish Shipbuilding.
It is reported that an effort is to be made to re-establish the shipbuilding industry at Upper Georgetown and Ormoco, where vessels were built many years ago. The last vessels of any size to be built on the St. John river were launched at the mouth of the Nashwaak, the late John Gibson of Marysville, owning a shipyard in Gibson.
