J. Ramsay MacDonald will Form a New Government

Great Britain Will Have a Labor Administration For the Second Time in Its History—Victorious Labor Leader Waits Upon His Majesty—Mr. Lloyd George, the Liberal Leader, Will Hold the Balance of Power as Was the Case in 1924.

WINDSOR, ENGLAND, June 5—J. Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the victorious Labor party in last Thursday's general election, was asked by the King today to form a government, and accepted.

Great Britain will have a Labor Government for the second time in history. The first time was in 1924 when MacDonald headed a government which was short lived, going down to defeat when Lloyd George, leader of the Liberals withdrew his support. As in 1924, Lloyd George again has the balance of power in the House of Commons and probably will be able to defeat the Government at any time he desires to align with the Conservatives.

Mr. Stanley Baldwin, the Tory Premier, called on the King yesterday and tendered his resignation.

The Labor leader was received today. The King being able to sit in a chair while he talked with him. Shortly after Mr. MacDonald left it was officially announced that he had accepted the government. It is understood that there will be little delay in announcing the personell of the new government.

NEW BRUNSWICK STUDENTS DO WELL AT M'GILL

Several York County Boys in the List of Those Who Took the Honors.

New Brunswick students reported in despatches from Montreal as taking Honors in the recent final examinations in the Faculty of Medicine at McGill University for the first and second years respectively, G. E. Chalmers, of South Devon, and Robert J. Nelson of Campbellton, are both former students at University of New Brunswick, Chalmers having completed his B. A. course in 1928 while Nelson completed his pre-medical course in 1927. Chalmers received Honors in Anatomy and Histology and Nelson in Pharmacology and Physiology. Mr. Nelson is a son of Mrs. Clark Sutherland, a former resident of this city.

Other former University of New Brunswick students completing the first year's work in the Faculty of Medicine at McGill University were J. E. Dubois and Norman S. Skinner, while others who successfully passed the second year's final examinations included J. G. Petrie, of Newcastle, Cecil H. Turner, of Meductic and J. Gilbert Turner, of Fredericton. All the New Brunswick students listed in published reports from Montreal as having passed their examinations at McGill received their preparation at University of New Brunswick, said a statement issued by Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor, today. Mr. Cecil H. Turner is a son of Dr. W. L. Turner of Meductic and a nephew of the late Mr. N. W. Brown. Mr. Gilbert Turner is a son of Mrs. J. K. Turner of this city.

ANGLINS DO NOT FAVOR PROHIBITION

Halifax, June 4—A resolution that the Anglican synod of the diocese of Nova Scotia cannot endorse prohibition as a satisfactory method of promoting temperance, has been drawn up for submission at the annual session of the synod opening here tomorrow, it was reported here today. The text of the resolution, understood to be sponsored by a group including Rev. Noel Wilcox, Dartmouth; Rev. J. W. Godfrey, Truro; Rev. John Furlong, Halifax, and Rev. R. E. Ellis, Dartmouth, is:

"Resolved, that this synod, having the cause of temperance seriously at heart, cannot endorse prohibition as a satisfactory method of promoting temperance but would urge the parish clergy to emphasize the Christian virtue of temperance and self-control."

Communications signed by the ministers named and sent to a number of the synod membership said: "In view of the forthcoming plebiscite on prohibition and of the fact that a resolution of synod of 1915 is being used to show that the Church of England in this diocese endorses prohibition, a group of clergy propose to introduce to synod the resolution as quoted above."

STANDING OF PARTIES

London, June 5—The election of Sir Robert Hamilton (Conservative) for Orkney and Shetland, leaves the standing of parties as follows: Labor 288, Conservatives 256, Liberals 58, Nationalists 3, Independent 3 and prohibition 1.

J. R. McDONALD IS BRITAIN'S NEW PREMIER

BRITAIN'S NEW PREMIER WILL MAKE A STRONG EFFORT TO CONQUER UNEMPLOYMENT

Pursuit of Peace Abroad Will Be Another Plank in the Labor Platform—The Government Will Try to Secure a Settlement of the Disarmament Problem.

LONDON, June 5—Pursuit of peace abroad and conquering unemployment at home are the two main planks in the policy Right Hon. Ramsay MacDonald, Britain's new premier will put into operation. Labor believes that if Premier MacDonald can secure a full settlement of the naval disarmament problem with President Hoover on the one hand and take the steam out of Lloyd George's programme by reducing unemployment on the other, his prestige during the next two years will rise so high that Labor could look forward confidently to the next election to give them a clear and independent majority for the purpose of carrying out the full Labor programme which is impossible while the Liberals hold the balance of power.

20 STUDENTS ENTRAPPED AT MT. VESUVIUS

Were Trying to See a Flow of Lava at Close Range.

HAD QUITE A CLOSE CALL

Eruption the Most Spectacular Since That of 79, A. D.

Naples, Italy, June 5—Twenty students trapped by a flow of lava today while they were endeavoring to witness the latest eruption of Mt. Vesuvius at close hand. Several were injured by the bursting of the lava as they tried to flee.

An official communique said the eruption has increased in violence with the flames attaining a height of 1,500 feet at 4 a. m. the eruption was considered probably the most spectacular since 79 A. D. when Pompeii and Herculaneum were destroyed.

HAD SMUGGLED LIQUOR IN HIS POSSESSION

Sackville, N. B., June 4—Lorne Smith, of this town, was convicted in Magistrate Steadman's Court today of violating the New Brunswick Liquor Control law and sentenced to pay a fine of \$200 and costs, and serve two months in the county jail at Dorchester. In default of payment of the fine the Magistrate ruled that accused serve an additional four months in jail. Smith was caught in possession of smuggled liquor by Provincial Police Officer Stewart, of Dorchester, the general belief that accused purchased it in Amherst.

REPORT WAS UNCONFIRMED

London, June 5—It was reported without confirmation today that the steamer Ugo Maru, carrying a group of fishermen, was burned while on a voyage to Kamchatka.

Terrific Explosion At Refining Plant At Braintree, Mass

The Lives of One Hundred Workmen Were Imperilled When Three Huge Tanks of Oil Blew Up—Two Are Missing and Over a Score Are Suffering From Burns.

EAST BRAINTREE, MASS., June 5—Two men were reported missing, another was believed to be near death, two more were in a hospital and nearly a score were suffering from minor burns and injuries after a triple explosion and fire at the Cities Service Refining Company's plant early today.

Lives of approximately 100 workmen employed on the reservation were imperilled when three tanks, each containing 10,000 gallons of oil, blew up in rapid succession, flashing flames over a wide area and causing the earth to tremble for miles around.

Police estimated that the explosions and fire which raged for two hours after they occurred, resulted in property damage that would reach half a million dollars.

NEW PREMIER MAY ESTABLISH A PRECEDENT

London, June 5—Ramsay MacDonald may establish a precedent when he becomes the next British Prime Minister by making his home at Hampstead as now instead of at 10 Downing Street, the Laborite Daily Herald said today. The newspaper said the Laborite leader was quite attached to his home, where he keeps all his books, pictures and cherished possessions.

SUPREME COURT

Three Attorneys Admitted At Supreme Court Session This Morning—Two Graduates From U. N. B. Law School—Docket Nearing Close.

Three young men were admitted as barristers this morning at the Appeal Court sitting with Chief Justice Hazen, and Justices White and Grimmer comprising the court. Two of them are graduates of the University of New Brunswick law school, Roscoe H. Allen, of Moncton, and James Vincent Nugent, also of Saint John. The other is Ralph H. McCready, of Moncton, N. B.

The case of Holmwood & Holmwood, (Newfoundland), Ltd., vs Young was continued in court this morning, after being adjourned from yesterday afternoon. P. J. Hughes, K. C., for the appellants finished his arguments while C. T. Richard, for the respondents, commenced argument. The case is being continued this afternoon and expectations are that it will be finished today. The final case on the docket, that of Nugent et al vs McLellan, et al, will be commenced tomorrow.

Month of May 1929 Banner Month For Revenue Returns—Increase of \$4,936.25—Report Sent Out.

An increase of \$4,936.25 was shown for the month of May, 1929, as compared to May, 1928, for total revenue collections as set forth in the monthly Customs reports sent out by L. C. Macnutt, Collector of National Revenue. The total revenue for the month of May this year was \$77,633.51 made up of Customs import duty, customs sales tax, customs excise, excise tax (domestic), excise duty and sundry collections.
