

FARMERS ADVISED TO HOLD EWE LAMBS THIS FALL

They will be Easily Worth Twenty Dollars Each---Wool Bringing a High Price at the Present Time and Will be Higher Next Season---Farmers Urged to Raise Sheep.

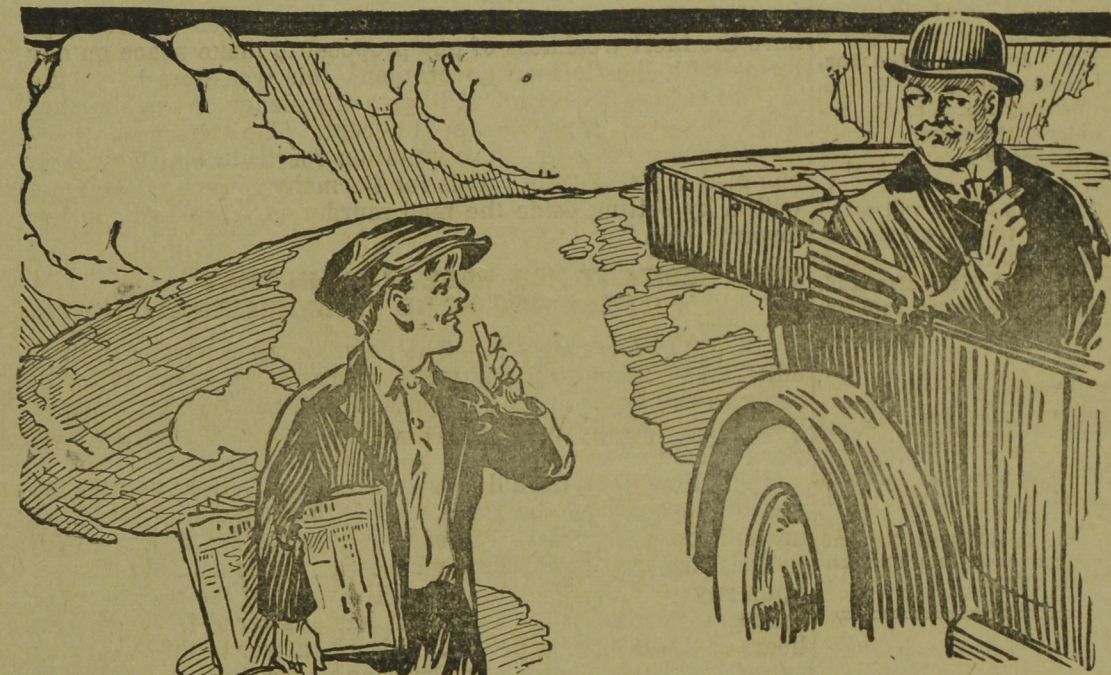
A number of farmers complain that a spring lamb will not give a lamb crop the first year. They will if properly attended to. Just as soon as the lambs are weaned turn them into a field of after-grass. Keep them growing and thrifty and just before the breeding season flush them out with a little bit of grain. This will insure a lamb crop the next spring.

What an Amateur Has Done.
Mr. W. C. Allison of the firm of Manchester, Robertson, Allison, has a farm at Rothesay. Last fall he purchased six grade ewes and a pure bred Shropshire ram lamb. This spring he sheared an average of eight pounds of wool from his ewes and he had a lamb crop that averaged 1 5-6 lambs per ewe.

Wool sold for 60 cents, that is, each ewe gave a wool crop valued at \$4.80. Lambs are easily worth \$10 a piece

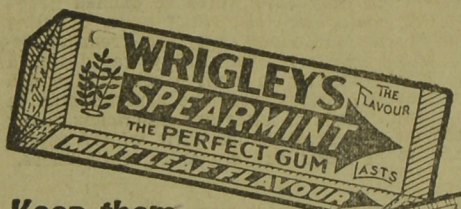

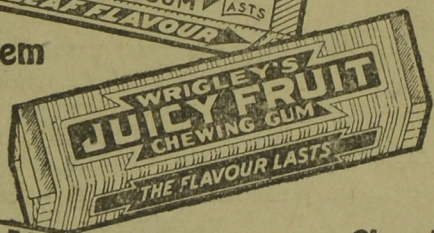

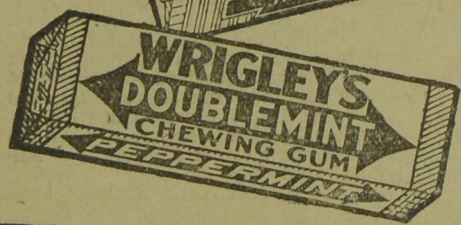

The English steamer Allen, loaded with 30,000 sacks of sugar is ashore on the north coast of Cuba and leaking badly. Two tugs from Havana have gone to her assistance. It is feared that a large part of her cargo will be lost.

The repairs have been completed on four of the interned German ships which were seized by the Cuban government on the declaration of war, and they are now ready for sea. These are the Bavaria, Olivant, Adelheid and Kydonia.

Notice has been received that the city of Santiago de Cuba is suffering from want of water. For lack of water to supply the boilers the electric plant and ice plant may be obliged to shut down, thus cutting off the electric light and street car service and the distribution of ice in the city.

TO EXTRACT OIL FROM SHALE

Carson City, Nev., Aug. 28.—The discovery of new process for extracting oil from shale has been achieved by A. H. Crane, who was serving a term in the state prison for burglary. The United Fruit Company have commenced a double service between New Orleans and Havana and Panama and Havana. There are now two steamers weekly, both ways, between these points.

A shipment consisting of 1,500 crates of potatoes arrived last week from Spain. On this week's steamer from Spain there were 3,200 crates. These potatoes were from the province of Valencia.

Hay is being sold to the retail trade in Havana at the rate of \$60 per ton, and oats at \$1.20 per bushel.

Sugar (unrefined) is selling today at \$6.25 per cwt. f.o.b. steamer Cuba.

Fifteen hundred tons of nitrate from Chile arrived today by way of the Panama Canal on the steamer Nora.

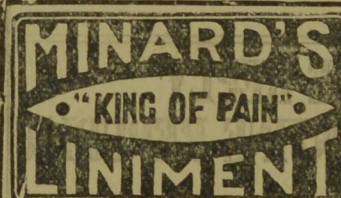
In the last twenty-four hours thirty fishing boats arrived at the port of Havana bringing in over 200,000 pounds of fish.

Cuba expends annually about \$8,000,000 for public works.

Arrangements have been made for establishing thirteen new lighthouses at different points on the coast as a cost of about \$1,500,000. These when completed will make a total of fifty-two lighthouses on the coast of Cuba.

The Bureau of Highways has made plans for a system of highways for the island, one along the north coast, one along the south coast and one pal towns. It is proposed to construct three highways from end to end of the island, one along the north coast, one along the south coast and one through the centre, these to be connected at intervals by roads running across the island. The existing highways will be utilized as far as possible but to carry out this proposed work over 2,000 miles of new highways will have to be constructed at a cost of about \$40,000,000.

A proposition which is gaining in favor daily has been made by the leading Havana newspapers that the Cuban government construct and send over to France a squadron of aeroplanes to take part in the war. Over one hundred and fifty young Cubans have already volunteered to go forward with this squadron.

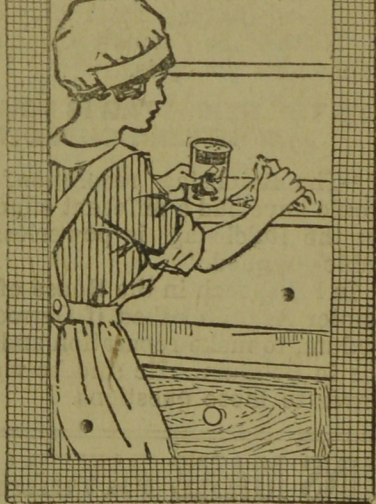
