The Coast of France Battered Last Night By Cyclonic Storm

Was Renewed Today With Greater Intensity—
Five Persons Reported Dead—Three Drown-
ed, Two Killed by a Falling Tree—Several
Ships Are Asking For Assistance.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

PARIS, December 30—A cyclonic storm which battered the coast of France last night renewed its attack today with fresh intensity. Five persons were dead, two killed by a falling tree at Hazebrouck and three drowned at Lehavre. Seven ships asked for assistance along the coast. Several towns were damaged and partly inundated by high waves that pounded the coast.

Shipping Disrupted.

Brest, France, December 30—A three masted Polish vessel was in great danger off the Brittany coast today as new gales disrupted shipping. Life saving crews on shore were attempting to aid. The relief tug Iroise answered a radio request to aid a Greek steamer off the French coast.

W. C. T. U. HEAD IS OPPOSED TO GOVT. CONTROL

Evansville, Ill., Dec. 29—The ultimate goal of American anti-prohibitionists is the establishment of government sale of liquor in the United States. Mrs. Ella A. Boole, president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, charged here tonight.

"The wets claim that the government sale of alcoholic liquors is free from the complications which they say have accompanied prohibition," Mrs. Boole continued in a letter she sent to all state presidents of the W. C. T. U. "The Canadian official report on the results of government sale in the various provinces will dispose these claims and will effectively put an end to any such campaign in this country."

"For the first time, the Canadian government, through its bureau of Statistics at Ottawa, has published the figures of sale, revenue and volume of liquor, and the attendant results in drunkenness and crime as far as possible."

"The results are plain, a tremendous drink bill; increasing consumption of whiskey; evidence that government sale does not promote temperance moderation and sobriety; nor that it prevents the establishment of drinking places nor the operations of bootleggers; an increase in drunkenness, an increase in alcoholism, and an increase in the convictions for drunken driving."

"The wets have succeeded in convincing themselves that liquor from a government bottle has no evil effects; but they have no support in their theory from the Dominion of Canada."

"We know that the American flag will never float over a system of liquor selling. Any doubt about it has been dissolved by the Canadian government's official statement of the facts."

WILL EVACUATE MANCHURIA

London, Dec. 30—Evacuation of the troops from Manchuria in accordance with the Sino-Russian treaty has already begun, according to dispatches from Riga.

MONCTON TO HAVE SHARP CIVIC CONTEST

Moncton, Dec. 29—Tomorrow will be nomination day for Moncton City elections and according to present indications a stiff battle for every office will take place. The present Mayor, Hanford Blakney, has announced his intention of running, while Alderman-at-large Foster Perry will also be in the field for the chief magistrate's chair. Ex-Mayor Ambrose Wheeler may also be a candidate, but he was reported today as being undecided. A fourth name which has been mentioned for some days may make the contest a three or four-cornered one if Mr. Wheeler decides to offer for office.

For the office of alderman-at-large there will also be a hard fight. Alderman B. W. Cummings, present word one representative, will be candidate for one of the two aldermen-at-large seats, while ex-Alderman Francis P. Murphy and ex-Alderman R. A. Freshet will also be in the running. It is expected that the other present aldermen-at-large, C. W. Redmond, will reoffer.

ADMIRAL BYRD WAS UNABLE TO ASSIST

NORTH SHORE WOMAN FOUND DEAD IN HOME

Lumber Scaler Returning From the Woods, Made a Gruesome Find.

Campbellton, Dec. 29—A gruesome discovery was made here last night when Claude Farrer, government scaler, who had returned from the woods for a holiday, entered the home of Mrs. Emily Murphy, at the western end of Campbellton, and found her dead on the kitchen floor, partially dressed. Dr. L. E. German, of this town, coroner, was immediately summoned, who pronounced life extinct and gave permission for the body to be removed to the undertaking parlors of John Tennier, adding that he would conduct an inquest into the death tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock. Chief of Police James H. Adams has started an investigation.

It is reported the woman was just seen by neighbors Friday night about 10.30 o'clock. She occupied the house with her daughter, the latter being absent at the time of death, working out as a domestic. It is said the woman was in the habit of doing odd chores around homes in Campbellton, but for the last week had been in her own house. She had resided in Campbellton for the last ten years, and was about fifty years of age.

Rumors were current that Mrs. Murphy had met her death through alcoholic poisoning, and that the police had found several bottles, said to have contained liquor about the house.

WILL VIEW THE BIG CATARACT

Rio De Janeiro, Dec. 29—Deputy Simoes Lopes shot and fatally wounded Deputy Sousa Filho, greatest orator of the Government party, on the floor of the Chamber of Deputies today in the first serious flare-up from the smoldering Brazilian political situation.

The wounded man died on the way to a hospital. Lopes and his son hurried to the central police station by auto and surrendered as mounted police surrounded the Chamber and arrested a number of politicians for questioning.

Canadian Airmen To Join in Search For Carl Eielson

Aviator and His Mechanic Have Been Missing For Seven Weeks—An Expedition of Three Cabin Planes Brought From Seattle is Being Fitted Out at Nome, Alaska.

NOME, ALASKA, December 30—Three Canadian airmen will join two pilots searching for Carl B. Eielson in the Arctic wastes near North Cape.

An expedition of three Fairchild cabin planes in charge of Captain "Pat" Rid, and with B. W. Broatch and Gifford Swartman as co-pilots, is ready to assist in the search for Eielson and his mechanic, Earl Borland, missing for seven weeks.

The Canadians whose planes were brought from Seattle on a coastguard cutter, have assembled their planes, tested them in the air and will fly to Nome or Teller to begin their search, as soon as flying conditions improve.

ARRESTED IN HALIFAX ON THEFT CASE

Saskatoon, Dec. 29—The famous Criminal Investigation Department, Scotland Yard, co-operating, the long arm of the law revealed its power Saturday in the arrest of Bert Gardiner, formerly of Saskatoon, at Halifax, N. S., on a warrant charging him with the theft of \$3,800 from Albert Malcolm, of this city.

Gardiner is alleged to have taken the money which Malcolm stated he gave him to buy goods in the east for a partnership the two were planning. Gardiner later sailed for England, where he was kept under constant watch by Scotland Yard, according to the local police chief, and when he sailed recently for New York, police on this side of the Atlantic knew of it immediately.

Gardiner is held at Halifax for export, having been arrested by Royal Canadian Mounted Police there.

PASSENGERS ENCOUNTERED BAD WEATHER

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 30—A special Canadian National Boat Train left here yesterday for Montreal and the west with passengers from the Cunard Liner "Audania" and the White Star Liner "Rurania" and the White Star port on Sunday from England. The passengers who spent Christmas at sea reported that the old ocean was in a boisterous mood that day but that the festivities were just as merry as if they had been ashore. The special train also took six carloads of mail mostly Christmas letters and parcels that missed previous boats. It was the second largest mail to be landed here this season coming here under Canadian National Railways auspices today three more liners are due in port with passengers from British and continental ports.

PEARLS WERE BOILED WITH THE OYSTERS

Stratford, Ont., Dec. 29—William J. Made, local confectioner saw what jewellers say was a small sized fortune slip through his fingers.

Thirty-six pearls, one of them the size of a small marble and said to be of excellent quality, were found in a pan of oyster soup which he had prepared for supper.

The fact, however, that he had boiled the oysters made the pearls valueless. Otherwise they would have netted him many hundreds of dollars according to a jeweller here, who examined them today.
