## AS TO GENIUS

Many young people spend a lot of time wishing they had genius. The only success they seem able to visualize or understand is the sudden success that sometimes comes through the possession of unusual talent. Their attention might be called to this paragraph by Julian Ralph: "I do not despise genius—indeed, I wish I had a basket of it instead of a brain, but yet, after a great deal of experience and observation, I have become convinced that industry is a better horse to ride than genius. It may never carry any one man as far as genius has carried individuals, but industry—patient, steady, intelligent industry—will carry thousands into comfort and even into celebrity, and this it does with absolute certainty; whereas genius often refuses to be tamed and managed, and often goes with wretched morals. If you are to wish for either, wish for industry."

## A SENATOR'S VIEW

Hon. Nathaniel Curry of Montreal, a native of Nova Scotia, a senator and president of the Canada Car and Foundry Company, sent the following message to the Temperance Reform Association prior to the recent plebiscite:

"Having watched for years the futile efforts of prohibitionists in Nova Scotia to maintain prohibition and also the increase of smuggling, perjury, larceny and drunkenness in that province; having also observed results of government control in other provinces I come to the conclusion that the people of Nova Scotia would benefit both morally and physically under government control of the purchase and sale of liquor."

The recent plebiscite taken in Nova Scotia on the liquor question shows that Hon. Joseph Howe, the great tribune of the people was something of a prophet. In a speech in the Nova Scotia House in 1855 on prohibition, Hon. Mr. Howe said: "This law may be partially enforced for two or three years, but it will coerce people into resistance and create a revulsion of feeling that will be followed by universal license." When he used the term "universal license" he probably meant government control.

Radio fans who have been listening in on a lot of political buncombe during the past fortnight, will be glad to learn that polling in the municipal elections of New York state takes place tomorrow. In New York city there are seven candidates for the mayoralty, including a Democrat, a fashion Republican, a square dealer, a Socialist, a communist and a lady. Mayor J. J. Walker, who has the support of Tammany Hall is a 15 to 1 favorite in the betting.

Rev. Noel H. Wilcox, of Halifax, a pioneer in the fight for a system of Government Control in the handling of the liquor traffic, says, "It now remains for all to join hands and assist the Government in the new form of legislation which will replace the N. S. T. A. I am proud of my native province tonight and happy."

Will the prohibitionists of Nova Scotia bow to the sovereign will of a free and enlightened electorate and support a policy of Government control. Or will they live up to their record and start in to condemn it before it is even given a trial?

The County of Digby, N. S., which is visited by thousands of tourists each season, rolled up a majority of 1500 for government control at the recent plebiscite. Two other counties in the Land of Evangeline, Kings and Annapolis went heavily for the Nova Scotia Temperance Act.

Sober Island, a small poll in the County of Halifax put itself on the

map at the recent election by voting 39 to 1 in favor of government control. Spry Harbor on the other hand went 44 to 8 in favor of prohibition.
