Conscription is perhaps the smallest question union government has to deal with. We would have lost everything that makes life worth living. Responsible government an untrammelled franchise, the right of the individual to all the liberty he can enjoy without trenching on the liberty of others—these are our treas ares, to have and to hold, and from time to time we must pay in blood and gold to make them secure. And the men who have paid in blood must not be left in the lurch by those who stay at home and pay in money.

Conscription is the last question, repeat, but it is at the back of Union government. It was conscription that first made union government necessary. For three years I pleaded a brief for the Liberal Party and I did with real pleasure as long as the party Moreover, I am a Liberal yet and I cherish great hopes that union government will take what there is best of Liberal ideas and Conservative sentiments and mold them over into a concinnate whole which will make for the progress and prosperity of Canada.
