THE GRAPE SEASON.

Grape Jelly.

Pick over grapes, remove from the stems and wash. Put in a white enamel kettle and let simmer over a slow fire until they are thoroughly softened. Strain through a jelly bag. Weigh the juice and allow one cup of sugar to each cup of juice. Put sugar in flat pans and heat in oven. Bring juice to the boiling point. Boil five minutes, skimming as needed. Add the heated sugar to the juice and boil three minutes or until a little will jelly on a cold saucer when tested. Turn into hot glasses and when cold cover with par-

affin wax or paper. Wild grapes make the best jelly.

Grape Conserve.

Wash 6 pounds of grapes and press the pulp from the skins. Cut one and a half oranges in thin slices, but do not remove skin. Cook the grape pulp in a double boiler until softened, and remove seeds by pressing through a sieve. Add the sliced oranges and the grape skins to the seedless pulp and cook until the skins are tender. Add one pound of seeded raisins and three pounds of sugar and let cook until as thick as marmalade. Turn into small jars or glasses, and seal.

Raisins.

Take an equal quantity of grapes and pears. Wash and stem the grapes and add just sufficient water to keep from burning and let them simmer until soft. Then put them through a sieve. Pare and core the pears and cut in thin slices. Add the sliced pears to the grape juice and let cook slowly until the pears are tender. Stir frequently to keep from burning. To each cup of the pear and grape mixture allow three-quarters of a cup of sugar. Cook until the consistency of marmalade. Turn into glasses and seal.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

In sprinkling table linen to be ironed use a glass sugar shaker, and in the water put a little cold starch (about a tablespoonful to a quart of water), the linen will have about the same stiffness as when new, after being ironed.

Tie a cloth on the mouth of the blueing bottle, and let the blueing strain through when pouring it into the tub. This will prevent spotted clothing.

Before baking potatoes, wash them and let them stand in hot water for 15 minutes; they will then require only half the time for baking, and will be more mealy.

To wash printed advertising from flour or salt bags, soak over night in kerosene, then wash in the usual way.

A sheet of corrugated cardboard is a handy thing to have on the writing desk to hold wet pens or brushes. The paper absorbs the liquid and the corrugations hold the pen brushes and pencils in handy position.

When basting velvet, use sewing silk. When the stitches are removed there will be no traces.



Military Service Act, 1917
Explanatory Announcement by the Minister of Justice

Should You Be Exempt?

Every facility is afforded those who have reasonable ground for applying for exemption under the Military Service Act. Each man's case will be considered by a local, civil board, sitting in the locality where he lives, and will be decided as is desirable in the national interest.

The idea behind the Military Service Act is to call up first only those whose absence from civilian occupations will cause least disturbance to the country's economic and social life. One hundred thousand reinforcements—no more—are to be raised under the Act.

Cases of Exemption

Over 1,250 civic tribunals have been organized throughout Canada, known as Exemption Tribunals. These Boards are comprised of 2 members, one appointed by the county judge and one by a joint committee of Parliament. It will be seen that these tribunals are non-military and independent. The members are men closely acquainted with conditions in the places where they sit and will be able to give each case sympathetic attention.


National Interest Will Govern Exemptions

Consideration will be given to applications for exemption received from men engaged in the production or manufacture of commodities necessary to the conduct of the war and the support of those at home, and cases in which real hardship would be caused by the withdrawal. Not all men who register these claims will be exempted, but such claims will receive careful attention. National interest must govern.

Promptness is Essential

Prompt application for exemption is strongly urged upon all who, being included in the first class, believe they deserve exemption. But first visit a Medical Board and find out if any further action is required. Unless the Medical examination places you in Category A, you will have no immediate obligation for service.

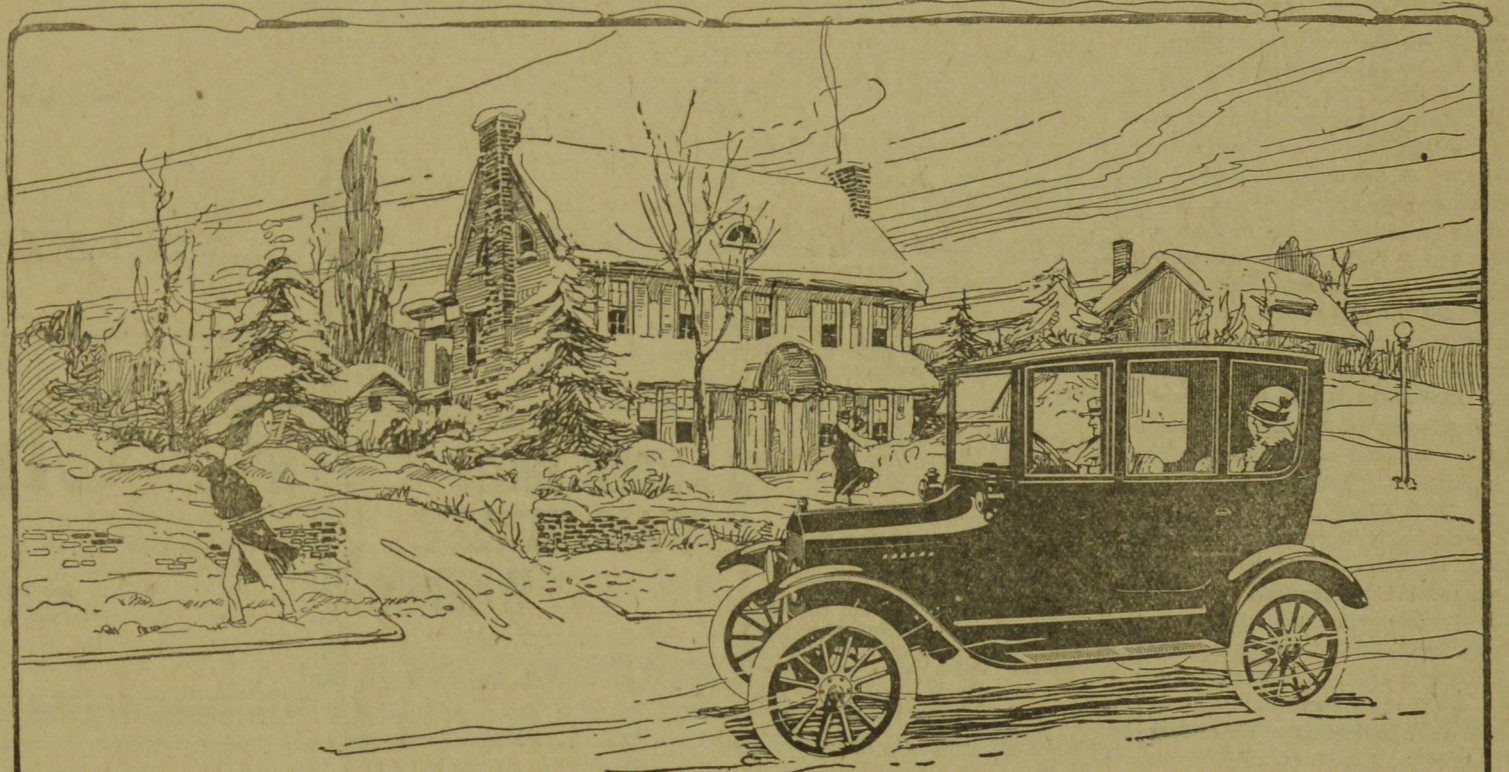
