TRIBUTE TO SIR WILFRID.

The Toronto Star, Liberal, which supports the principle of union government, pays the following worthy tribute to Sir Wilfrid Laurier:

"The Liberal party in Canada is divided by an honest difference of opinion. Those who are obliged to disagree with Sir Wilfrid Laurier will recognize that on the question of conscription he has been consistent and clear, that there was never for a moment any doubt as to where he stood, and that he was as sincere in his convictions and as honestly desirous of serving his country as any of those who differed with him.

"Nor can any such difference of opinion cause the people of Canada to forget the great services rendered by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to his country. Always he has striven for national unity, contending against intolerance in his own province and in Ontario, and seeking to unite all Canadians in co-operation for common aims. This acknowledgement the Star makes with all sincerity at this moment when we find ourselves out of sympathy with him.

"The fifteen years of his Administration will be remembered as marking an era of rapid growth and prosperity such as had never before been witnessed in Canada. His government at last sustained an honorable defeat on a question of principle, and the policy of reciprocity which he advocated has been adopted in its main features, by his most bitter opponents.

"As to the future, and as one of the results of the coming election, we may expect to see the veteran leader remain in public life as a parliamentary leader of distinction and eloquence. We are apt sometimes to pay too little heed to parliamentary life in Canada, and to regard parliament merely as an instrument for registering and carrying out the will of a government. The independence and dignity of parliament are essential to healthy public life. Parliament is the only means the people possess of exercising control over the government, and upon its wisdom and the freedom of its deliberations much depends."

Certain rabid Tory papers, which profess to be much enthused over the union government, can help along the cause by cutting out their low abuse of the great Liberal chieftain. The villainous cartoons which emanate from the Toronto News office and are passed along to the smaller fry of Tory papers, might also be relegated to the scrap heap. The sacred cause of unity in Canada cannot be furthered by low down appeals to passion and religious prejudice.

The New York Herald, in an editorial on the disposition of the Kaiser, objects to the course suggested by some that he be sent to St. Helena. It thinks that would be an insult to the memory of the great Napoleon and the French nation. It suggests instead the Chicago stockyards, "where the imperial exile could gratify his blood lust by listening to the cheerful sound of the cleaver and watching the herds of cattle marching to death in mass formation, as the German soldiers marched towards Verdun." It points out too that it is necessary to "first catch your hare."

It is understood that the proposed war committee of the union cabinet will include: Sir Robert Borden, the Prime Minister; Sir Thomas White, Finance Minister; Major General Mewburn, Minister of Militia; Hon. N. W. Rowell, President of the Council; Hon. Arthur Meighen, Minister of the Interior; Hon. Frank B. Carvell, Minister of Public Works, and Sir James Loughheed. This smaller cabinet will correspond to the war cabinet of five established by Mr. Lloyd George when he created his union administration.

Toronto Globe: The Hon. Mr. Doherty sees the end of the party system in the formation of the union government. This is too rose-colored a view. A country can be united on an issue on which all think alike, such as the German menace; but the time will not come soon when all people will think alike on social problems.

Sydney Record: Hon. Robert Rogers is probably none too pleased to know that Hon. Frank B. Carvell now presides over the Federal department which he himself once headed. Mr. Carvell's quickness to expose and to condemn bad management or wrongdoing—no matter whose reputation suffers in the process—is very well known to the Manitoba ex-minister.

The policy laid down by the union government contains some good features which show that the Liberals who have joined hands with Sir Robt. Borden are beginning to make their influence felt.

Toronto Globe: The majority of the draftees are asking for exemption. If they believe they have valid reason there can be no objection. The exemption tribunals will be able to do the selecting, which is one of the advantages of the draft system.

The profits made on bacon last year by leading Canadian packing houses were 4.3 per cent, on the turnover, not the capital. This is a distinction with a big difference, says the Toronto Globe.

FRESHMEN LOST TO FREDERICTON HIGH, 18 TO 6

High School Team Had Changed Line-Up — Freshmen Lacked Training and Combination.

A very fast game of football was played at College Field yesterday afternoon when Fredericton High School defeated the U.N.B. Freshmen by the score of 18 to 6. In the first half the score stood 11 to 0 in favor of High School who easily obtained the lead by scoring three tries and by converting one of them.

The Freshmen seemed dazed in the first part of the match and played a poor defensive game. As all the High School boys played well it would be hard to pick the better players. McAdam and Lounsbury played well, McAdam showing good punting and tackling ability and Lounsbury being up to his usual form doing excellent tackling and making several good runs with the ball.

Second Half.

In the second half the Freshmen bucked up and produced two tries. The playing was very good on both sides in this period. Lounsbury dropped a field goal from the twenty-five yard line and later scored the final try in the last half minute of play.

Rankin of the Freshmen team played a good game and so did Ryan and Shea. Betts put up a steady game at quarter. The team has not the combination that is necessary, but as there is very good material there is no doubt that they will soon have a good working team.

Mr. J. McIntosh of the University of New Brunswick refereed the game very satisfactorily, though some decisions seemed very close.

LAUDER HAD WALL STREET WEEPING

New York, Oct. 20.—Harry Lauder, the famous Scotch comedian, disorganized the machinery of Wall Street for half an hour yesterday when in an impassioned appeal for subscriptions to the Liberty Loan, he addressed a crowd too great for the police to handle. The famous financial centre was so crowded from building to building that women fainted in the crush, and reserves were called out to disentangle the mass of humanity that sought to get within range of the little Scotchman's voice.

As, standing on the steps of the sub-treasury, Lauder told of his pride in his son, Captain Jock Lauder, who "went over the top" and never came back, the great crowd was moved to tears, and when he concluded and called for subscriptions, more than five thousand dollars was deposited in his hands by clerks and stenographers from neighboring office buildings in less than five minutes.
