Want Price Increased.

The milk producers of the city of Fredericton and vicinity are holding a meeting at Long's Hotel this afternoon which started at two o'clock. The producers want to boost the price of milk, claiming the dealers do not pay them enough to cover expenses.

Potatoes Higher.

Potatoes which have been selling at \$2.50 and \$3.00 per barrel have advanced in price to \$3.50 and \$4.00. Quite a number changed hands at the latter figure in the market this morning. The outlook for cheap potatoes during the coming winter is not very bright.

Recruits Still Coming.

The recruiting office is receiving quite a number of recruits since permission was given Sergt. Major H. T. Brewer to have the office remain open until the end of this month. Last week fifteen local men were secured and this week seventeen men had been sworn in and of that number twelve were local boys.

Successful Hunters.

A number of friends gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred B. Smith, Regent Street, last evening and gave them a pleasant surprise on the occasion of the thirtieth anniversary of their wedding day. During the evening the bride of thirty years ago was presented with a dozen sterling silver knives and forks. Mr. J. W. Spurden made the presentation in a felicitous speech to which Mr. Smith made a suitable reply. Refreshments were afterwards served and a couple of hours were very pleasantly spent.

Week End Market.

Notwithstanding the inclement weather there was a very fair market this morning. Apples were very plentiful and the farmers seemed to have great difficulty in disposing of them. The price ranged from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per barrel. Potatoes were scarce and brought as high as \$4. Turnips sold at \$1, carrots at \$1.50, eggs at 50 cents; butter at 45 and 48 cents; pork at 20 cents by the carcass, and chickens at \$1.25 and \$1.50; fowls at \$1.25; ducks at \$2; geese at \$1.50, and lamb at \$1.50 to \$2.

Death at Hospital.

William Steen of Hamtown, passed away at the Victoria Hospital last evening after a short illness. The deceased was sixty-two years of age and is survived by his widow, six daughters and four sons. The funeral will take place on Monday afternoon from his late home at Hamtown at 2.30, and interment will be made at Cardigan cemetery. Rev. M. Turner will conduct the funeral service.

DEVON WOMAN
SENTENCED TO
6 MONTHS' JAIL

**Pleaded Guilty to the Charge
of Stealing Furniture—
Was Already Serving
Jail Term.**

A case of theft in Devon charged against a man and his wife by Constable Charles W. Barker was before Magistrate Limerick in the police court here yesterday.

It appears that some furniture was stored in a house owned by Mrs. Mary Kiteehn, Devon, and the house was closed up. Certain pieces of furniture had disappeared and the matter was placed in Constable Barker's hands for investigation and a search warrant issued. Constable Barker located the house containing the stolen furniture and had warrants issued on the owner. They were brought before the police magistrate and pleaded not guilty as they knew nothing about the furniture. The case against them was dismissed, but as the lower flat of their house was sublet, a second search warrant was obtained and there the stolen furniture was found.

Given Six Months.

The occupants of the flat, a woman, was brought before the magistrate, and at first pleaded not guilty, saying she had bought the furniture from the owner. Finding the case was against her she pleaded guilty and was sentenced to six months in jail.

Already Doing Term.

She is already doing a term of two months in jail and this new sentence will be begun upon the expiration of the two months. The magistrate stated that at the expiration of the two months, if she would leave this city and Devon for elsewhere the sentence would not be enforced.

KING'S BOUNTY
COMES TO HAND
FOR TRIPLETS

**Domestic Event in Family of
Mr. Charles Miller is Re-
cognized by the
Sovereign.**

Their Majesties the King and Queen have awarded a bounty of five pounds sterling to the triplets born to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Miller of Caverhill, York County a few months ago. In the month of July Dr. C. E. Morehouse, ex-M. P. P., who was the attending physician, and has taken a warm interest in the case of the triplets, had some correspondence on the subject with Hon J. D. Hazen. On the advice of the latter he afterwards communicated with Sir Joseph Pope, under secretary of state. Nothing more was heard on the subject until this morning when Dr. Morehouse received a letter from Hon. Mr. Hazen, enclosing one from Sir Joseph Pope, containing the King's bounty of three pounds. The doctor will turn the gift over to the parents some time today.

The triplets consisted of two boys and a girl. Although all were apparently strong and healthy, one of the boys contracted cholera infantum a few weeks ago and died before medical help could be procured. The two survivors are getting along well and it is to be hoped will be spared to enjoy the bounty and other gifts which they have received.
