The Graf Zeppelin Reached Her Home Port Early Today

Germany's Mistress of the Air, Now on a Round the World Flight, Docked at Freiderichshafen at 7.02 a. m.—Completed the Voyage in 55 Hours and 20 Minutes, Breaking Her Own Record By 13 Hours.

FREIDERICHSHAFEN, GERMANY, August 10—Germany's mighty mistress of the air, the dirigible, Graf Zeppelin, returned triumphantly to its home base at Freiderichshafen at 1.02 p. m. today (7.02 a. m.) after a record breaking trans-Atlantic flight from the United States.

The giant ship, carrying twenty-two passengers and a crew of forty men, landed at the airport here just fifty-five hours and twenty minutes after it had taken off from Lakehurst, N. J. at 11.42 p. m. Eastern Standard time on Wednesday night, thus lowering her own record for the flight by thirteen hours and twenty-six minutes. It was regarded by many experts as the most sensational flight ever accomplished by a lighter than air craft.

Eckener Heard From.

Freiderichshafen, Germany, August 10—Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the trans-Atlantic dirigible Graf Zeppelin sent a wireless to the zeppelin works at 10.55 a. m. today saying he would arrive here at 1 p. m. (7 a. M. E. S. T.)

VIOLENT STORM SWEEPED OVER CHILEAN PORT

Craft in the Harbor Moved to Place of Safety—Worst Storm in Many Years.

Antofagasta, Chile, Aug. 10—The most violent storm seen here in years today destroyed the visible parts of Antofagasta port and obliged all the craft in the harbor to move to a safer place in order to avoid the breaking of anchorage and collisions. So far no casualties have been reported but the whole populace was alarmed by the violence of the storm.

CNRA RADIO STATION IN A BIG HOOKUP

Chain Programs Will Now be Regular Weekly Features.

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 10—Last night CURA at Moncton was tied in with the Canadian National Railways network. Including Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa and London, Ont.—in the first of a regular series of chain programmes to be broadcast through radio stations of the National System—it originate at Montreal and was later transferred to the Chateau Laurier Hotel at Ottawa, where an hours programme of dance music was put on the air. The chain programme commenced at ten P. M., Atlantic Standard Time, and continued till midnight. As previously announced in the press, chain broadcasts will now be a feature of the Canadian National Railways radio programmes on Tuesday evening next, August 13th. Commencing at nine P. M., Atlantic Standard Time. A French hour originating Montreal will be put on the air to be followed by a studio programme from Toronto, commencing at ten P. M.

Average Market

The market this morning was somewhat smaller than last Saturday. Grilse were being offered at 70 cents apiece; Salmon were still 25 cents per pound; Chicken, and fowl, were still conspicuous by their scarcity. Butter was 35 cents to 38 cents per pound; Egg, 38 cents per doz; Potatoes, 30 cents per peck; Beans, 28 per peck; Veal, 12 to 15 cents per pound; Lamb, 25 cents per lb; Raspberries, 25 cents per quart; Carrots, Beets, etc., 10 cents per bunch.

BIG INCREASE IN REVENUE OF THE DOMINION

Increase of Over \$14,000,000 For the First Four Months of the Present Fiscal Year.

Ottawa, Aug. 9—Ordinary revenue of the Dominion of Canada increased by \$14,125,696 during the four months of the present fiscal year, which ended on July 31 last, as compared with the corresponding period a year ago, according to finance department figures issued today. Total ordinary revenue of Canada up to July 31 of the present fiscal year was \$181,098,955. On July 31, a year ago, it amounted to \$166,973,260.

Ordinary expenditure of the Dominion showed an increase of \$1,712,667, when the two four-month periods are compared. The statement issued from the finance department shows ordinary expenditures totalling \$103,167,638, for the four months, April, May, June and July. For the same four months a year ago, the Dominion showed a total ordinary expenditure of \$101,454,971.

Debt is Lower.

The net debt of the Dominion decreased by \$9,387,580 in the year which has elapsed since July 31, 1928. On that date Canada's debt stood at \$2,235,680,993. On July 21, 1929, the net debt was \$2,144,193,413. The statement represents only figures which passed through the books of the finance department up to the end of July 31 last.

Customs collections of the Dominion continue to show an increase. Comparison of the two four-month periods show an increase in favor of the present fiscal year of \$5,529,971. Customs duties collected in the first four months of the last fiscal year, amounted to \$60,769,809. In the four months just ended they totalled \$66,362,780.

Duties Higher

Excise duties also advanced. The figure for last year was \$20,573,592. For the four months of the present year, they reached the figure of \$21,847,490.

LAND OF THE SOVIET IS DOING WELL

Novo, Sibersk, Siberia, Aug. 10—The huge Russian airplane (Land of the Soviets), took off for Krasnoyarsk, the next scheduled stop on its flight from Moscow to the United States at 10.20 a. m. today.

The Soviet plane, which is manned by four of Russia's crack fliers, is to be flown to Seattle via Siberia and Alaska, and thence across the United States to New York.

Aviator Home

Frank Shute, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur A. Shute of this city arrived home recently from Owen Sound, Ontario, where he has been engaged as assistant instructor in an aviation school recently formed there. To gether with Arthur Burt, also of this city, the young aviator is at work at the new training school. Both young men are graduates from the aviation school at Hamilton, Ontario and are fast winning their spurs as prominent airmen.

BRITISHERS SOLIDLY AT SNOWDEN'S BACK

His Diplomatic Stand at The Hague is Strongly Approved.

WHOLE NATION REJOICING

Tory Papers Say That Churchill Would Have Done Same Thing.

London, Aug. 10—The dramatic stand of Right Hon. Philip Snowden, for British interests at the Hague conference on reparations has been remarkable for the unanimity of the support accorded him by the British people. The Express today says: "There is an outburst of popular feeling in support of Mr. Snowden" and speaks of the whole nation rejoicing. Even confirmed Conservative newspapers, like the morning Post and the Morning Telegraph, declare that Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill would have taken a similar attitude had he still been Chancellor of the Exchequer.

J. H. BROWN GETS IMPORTANT APPOINTMENT

The funeral of the late Edith Lawson, 14-year-old daughter of Harry Lawson, of this city, who met death yesterday near noon, when hurled against a tree in King street, by a Connecticut car, was held this afternoon from the late home in Charlotte street at two o'clock. Rev. Mr. Kierstead conducted the service assisted by Rev. Mr. Watson, following which the remains were taken to Penniac, where interment was made in the cemetery there. The service this afternoon was attended by many sympathizing friends of the family, who paid tribute in kind words and flowers to the grief stricken parents. The pall bearers at the funeral were Cecil Lawson, Vernon Saunders, Arthur Saunders, and Burnet Lawson.

Declined to Sell

All is Reported Quiet Along the Siberian Front

Recent Rumors of Bombardments Are Contradicted by the Authorities at Harbin—Efforts Still Being Made to Arrange a Conference For an Amicable Settlement.

TOKIO, August 10—Contradicting recent rumors, the authorities at Harbin, Manchuria, reported officially today that there were no bombardments anywhere along the Siberian-Manchurian border, where Soviet and Chinese troops are concentrated as a result of the dispute over the Chinese Eastern Railway.

The Harbin officials stated all was quiet along the border and that efforts were still being made to arrange a conference for an amicable settlement of the trouble. They added that the dissemination of false reports about bombardments was hampering the peace efforts.

TO ELIMINATE MORE GRADE CROSSINGS

The Minister of Public Works Awards an Important Contract to the Canada Construction Company of This City.

Another contract for the elimination of dangerous grade crossings on New Brunswick's main trunk highways was awarded by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, today, when he accepted the tender of Canada Construction Company, of Fredericton, for a project which will eliminate two very dangerous level crossings on No. 11 MacMine Trunk Highway just east of the town limits of Campbellton.

This project provides for a steel span supported on two concrete and masonry abutments which will carry highway traffic parallel with the railway on the main line of the Canadian National Railways or the side near the shore of the Restigouche river, the plans having been prepared by the Bridge Division of the Department of Public Works and approved by Canadian National Railways and the Dominion Railway Commission, which are participating parties. The contract price is approximately \$52,000.

The superstructure will consist of a through truss rivetted steel span of 65 feet, centre to centre. The span will have a permanent concrete flooring and will also have a projected sidewalk on the outer side.

CONVICTS IN ARGENTINA MAKE TROUBLE

Buenos Aires, Aug. 10—One convict was killed and sixteen others were injured at the Assuncion City Prison when the inmates mutinied and attacked the guards, according to dispatches to the newspaper Laprensa today. The prison authorities were obliged to ask for the assistance of troops to aid in quelling the mutiny.

WALTER BURNHAM PASSED AWAY SUDDENLY

Was a Native of the Old Country and an Expert Gardener—For Many Years an Employ of the Late Michael Ryan.

Mr. Walter Burnham, a veteran employe of M. Ryan & Sons, Limited, passed away suddenly yesterday afternoon. He had been going about his regular work as usual but had been complaining of pains in his head. His death was naturally a great shock to his family and friends.

The deceased was a native of Oxford, England, where he was born in 1856. He came to Canada in 1874, and for a time was employed as gardener by the Late Lieutenant Governor Tilley and also by the late Capt. Powys. He was in the employ of the late Mr. Michael Ryan for twenty-five years. The deceased was an expert gardener, and boasted the most beautiful flower beds in the city. In 1878 he married Miss Jane Dow of Glasgow, Scotland and their family consisted of one daughter and two sons. Mrs. W. B. Gillman of Springhill and Geoffrey and George of this city. One sister the last of a family of nine, resides at Reading, England. The late Mr. Burnham was a member of Islington Lodge of the Sons of England, and worshipped at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church. Mr. and Mrs. Burnham celebrated their golden wedding in 1928.

The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon at two o'clock with services at the late home of the deceased, Government Lane.
