

THIRTEEN ZEPPELINS TOOK PART IN RAID IN ENGLAND

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

Paris, Oct. 23.—Official examination of the crews of the Zeppelins captured in France on returning from the raid over England shows that the expedition consisted of thirteen airships which left singly from three depots on the night of October 19. The raid was expected to last from twenty to twenty-five hours.

The raiders made for the British coast which was reached by lighthouses. They were hampered considerably by the fire of British anti-aircraft guns and by numerous searchlights, which caused them to drop almost all their bombs when sailing at a height of more than 16,000 feet. They were caught by a strong northeasterly wind and when they attempted to return to their bases their speed was slackened by the persistent head winds. At dawn the L-49, the airship which fell intact into the hands of the French, dropped to a lower altitude, her commander believing he was over Holland or Westphalia. The crew waved white flags. It was not until after 8 o'clock in the morning that the commander became aware that he was over France and at the same time the Zeppelin was sighted by French airplanes, which forced it to land.

A little later the L-50 passed over the L-49, which was then on the ground surrounded by French airplanes. The L-50 manoeuvred for a landing in a neighboring wood to give the members of the crew as good an opportunity as possible to save themselves, but the car was torn off. Afterwards the car was destroyed by means of a special gun firing inflammable charges. The L-49 and L-50

belong to the super-Zeppelin class, measuring 650 feet. Their crews are made up mostly of petty officers who have undergone a special course of instruction. They were clad in furs and leather garments.

GOVERNMENT WILL NOT ABANDON CONSCRIPTION

Ottawa, Oct. 23.—It is positively stated in official circles that there is no foundation for stories to the effect that the government will abandon conscription because of the large number of applications made for exemption. The military service board is proceeding with its work with the full expectation of carrying out its plans to have the first drafts called out for service on December 10. Exemption boards will have a big task to deal with all the applications for exemption but there is no reason to believe that it cannot be successfully accomplished.

Montreal, Oct. 23.—The Montreal Herald today published under an Ottawa dateline a despatch which claimed that conscription would be abandoned, and that the government was planning a masterly retreat. The despatch contended that even the war ministers of the measure have become frightened at the number of applications for exemption. It was estimated that the retreat would be made strategically that the dates of the sittings of the exemption board would be postponed. The excuse that would be given would be that the work was too onerous for the boards to undertake during the election campaign and to finish before Christmas.

THE POTATO SITUATION

Ottawa, Oct. 23.—Correspondents of the food controller's office telegraphed yesterday the following reports on the potato situation. At Toronto, Ontario potatoes sold at \$1.60 yesterday. At Montreal the prices for Quebec, New Brunswick and Ontario potatoes were \$2.35, \$2.30 and \$2.50 respectively.

Farmers in the Chateauguay district received \$1.70 to \$2.20. At Quebec City, potatoes sold at \$1.90 to \$2.10, with no New Brunswick potatoes on the market.

At Halifax, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island potatoes sold at \$1.50 to \$1.75. Western Nova Scotia farmers are receiving \$1.50, while those in eastern Nova Scotia are getting \$1.38. New Brunswick local potatoes sold at \$2.20, with the market bare.

Charlottetown, P. E. I. reports that growers are receiving \$1.25 to \$1.30 per 90 lbs. in bulk, with about one-half the shipments going to the United States.

Yesterday's American market quotations: Boston, \$2.60 per 90 lbs.; New York, \$2.75 and Buffalo \$2.50. These quotations are wholesale.

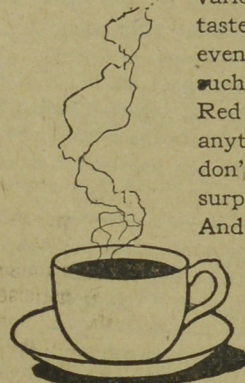

Directions for Employers

Who Purpose Claiming Exemption for Class One Men in Their Employ

THE following course is recommended for employers who have in their employ any number of men—bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before Jan. 1st, 1917, and who propose claiming exemption for any of these men, to continue in work which is deemed to be in the National interest:

First, it will simplify matters for you and for the exemption tribunals if you instruct Class One men in your employ to go up for medical examination at the nearest Medical Board Centre.

Only Class One men, who upon medical examination are placed in Category A are liable for immediate service under the Act. Class One men placed in Categories B, C or E satisfy immediate requirements if they attach their medical report to their claim for exemption.

Employer's Statement and Schedule

Second, prepare a full statement of the total number of your employees grouping them according to their respective occupations and qualifications and stating the number in each group. Indicate the possibility of otherwise of replacing the labour of Class One men with the labour of those unavailable for military service, or outside the statutory class called up; the extent to which the withdrawal of men in the statutory class would affect the business, the reason for considering that the carrying on of the business is in the National interest, and such other facts and circumstances as may appear to be relevant.

Append to this general statement and classification, a schedule of the names, ages and occupations of all men in Class One, indicating as to those who have been medically examined, the medical Category in which they have been placed, noting against each name whether or not you propose to claim exemption on behalf of the man.

Where exemption is claimed employer should state his opinion whether such exemption should be conditional on the man's continuing to follow his present occupation and whether it would suffice if exemption were granted for one, two or more months, as the case may be.

A copy of both statement and schedule should be prepared for each man for whom the employer is applying for exemption.

Forms for Exemption

These forms may be obtained on request from any Post Master, who will transmit the forms when filled in, to the Registrar.

Claims for exemption must be made not later than November 10th.
