Turnips sold for \$1, beef at 10 and 12 cents, pork at 20 cents, butter at 48 cents, eggs at 50 cents, chickens at \$1.50 and \$2, fowls at \$2, lamb at \$1.50 and \$2.

New Brigadier General.
News has been received of the further promotion of Colonel C. W. Weldon McLean, this time to the rank of brigadier general. To few men has this war brought rapid promotion and great distinction as has come to this gallant and capable young Canadian, who is a son of Brigadier General H. H. McLean. Entering the war in Imperial service with rank of captain, Brigadier General McLean has not only won steady promotion to his present rank but has won the D. S. O. and two bars as a unique distinction in the British army. He began his military service in South Africa, being lieutenant in G Company, 2nd Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment.

Late Rev. Chas. H. Fullerton.
The Rev. Charles Henry Fullerton of Prince William, died suddenly at the home of his brother, 957 South street, Roslindale, Mass., early Monday morning, October 15th. He was the eldest son of the late Augustus Fullerton of Annapolis, N. S. He was a graduate of King's College, Windsor (N. S.) where he studied theology, and afterwards was ordained to the Episcopal ministry. He had been rector of parishes at Falmouth (N. S.), Petitcodiac and Dalhousie (N. B.) and for the past fourteen years, of Prince William (N. B.).

Mr. Fullerton is survived by his wife and two daughters, Agnes Lillian Fullerton, at home, and Grace Louise Fullerton, who is a graduate of the Truesdale Hospital Training School for Nurses at Fall River (Mass.), and four brothers, Frank, of Roslindale; Joseph H., of Brookline (Mass.) Archibald, of Saskatchewan, and Leonard, who is with the British troops in London.

The funeral took place at the home of his brother Frank, in Roslindale Wednesday afternoon. The Rev. Chas. E. Wilson, rector of the Church of Our Saviour, officiated. Many beautiful floral tributes were received from relatives and friends.

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FREDERICTON

T. B. Kidner, Vocational Sec., and Lt. G. H. Boyd—Conference Yesterday with Premier Foster.

Mr. T. B. Kidner of Ottawa, formerly Director of Manual Training in New Brunswick, now Vocational Secretary, Military Hospitals Commission, accompanied by Lieut. G. H. Boyd of Ottawa, who is to be Vocational Officer for New Brunswick when the vocational schools for returned soldiers are established, arrived in Fredericton this morning. They are registered at the Queen Hotel. Their visit to Fredericton is in connection with the construction of the new buildings at the Old Government House grounds which are to be used as a Vocational Home for returned soldiers. From Fredericton Mr. Kidner and Mr. Boyd will go to Halifax.

Conference at St. John.
At St. John yesterday both these gentlemen attended a meeting at which were present Hon. W. E. Foster, premier of New Brunswick, Prof. Sxeton of Halifax, principal Vocational Officer for Eastern Canada, and Major W. J. Osborne of Fredericton, officer commanding "K" Unit, M. H. C. C. Premier Foster informed the officers of the M. H. C. that the provincial government would do all in its power to further the work of assisting the returned soldiers. The instruction now being given at St. John is to be extended. When the new building in Fredericton is completed extensive courses will be given. Tubercular soldiers will be instructed at River Glade and at East St. John, the institutions there being enlarged for the purpose. Practical instruction in manufacturing plants also is to be given.

ORGANIZATION
IS PROGRESSING

Mr. J. D. Palmer, who has charge of the Victory Loan campaign in the counties of York and Sunbury, reports that considerable progress has been made in the matter of organizing the two counties. An office has been opened in the Julius Inches building, 394 Queen street, which will be the headquarters for York-Sunbury. A considerable staff will be employed there when the campaign is fully launched.

The executive which was appointed at a public meeting a few days ago is to meet tonight for the purpose of making further arrangements.

The intention of the executive is to organize York and Sunbury counties that every prospective buyer of the loan will be listed so that the salesmen will have an opportunity of knowing just where every person is.

Emphasis is to be placed upon the fact that the Victory Loan affords one of the best investments ever placed before the public.

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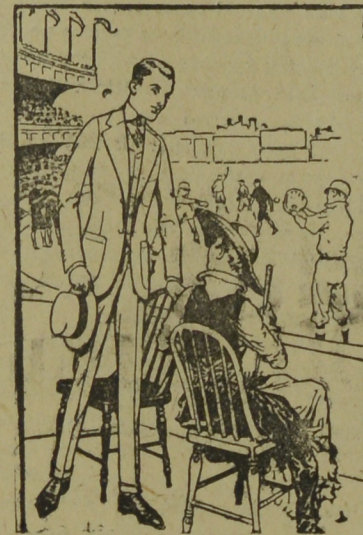
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
