Five Burned to Death When Plane Crashed in Flames

Tri-Motored Passenger Craft en Route From London to Berlin, Met With Disaster Near Marden Park, England—Three of the Victims Were Passengers—German Prince Escaped.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

GODSTONE, England, November 6—A tri-motored Lufthansa passenger plane, en route from London to Berlin with eight persons aboard, crashed in flames today at Marden Park between Godstone and Caterham. Five of the occupants burned to death including the German Prince, Eugene Von Der Schomburg Lippe.

Three of the victims were passengers, all English. They were D. L. Jones, H. S. Gasper and G. Milne. The fifth victim was one of the planes pilots, Redchinke. All were burned to death in the wreckage of the passenger plane.

German Prince Escaped.

London, November 6—The German Embassy issued a statement today saying that the German Prince, Eugene Von Der Schomburg Lippe, had escaped alive from the burning wreckage of the Lufthansa passenger plane which crashed near Godstone, Surrey, this morning.

Previous reports said the prince, acting as second pilot on the London-Berlin passenger plane had been burned to death with four others.

WINTER TRAVEL TO WEST INDIES TO BE HEAVY

The C. N. R. Steamships Making Last Trip of the Season From Montreal—To Dock at Halifax.

Montreal, Que., Nov. 6—Halifax will be the port of arrival of the R. M. S. "Lady Rodney" of the Canadian National Steamships in the West Indies service, on next trip instead of Montreal, where she docks yesterday. This will be her last appearance at this port until next spring. The winter sailings for the western group of the West Indies Islands, including Bermuda and Jamaica will commence with the "Lady Somers" on December 7th from Halifax. The latter vessel will arrive at Montreal for the last time this season on November 19th, sailing November 23rd., and returning to Halifax. The "Lady Rodney" sails from Montreal on Saturday next.

For the Winter Season, the Canadian National Steamships will maintain a fortnightly service during the month of November, for both passengers and freight from Maritime ports to Bermuda, the West Indies and Demerara (British Guiana and thereafter a weekly service to Bermuda and fortnightly to the Eastern and Western groups of the West Indies Islands and Belize, British Honduras.

According to the passenger manager of the Canadian National Steamships, Thomas Cree, who recently returned from a trip to all ports of call as far as British Guiana, says travel will be particularly heavy this coming winter. Arrangements have been made for shore excursions at all of the stopping places.

George W. Babbitt, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia at St. Andrews is spending his vacation at his former home here.

MAYOR WALKER IS RE-ELECTED IN NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 5—Mayor James J. Walker was re-elected mayor of New York in the quadrennial municipal election today in a great Democratic sweep.

He had a lead of 394,645 votes over Congressman Fiorello H. LaGuardia, Republican fusion candidate in 2,600 districts out of the 3,411 in the city. The Democrat landslide was indicated in the first returns. Thereafter every district vote count added to the mounting today.

CURLEY ELECTED

Boston, Nov. 5—James M. Curley was elected mayor of Boston for the third time today with a plurality of 20,000 votes. Curley was given a close race by Frederick W. Mansfield and both Curley and Mansfield far outstripped Daniel H. Coakley, who was credited with only a few thousand votes. All were Democrats.

Curley, who waged an independent fight which saw him in harmony with most of the Democrat leaders for almost of the first time, had 115,998 votes to Mansfield's 96,867 with but one precinct to be heard from. Coakley was trailing with 2,964.

During the campaign, which was not as intense as past campaigns Boston has witnessed, Curley was backed by the Democratic machine.

Mansfield found his chief support in the backing of the Good Government Association.

Is Granted Authority

A notice in this week's Royal Gazette states that Rev. Walter Henry Palmer of Centreville, Carleton County, has solemnized marriages without having been registered according to law. The matter has been brought to the notice of the Hon. Provincial Secretary Treasurer and he has been pleased to grant the necessary authority to the clergyman in question which he is authorized to do under the act.

LABOR MINISTRY IS SUSTAINED ON A DIVISION

Liberals in the British House Vote With the Government on a Motion of Censure.

London, Nov. 5—Full diplomatic relations are to be restored between Great Britain and Russia.

By a vote of 324 to 199 the House of Commons late tonight approved the Government's motion for resumption of such relations and at the same time rejected a Conservative amendment which had condemned any resumption "until the preliminary conditions have been satisfied." These were stipulations in regard to Soviet propaganda.

Russia capped a full day in both the House of Commons and the House of Lords. For the Upper Chamber was occupied with the latest development in the Indian constitutional problem. Such a day is not often experienced even at Westminster.

The Commons began eagerly expecting Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald's report of his mission to the United States and his subsequent visit to Canada. Scarcely had Mr. MacDonald concluded when the House of Lords began a debate on the "mystery" of the proclamation by Lord Irwin, Viceroy of India, which affirmed the British government's desire to accord full Dominion status to India, "in the fullness of time."

The doom of the Conservative amendment regarding relations with Russia was speedily sounded in the House of Commons by Right Hon. David Lloyd George, Liberal leader, who wields the balance of power. Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin had charged Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson, foreign secretary with "surrendering" to the Soviet representative in the negotiations leading to resumption of relations. Mr. Henderson denied there had been any surrender.

The Foreign Secretary stressed that under the new protocol, the governments of Great Britain and Russia would reciprocally confirm the pledge in regard to propaganda immediately the actual exchange of ambassadors took place.

Mr. Lloyd George then indicated the Liberal attitude by describing the break in relations with Russia, initiated by the former Conservative government when Arcos House in London was raided, as "an act of supreme silliness."

He concluded: "I say God speed the foreign secretary."

Sore Bunch of Fans

It was an indignant and disappointed aggregation of rugby fans who waited in vain for the Moncton rugby team to appear at College Field yesterday to play with the local team in the final game of the Provincial Rugby League. The game was to have commenced at 3.30 o'clock and quite a gathering of fans were on hand to witness the contest. But when no team appeared to play with the City, the football was placed in the center of the field and formally kicked off, and a try scored. The game is thus claimed by forfeit by the City team. The particular reason for indignity by the local officials is that the Fredericton City team get no money from the game. Each team in the league has the right to its own gate money in the home and home games. Moncton secured theirs early in the season, but Fredericton is now left in the hole.

MANY TONS OF COAL IN MEXICO IN A BLAZE

Two Workmen Fell Into the Burning Mass and Perished.

NEARBY TOWN THREATENED

Fire Started on Monday And Was Aided By Strong Wind.

eVra Cruz, Mexico, Nov. 6—Thousands of tons of government coal stored on the docks at Puerto, Mexico were burning today after having claimed the lives of two of the workers who attempted to extinguish the fire. Two men aiding in the removal of coal, which had not yet caught fell into the burning mass and were cremated.

The coal store caught fire Monday and a strong wind blowing from the north threatened to spread fire to the nearby town.

WOOD CUTTER CAUSE OF A TRAGIC DEATH

Bathurst, Nov. 5—A sad and distressing accident occurred at 5 o'clock this afternoon, when Harry Burke, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Burke, of South Bathurst was instantly killed while operating a wood cutting machine at the J. H. Dunn Hospital.

While cutting wood with the portable machine the saw flew off and caught Burke in the chest. His helper Hachey would probably have met the same fate had he not just gone to get more wood. Dr. Densmore, who was in the hospital at the time, rushed to the unfortunate young man but he was dead. Mr. Burke is survived by his wife and one small daughter. Coroner Meehan was summoned but found an inquest unnecessary. The deceased also leaves his parents and five sisters.

Tax Collections

Labor Government Has Little to Fear From Opposition

This Has Been Fully Demonstrated in Parliament During the Present Week—Back Bench Members of the Labor Party Threaten Trouble—Are Critical of the Lord Privy Seal.

LONDON, November 6—The Labor Government has little to fear from her opposition parties. This has been demonstrated in Parliament during the present week, but the government has much to fear from its own supporters who are more critical of Right Hon. J. H. Thomas' plans regarding relief for the critical unemployment situation than are the Conservatives and who are insisting that if Mr. Thomas cannot find work for those without jobs, then he must give them decent maintenance.

The division in the House of Commons last night on the Russian trade question resulted in a majority of 125 for the government. The Liberals led by Lloyd George and several Conservatives voted with the government.

PROGRESSIVES WIN ANOTHER ONTARIO SEAT

Clinton, Ont., Nov. 5—W. G. Medd, Progressive-Prohibition Candidate in South Huron is elected to the Ontario Legislative Assembly according to the official count issued tonight.

This reverses the result as issued election night, when it was counted as a Conservative gain. It was believed at that time that George El-Hott, Conservative, had a majority of more than 100. Mr. Medd represented the riding in the last legislature.

The party standing in the Ontario Legislature with South Huron switched from the Conservative to the Progressives, 91; Liberals, 11; Progressives, 3; Liberal Progressive, 2; Progressive-Prohibition, 1; Independent Conservative, 1; United Farmers, 1; Labor, 1; deferred, 1.

TWO STEAMERS DAMAGED IN COLLISION

London, Nov. 6—A Lloyds despatch from Rotterdam said the Italian steamship Atlantide collided with the Barbana G. another Italian steamer today and both were damaged.

The Atlantide had a large hole amidships and was filling with water when beached. The Barbana G. was damaged at the stern.

LAST IMPERIAL CHANCELLOR OF GERMANY DIES

Constance, Germany, Nov. 6—Prince Maximilian of Baden, the last Imperial Chancellor of Germany, died here today after an extended illness. He was 62 years old.

Suffering from an arterial trouble, complicated by a recent slight injury, the former Chancellor failed to rally after a relapse last Saturday. He had been unconscious since the relapse. Death occurred at 5.45 A. M.

WILL ADVOCATE COMMON SENSE IN OIL INDUSTRY

Head of Dutch Petroleum Co. Plans to Attend a Meeting in Chicago.

London, Nov. 6—Sir Henri Deterding, Director General of the Royal Dutch Petroleum Company, was reported today to be planning to attend the meeting of the American Petroleum Institute, in Chicago, in December.

It was reported Sir Henri would address the conference on "common sense in the oil industry" advocating the necessity of closer co-operation and extension of rationalization on a world wide scale.

WILL OBSERVE TWO MINUTES OF SILENCE

Moncton, Nov. 6—With the exception of work necessarily continuous on account of the movement of trains all activities on the Canadian National Railways system will cease for two minutes on armistice Day. Instructions have been issued from the headquarters offices of the system that all officers and employees are to cease work at eleven o'clock in the morning, no whistles will be blown to interfere with silence of the two minutes period.

THE PRINCE TO RESUME HIS HUNTING TRIP

London, Nov. 6—The plan of the Prince of Wales to resume his trip to Africa, interrupted last year by the illness of King George, has been approved by the King and Queen Mary, it was officially stated at Buckingham Palace today.
