THE FIGHT IN DORCHESTER.

The grafters and the grafter newspapers, seenting danger to their party in the by-election campaign now being waged in Dorchester, P.Q., have started in to raise the loyalty cry against the Liberals. They worked the same old game during the election of 1911, and had the hearty co-operation of the Nationalists of Quebec. One of the most fiefiry and outspoken of the leaders of the Nationalist group was the Hon. Albert Sevigny, who is now seeking re-election in Dorchester county after having accepted the portfolio of Postmaster General in the Borden cabinet. Hon. Mr. Sevigny now classifies himself as a straight Conservative but the beautiful sentiments which he gave expression to during the cam paign of 1911 have not been forgotten Speaking on one occasion, he said:

"The Laurier cabinet is a cabinet of Imperialists, disposed to sacrifice the interests of Canada and to launch us into wars which do not concern us What has England ever done for us? She has no need of our aid. She is strong enough to defend herself. You should protest against the idea of aiding England in her wars. If you do not protest you will certainly have conscription.'

Again, at St. Flavie, in July, 1911, he declared:

"Today they would give us a navy which would serve only the interests of England. When they speak of war with Germany, with Russia, or perhaps with France, they would seem to make Canada, which has always been happy that it may be reduced in the spring. and peaceful, furnish canons and war tries."

Up to the present time Hon. Mr. Se vigny has not repudiated these senti ments. Still he is considered loyal and patriotic enough to hold an important portfolio in the ultra-Imperialistic Borden cabinet.

THE USE OF IODINE.

We should say that a little vial of iodine is a good thing to have around the house. The suggestion is prompt ed by the fact that the soldiers in the European war are provided with iodine which they rub on minor injuries to prevent infection. Dr. C. Gray Capron, woman you can dictate to makes the surgeon-in-chief of the Commercial Travelers' Association, in his annual report likewise gave some important

data on the use of jodine. Dr. Capron pointed out that 15 per cent. of all fatal disabilities are due to hand injuries, and that of all accidents to the hand 65 per cent. of the disabilities are due to minor injuries which become infected. Over 50 per cent, of hand deformities are the reapparent that a minor injury to the hand is something to be attended to. That this is true is further proved by the doctor's observation that severe injuries, such as extensive lacerations, seldom become dangerously infected, because the injured person is obliged to go to the doctor at once and infection is prevented. "It is the neglected minor injuries," says Dr. Capron, "that give us the worst infections and longest periods of disability."

It is stated that the use of peroxide of hydrogen, or bichloride wash is of little or no value. Scrubbing with soap and water merely scatters the dirt and

infection through the wound. Iodine, however, is most effective

Paint the injured area with tincture of Paint the injured area with tincture of iodine and that is all that is required. WHAT THEY DID It has been found that where it has been used the number of infected wounds has been reduced 38 per cent All cases of infection, in fact, were those where iodine had not been ap plied immediately after the injury.

Iodine therefore should become more popular as a home remedy.



WHAT TO DO FOR A COLD.
