DEBATE ON ADDRESS BEGUN IN PARLIAMENT

(Continued from page 2.)
Several times he interrupted with a sharply uttered correction. The Premier was most conciliatory and invariably accepted the Hughes version. He vented what irritation he had accumulated in a momentary attack upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the latter's criticism of his procrastination and indecision. This time the Premier collided with F. E. Pardee and amended his first declaration. The fireworks, however, were but momentary.

Neither leader made any reference to the Dorchester by-election. Premier Borden spoke for some minutes on the question of another extension of the life of parliament, reiterating the government position, favoring such action and repeating the historic expression of Sir Wilfrid Laurier declining to "open the portals of office with a bloody key," but intimated no threat that the proposal would be crowded upon the consideration of parliament.

Mr. E. M. Macdonald moved the adjournment of the debate, which will continue tomorrow.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, after felicitating the mover and seconder of the address, joined with them in their tribute to the Duke and Duchess of Connaught. Sir Wilfrid spoke of the devotion to duty, high sense of honor, simple affability and honest democratic ways of his royal highness and of his consort as an example of the domestic virtues.

The Liberal chieftain then went on to refer to a rumor which he said he had heard persistently that in 1914 their royal highnesses, instead of returning after the two year term as vice-regents for which they had come, had consented to stay till the termination of the war. When the usual five year term of office had expired, however, it was decided for reasons unknown to Sir Wilfrid, and on which he proposed to make no comment, that it would be preferable to follow the usual course and recall their royal highnesses. The king was dead—long live the king—and so Sir Wilfrid proceeded to welcome to Canada the successors to the vice-regency. Their Excellencies the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire.

The opposition leader then turned to the war. It would be beneath the dignity of the position which Canada wished to occupy in her participation in this struggle, he said, if Canadians were to close their eyes to the true reality and indulge in hopes which events would not justify. The campaign of 1916 had not realized the expectations which its splendid opening had justified. Sir Wilfrid traced the progress of the Allied campaign on all fronts, including the failure of the German attack on Verdun, and of the Austrian thrust against Italy, the Russian advance and of the entry of Roumania into the war.

The Government Criticized.

Sir Wilfrid went on to speak of the gallant behavior of the young volunteers of Canada on the battlefield.

"Such has been the conduct of our soldiers," he said, "but here the question arises: Have the soldiers done everything that we could expect from them; have the government, in a like way, risen to the occasion? Have they fulfilled the duty which we had a right to expect of them? Sir, the answer to this question is to be found in the correspondence exchanged between the Prime Minister and the present member for Victoria, the late Minister of Militia."

Ready to Vote War Credits.

"We," said Sir Wilfrid, "are prepared to say at once to the government that if they will postpone all other

for the conviction of August 28th, which was on the information of Police Sergeant Marshall. The warrant of commitment served on the jailer on Jan. 16th by Sergt. Marshall was for the conviction of Oct. 18th, which was on the information of Chief Finley.

The latter, although having both warrants in his possession Nov. 13, could not execute the one which was on his own information.

Commenting on the affidavit of Chief Finley, Judge Wilson said it contained many ingenious statements, evidently prepared to meet the arguments of the other side, but in spite of this fact it was sufficient on which to base an opinion. The sentences did not run concurrently.

..... The Hainesville Case.
In the case of the trustees of School District No. 8, parish of Bright, which concerns Middle Hainesville, His Honor stated that at the annual school meeting in July David Lindsay had been elected a new member of the school board and that body had elected John Brown secretary instead of John Billing. The latter had taken the ground that Lindsay had been improperly elected and that Brown was not secretary.

His Honor said the minutes of the meeting of the school board were very poorly kept, but were as good as could be expected. He gave his opinion that David Lindsay was properly elected a trustee and Billing had no right to dictate to the board.

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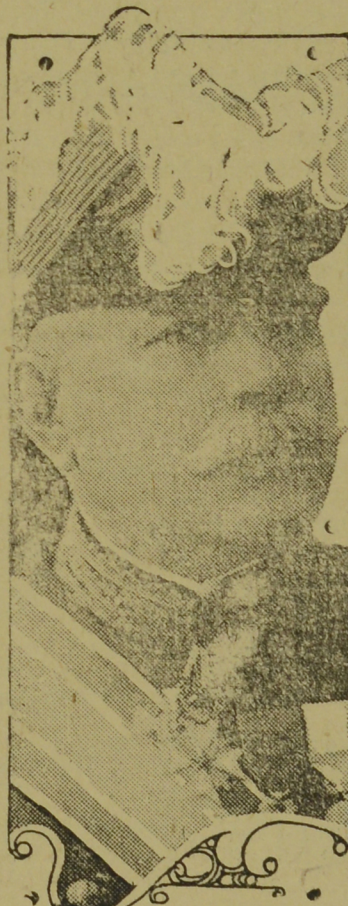
