Campaign in Great Britain Enters Upon Last Stage

It is Expected That 1,738 Candidates May Be Placed in Nomination Today—A Cash Deposit of \$750 is Required—Number of Voters Has Increased by 7,000,000.

LONDON, May 20—The British election campaign entered the last stage today with the nomination of candidates, despite it being a public holiday. The number of candidates is easily a record, which is apparent in view of the fact that it is 1,738 but it may change before nightfall. As each candidate must deposit \$750 the total will reach \$1,303,500, mostly in cash as cheques are seldom accepted.

The women voters outnumber those of the male sex by a round million. Polling takes place on Thursday, May 30th, ten days from today.

LANDSLIDES EXPECTED AT LAKE NEMIS

Rome, May 20—Engineers directing the draining of Lake Nemi to recover two galleys of Emperor Caligula were apprehensive today over small landslides and cracks indicated that the its bottom.

WILL BE AN INDEPENDENT SOVEREIGN

EX-PREMIER OF BRITAIN ON THE SICK LIST

London, May 19—Lord Roseberry, former prime minister and dean of the English turf, was confined to bed at his Surrey residence tonight with a feverish cold. He is 81 years of age and revered as the man who set out to accomplish three great aims—and succeeded. These were to win the Derby, hold the premiership and marry the richest heiress.

Following the retirement of Gladstone, Lord Roseberry was prime minister for just under two years 1894-95, when his Liberal ministry was decisively defeated. His horses have won the Derby on three occasions, Ladas, in 1894; Sir Visto in 1895, and Cicero in 1905, and no other horse breeder has equalled this record.

His wife was Hannah, eldest daughter and heiress of Baron de Rothschild, whom he married in 1878.

MACDONALD CONFIDENT OF VICTORY

Glasgow, Scotland, May 19—"The time of victory is with labor," asserting Right Hon. Ramsay MacDonald as he crossed the border today at the conclusion of his Scottish campaign tour. "I am impressed with the eagerness which the women and particularly the newly enfranchised women, are displaying. We have driven the prime minister into a corner on the subject of safeguarding. Now he is speaking to frighten the electors on the score of the Labor party's financial policy.

"Only ten days remain and during the time we are going to march for and fast to secure a great victory."

BIG OUTPUT OF ELECTRICAL ENERGY IN APRIL

Subsidiary of International Paper Co. Made a 70 Per Cent Increase Over April of Last Year.

Ottawa, May 20—Canadian Hydro-Electric Corporation, Limited, controlled by International Paper and Power Company, produced 165,345,000 kilowatt hours of electric energy in April, an increase of 70 per cent over the output of the Corporation in April 1928. In the first four months the Corporation generated 661,384,000 kilowatt hours, practically double its output in the corresponding period of last year.

The volume of trade in Canada is so large in that aggregate that the leading industries continue to operate at high levels, and in some instances new production records are being established. Construction continues to expand as the season advances and to provide an unusual degree of employment. Automobile production continues on a scale above that of any preceding year and in addition to large domestic buying, the foreign field is steadily enlarging. Smith, who met a tragic death on Friday afternoon on the Douglas road Nashwaaksis, when a pair of runaway horses trampled him to death, took place this afternoon from the late home in Nashwaaksis at 1.30 o'clock. Another short service was held at the Baptist church in Keswick at 2.30 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Dr. Warren. The services were attended by a large number of sympathizing friends of deceased and family. The floral tributes were numerous and beautiful.

TEN DEATHS FROM STORM IN NEW YORK

Automobile Accidents From Slippery Roads Cost 7 Lives.

WEATHER WAS WARM

A Bleacher Stampede in Yankee Stadium the Cause of 2 Deaths.

New York, May 20—Ten deaths were listed today as due to the heavy rain storm which struck the metropolitan area while hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers were seeking relief from Sunday's unusual warmth at beaches and other places of recreation.

Automobile accidents most of which were caused by slippery highways, cost seven lives in and about New York. One death from drowning was reported and two lives were lost in the stampede of a bleacher in Yankee Stadium.

DEATH OF WELL KNOWN LOCAL WOMAN SUNDAY

Deceased is survived by her husband, and four daughters: Miss Vida, at home; Miss Winnifred, of Chipman; Mrs. N. Sterling Burchill, of Nelson, N. B.; and Mrs. L. S. Lister of Matane, Quebec. Three grandchildren also survive. Also surviving are one sister, Mrs. John A. Anderson, of Burnt Church and one brother, J. Albert Underhill, of Blackville. The deceased was well known in this city and very popular with a large circle of friends. She endeared herself to all by her kindly habits and loving disposition and her passing will be learned with exceeding regret. She was a member of the W. A. A. of the Christchurch Cathedral and other local organizations.

The funeral will take place at the Christchurch Cathedral on Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock. Very Rev. Dean Neales will conduct the service assisted by Rev. G. F. Edsworth. Prayers will be said at the late home at 2.30 previous to the service at the church. Interment is to take place in the Rural cemetery.

Has Resigned Position

Major L. A. Wilmot, for many years customs service investigator on the continent, with headquarters at London, England, has resigned his post. Major Wilmot, who has only recently completed an important report of the Canadian Government touching the effect of the new 50 per cent Empire labor and material preferential regulations, has taken a position as agent for a large Canadian industrial company. Mr. Wilmot is a grandson of Hon. R.D. Wilmot, a former Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick.

Winnipeg, Manu., May 19—Hon. W. J. Major and Hon. W. R. Clubb are again members of the provincial cabinet.

Mr. Major was sworn in late Saturday as attorney-general and Mr. Clubb as minister of public works, positions they held prior to their resignations in January, which followed disclosures made at the sessions of the Royal Commission which investigated charges of corruption against the Bracken government.

A Public Inquest into Cause of Explosion Starts at Cleveland

A Number of the Officials of the Wrecked Clinic Will Be Questioned—A Steam Fitter Will Be First Witness—Five of the Victims Still in a Serious Condition.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

CLEVELAND, May 20—A formal public inquest into the cause of 124 deaths in the Cleveland clinic disaster was opened today. Several of the officials of the wrecked clinic will be questioned during the day, Coroner A. J. Pearse announced last night. The coroner indicated that Buffary Boggs, the steam fitter who was the last person in the X-ray storage room, where the fire started would be the first witness.

Coroner Pearse was uncertain whether he would call Dr. George W. Crile or Dr. William E. Lower, members of the clinic board of directors.

Of the victims of the explosion still in hospitals five were reported to be in a serious condition. Three of these were expected to recover while the other two had fighting chances. Many of the disaster dead were buried yesterday.

BELGIUM HAS BOCKED ON REPARATIONS

(Special cable to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

Paris, May 20—Just as the United States made a concession that might have helped towards a reparation agreement, Belgium balked today on making any reduction in her demands on Germany, and the progress of the negotiations was blocked.

The reparations negotiations should have entered their decisive phase today, with some hope of concluding this week, but the Belgian position caused an upset at a four power conference of Britain, France, Belgium and Italy today.

DR. A. H. MACKAY PASSED AWAY AT DARTMOUTH

Halifax, May 19—Dr. Alexander Howard Mackay, who for 35 years was superintendent of education for the province of Nova Scotia, died today at his home in Dartmouth on the 81st anniversary of his birth. He had been ill with pneumonia for several days.

Dr. Mackay's career as an educator began when he became a rural school teacher in 1865 as a youth of 17 years, and was uninterrupted until 1926, when he retired from the superintendency of education and was succeeded by Dr. H. L. Munro. Successively he was principal of Annapolis, Pictou and Halifax academies, and lecturer in biology at Dalhousie University, from which he graduated in arts with honors in mathematics and physics in 1873. He also took a bachelor's degree in science.

Nature study was one of Dr. Mackay's special pursuits.

LORD ASTOR'S HORSE NOT IN GOOD FORM

London, May 20—The news that Lord Astor's horse Gragadour, Derby favorite was running unsatisfactorily in his galloping trials has provided a keen sensation in British racing circles. It is estimated there are more than \$5,000,000 in sweepstakes and bets invested in the horse who may be scratched at the last moment.

It appears that Gragadour has developed "moods" and is not running with his customary enthusiasm and dash.

WILL TRY TO GET SCARFACE OUT OF JAIL

Chicago, May 19—Rallying to the defense of "Scarface" Al Capone in an attempt to free him from the Philadelphia prison, friends of the underworld Czar yesterday were reported en route to the Quaker city. A battery of legal advisers were said to be searching for technical loopholes that may free Capone from the charge of carrying a revolver.

That labor racketeers were enlisted was given credence by the departure of an Italian labor leader, prominent in racketeer circles, for Philadelphia. It was hinted that pressure would be brought to bear through the channels of organized labor and politics to release Capone. On the other side were those who wish to keep him imprisoned while their own power in the world of racketeers might be strengthened. There were many who believed that Capone has outlived his usefulness in the "racket" and a new leader was seen in the person of Johnny Torrio.

White House Concert

Rossini's brilliant overture to his opera "William Tell", with its well known marching "quadruple", will launch the White House Concert over the NBC System on Monday evening, May 20, at 8.30 o'clock Atlantic Standard Time.
