## HOW PUBLIC MONEY IS SQUANDERED

Cost Over \$1000 to Repair Old Govt. House Cottage Which Rents For \$100 Per Year

During the year 1915 the economical and business-like provincial government undertook to make some repairs on a small cottage at Old Government House. Mr. A. C. Flemming and the other boys were put on the job, and as usual given a free hand. Before the job was finished they had succeeded in running up a bill for \$1,004.41, which had to be paid out of the public treasury. Here are the items taken from the Auditor General's report: Limerick, A. & Son, plumbing at Old Govt. House cottage, \$364.44 King, Ed., 10 days labor at Old Govt. House cottage . . . . . 20.00 Delong, C., 9 days mason work at cottage and Govt. House . . . . . 36.95 Donovan, J. H., materials and labor, painting and papering cottage at Old Govt. House . . . . . 382.12 Fleming, A. C., 25 days repairing cottage at Old Govt. House . . . . . 100.00 Neill, J. S. & Sons, 27 squares Rubberoid for cottage, Old Govt. House . . . . . 100.86

Total . . . . . \$1,004.41  
The cottage when the repairs were completed was rented for the princely sum of \$100 per year, which on a 10 per cent. basis means that it was worth \$1,000, after \$1,004.41 had been spent upon it in repairs. The "boys" who put on this wonderful stunt are now in daily attendance at the Government Committee rooms, striving with all their might to "save the party" from the fate which threatens it on Saturday next.
