Supporting Opposition.

Mr. J. P. Mosher spoke at Fairville last night in the interests of Messrs. W. E. Foster and A. F. Bentley, the Opposition candidates. Beattie, of Gibson. The funeral will take place from the home of Mr. C. H. Burt at 2.30 Wednesday afternoon. Rev. T. Marshall will conduct the service. Interment will be at Sunnybank Cemetery.

MANY WITNESSES SUMMONED IN WEISS BEER C. T. A. CASE

Being Heard This Afternoon---Five C. T. A. Cases Before Police Court Today---One Dismissal And One Conviction.

Five Canada Temperance Act cases were before the police court today.

Two were against hotel men, two against keepers of stores charged with selling weiss beer, and one was against a druggist.

In the case of one hotel man, in which evidence was heard previously, Police Magistrate Limerick ordered a dismissal of the charge, stating that there was no evidence of sale and no evidence of agency on the part of a man connected with the cases.

In the other hotel case Mr. J. B. Jackson for the prosecution was granted an adjournment as the last witness he had to call was sick in bed. This man is a soldier who has been served with a subpoena.

In the case of the druggist the evidence of one witness was taken and conviction for an offence made. The case will be resumed at 2.30 on Thursday, a second offence having been charged.

One weiss beer case came up this morning and went over until this afternoon. The other case is also being heard this afternoon. A large number of witnesses have been summoned in this case on the part of the defence. The Chief of Police has an analysis of the beer, however, under which it is expected a conviction will be made. This case is attracting much interest.

ELECTRICAL FURNACE MAY BE INSTALLED AT BURNT HILL MINE

Reduction of Tungsten Ore Could be More Rapidly Accomplished--Samples Now Being Submitted To Test.

There is a prospect of an electrical furnace being installed in the near future at the Burnt Hill tungsten mine. An electrical furnace would bring about the reduction of the ore much more rapidly than the methods now used. Samples of the ore taken out at Burnt Hill are now being tested with a view of learning their adaptability to electrical reduction. If the tests are satisfactory the furnace will be installed. It probably will be operated by steam generated electricity although there are water power possibilities in the neighborhood of the mine.

The breaking of the jaws of one of the crushers recently caused an interruption at the mine, but repairs are to be made as soon as possible.

The output of the Burnt Hill mine is taken entirely by the British Admiralty, being used in the manufacture of the inner tubes of guns of large calibre.

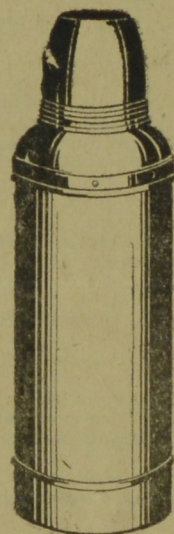

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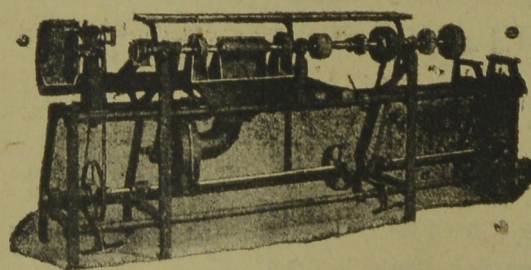
