The Baldwin Government Tenders Its Resignation

Prompt Action Taken by the Premier as a Result of the Defeat of His Administration at the Polls—Hon. Ramsay MacDonald to Be Called Upon to Carry on the King's Government.

LONDON, June 4—The home government of the far flung British Empire, with its 463,000,000 population, was turned over to Labor today for the second time in history.

Right Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Conservative Prime Minister for the last four and one half years called on the King today and submitted his resignation, which was accepted as a matter of course.

Right Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald, the dour Socialist Scotsman who led his party to victory in last Thursday's general election will call on the King tomorrow and accept the Crown's invitation to form a government.

Resignation Accepted.

Windsor, June 4—King George today accepted the resignation of Stanley Baldwin as Prime Minister of Great Britain. This announcement was made to the United Press shortly after a conference at noon between the King and Baldwin.

Baldwin tendered his resignation because of the recent defeat of the Conservative party at the British general election.

The King was in his sick bed when he received Baldwin. The conference was brief probably at the advice of the King's physicians. When the former Premier had been in the castle a short time it was reported that he had departed, but the automobile in which he motored down from London was still in front of the castle at 12.45 p. m.

FREE STATE STANDING ARMY TO BE REDUCED

Dublin, June 4—The Irish Free State has followed Denmark's lead in plans for a minimum standing army, it was learned today.

The Free State's standing army will be reduced to skeleton proportions, according to plans drawn up to take effect in 1930, and a voluntary territorial army will be trained instead.

KING GEORGE RECOVERING FROM ILLNESS

Windsor, England, June 3—King George today passed a comfortable 64th birthday with considerable periods of restful sleep despite the recent appearance of an abscess where an old lung incision had been made. The official statement announcing this was issued from the castle tonight and a cheerful atmosphere prevailed regarding the royal patient.

It was understood that the abscess was still draining and that the change will be slow and not easily marked. The sovereign however, is quite strong enough, it was indicated to receive Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin tomorrow to receive the resignation of the cabinet.

Lord Dawson of Penn and Sir Stanley Hewitt motored from London this afternoon and with Dr. Martyn saw their patient for nearly two hours. The Prince of Wales was another afternoon visitor and chatted with his father for some time.

BAD FIRE TODAY IN A HOSPITAL IN CHICAGO

Flames Started in Boiler Room and Spread Very Rapidly.

PATIENTS WERE RESCUED

A Check-up Shows That All Were Taken Out Safely.

Interest is Divided Over Politics and the Great Derby Classic

Tomorrow's Race Full of Uncertainties While the Political Situation is Becoming Clearer—People Representing the Normal Life of England Think MacDonald Should Have a Sporting Chance.

LONDON, June 4—Britain is divided today in interest between the formation of a new government and tomorrow's Derby. While the political situation is now becoming clear the Derby is full of uncertainties. Among other things it is certain now that Ramsay MacDonald will form a new government, that he will not seek the co-operation of the Liberals, that he will have a difficult and trying task and that Britain will have nothing to fear from a Labor Government. The Daily News today prints interviews with postmen, policemen, authors and others who are representative of the normal life of the country. All stress that MacDonald should have a sporting chance and that he will be unable to do any harm as long as Lloyd George holds the balance of power.

HON. J. D. M'LEAN PRAISES THE ST. JOHN VALLEY

Moncton, June 2—Hon. Dr. J. D. MacLean, of Ottawa, Chairman of the Federal Farm Loan Board, who has been making a survey of the agricultural districts of this province and Nova Scotia in connection with his office, passed through Moncton Friday en route home.

Dr. MacLean expressed surprise at the amount of agricultural land he had found in New Brunswick. He said he had been led to believe that there was only a small area of good land suitable for agriculture. He had found large areas, particularly in the valley of the St. John river, in the Kennebecasis valley and in Westmorland and Kent counties, which were equal to the best farm land found in other parts of the Dominion. The valley around Sussex and in the counties through which the St. John river flows, he said, were particularly suitable for the dairying industry. The result of his survey, he said, had completely reversed his opinion of this province as regards agricultural possibilities.
